General Information

Our School Day

- Our outdoor area is supervised from 8:15am and classrooms are also open from 8:25am.
- The Thai National flag is raised at 8:25am and then students go to their classes.
- Our school day begins at 8:30am.
- Students have a break and a snack mid-morning in the canteen.
- Lunches are supervised by school staff and our staff eat in the canteen with the students.
- There is also a short break in the afternoon for students. The times vary according to the year group.
- The school day ends at 3:30pm.
- Extra-Curricular Activities end at 4:30pm.



All students attending Hua Hin International School are expected to wear school uniform. We want our students to be smart, comfortable and ready to engage in active learning. Additionally, school uniform helps everyone to be recognisably part of our collective school community. A full range of HHIS uniforms can be gained from the school office.

- Jewellery should not be worn other than for medical or religious reasons. For students who have pierced ears, small stud earrings may be worn.
- Watches may be worn, providing they are not bulky on the student's wrist.
- Hairstyles should be neat and tidy with natural colouring. Long hair must be tied back for PE, swimming, art and science.
- Make up, nail varnish and other fashion accessories should not be worn.
- PE kit should be worn for sports activities.
- Sun hats students must wear school hats when doing outdoor activities. School hats are available from the school office.
- **Shoes** should be safe and sensible. Shoes or trainers can be dark in colour or white. Shoes should be easily fastened and offer support to the foot when the student is physically active at break times.
- White or grey socks should be worn.
- Additional Trainers are required for PE sessions.
- Vests may be worn if required but T-shirts that are visible at the collar or sleeves should not be worn.
- *All clothing* must be clearly marked with the student's name in indelible ink on the labels provided. Footwear should also be marked with the student's name.
- Blue cardigans or jumpers or school sweatshirts may be worn in the cool season.
- School book bags are available from the school office.

Drinking Water

Water is available from water coolers around the school. Students will need to have their own water bottle. We are working to reduce our use of plastic as much as possible so we ask parents to also bring their own water bottles. Parents are of course free to top up with fresh water from our coolers.









Drop Offs in the Morning

Our school day begins at 8:25am with the raising of the flag.

It is important for all our students to arrive on time to school to ensure a smooth start to the day. Arriving late can be very unsettling for students. We appreciate your understanding and efforts to make sure the students arrive on time.

- Supervision for the students begins at 8:15am. If students arrive before this time parents are responsible for their supervision. Parents are responsible for their children in early years until the time they are handed over to the class teacher or assistant.
- Early Years and Primary students can go to the classrooms at 8:20am. Teachers are setting up for the day before this time and may not yet be in the classroom. Secondary students may go up to their corridor on arrival.
- Children in Early Years should be brought to their classrooms.
- If you need a brief word with your child's teacher please do make contact with them between 8:15 and 8:25am. If you require a longer discussion, please make an appointment with the class teacher.
- Students from Year 1 may be dropped off at the gate once they are settled into the school routine and are confident for this to happen.
- If a student is more than 10 minutes late they must report to the school office so that they are registered. This is for safety reasons.

Pick Ups at the end of the school day

Our school day ends at 3:30pm. ECAs end at 4:30pm. School buses leave school at 4:30pm

- Students in Early Years and Key Stage One who are not attending ECAs should be collected from their classrooms at 3:30pm.
- Students in Early Years and Key Stage One attending ECAs should be collected from their ECA at 4:30pm.
- Students in Key Stage Two and Three can be collected from the outside area.
- Students in Key Stage Two and Three may leave school to go to their parents' car in the pick up zone as identified by security.
- Students up to and including Year 3 who travel home by school bus and are *not* involved in an ECA are supervised either in the library or in the outdoor area.

Late Pick Ups

If you are unavoidably delayed collecting your child please inform the school office.

Students who are late being picked up will go to a supervised area. After 15 minutes parents will be called. Please note that our school office closes at 5:00pm.

Going Home with other people for children in Early Years and Primary

- If you require your child to be collected by a person who does not have a HHIS security tag then you must inform the school by phone. The person collecting the student should show either their ID card or passport to security.
- If your child is going home with another parent please contact the school office or let the class teacher know.

Mobiles / Tablets / Laptops

- Students in KS3 and KS4 may bring mobile phones into school as they may be used as learning tools in lessons.
- Students may only use mobile phones in lessons. At all other times they should be locked away in their lockers. If students use their mobiles at other times they will be confiscated by teachers and returned to them at the end of the day. It is the responsibility of the students to go to the teacher at the end of the day to retrieve their phone.
- Students in KS4 may bring in their own tablet / laptop for use in lessons. This should be charged at home ready for the day's learning. Students must take full responsibility for their device's security and storage.

Lunch times











There is a set time for each year group to go into the canteen. Teachers in Early Years and Lower Primary supervise and ensure that the children have a healthy and balanced lunch.

Snacks

Morning snacks are provided by the school. If students would like a snack in the afternoon they can order this for a term ahead in the school office at a cost of 20 Baht a day. If students choose to bring in their own snacks please ensure that the snacks are healthy and that the portions are appropriate. Crisps and sweets are not appropriate snacks. Snacks must be eaten in the canteen.

We do not allow snacks to be shared for safety reasons.

Helping us to keep your children safe

Security

Our first concern is of course, the safety of our students. We have a secure entrance and access can only be made through use of an identity card or authorisation gained from the office. All adults either working at or visiting HHIS, have ID badges. Please could you ensure that you and your children bring your school ID badges to log in/out when entering and leaving the school.

If you wish to assign an additional person to collect your child, please provide the School Office with a copy of that person's ID card. If there is a change of arrangements, please contact the office. We will not release a child to anyone without the proper documentation being in place; we will contact parents for verification.

Fire Drill

A Fire drill is held at least once a term. If you are in school when you hear a continuous bell or whistle then please proceed calmly to the nearest safety zone.

Do not try to find your child or ask staff where your child is as every member of staff has important duties to perform to ensure the safety of all our children.

Absence

Please inform the School Office if your child needs to be absent from the school.

If you need to collect your child during the school day, a *Leave Form* has to be completed and signed by both the class teacher and the Head of school. Leave Forms can be collected from the School office.

Sickness

If your child becomes ill during the school day, we will contact you and ask you to come and take her/him home.

If your child has been sick or had diarrhoea we ask that they stay home for 24 hours after the last bout of sickness to prevent illnesses spreading to other students.

Administration of Medicines

If your child needs to take medication during the school day, please make sure that all medicines are handed in to the School Office and an "Administration of Medicines" form is completed. Medicines will only be administered by our school nurse.

Asthma inhalers and Epipens are an exception and should be given to your child's class teacher. Upper Primary and Secondary students should take responsibility for their own inhalers and Epipens. Please advise the school of your child's medical needs on enrolment and if there are any subsequent changes.

Allergies

Please do keep us informed of any allergies that your child may have.

Use of cameras and videos

Parents will of course like to photograph their children taking part in events at school. However, parents should not publish any photos of children, other than their own, on any public social media site.

Curriculum In Year 10

HHIS is a Cambridge International School and Assessment Centre, and all our subjects studied by Year 10 and 11 students are IGCSE qualifications. Cambridge IGCSEs are recognised by universities and employers around the world. The subjects we offer are broken into 3 areas which include the core subjects, languages and options. This provides our students a wide range of choice that best suits their interests, talents and importantly their future aspirations.

In Year 9

Every year during Term 1 we talk to our Year 9 students about the different IGCSE subjects and assess their interests for the future. Then during Term 2 we host parent afternoons to discuss academic progress and to also consider future subject choices. By fully understanding the interests and aspirations of our students, as a school we can offer a











flexible timetable model that caters to our student demand. We will continue to embed this style of consultation within our IGCSE planning in the future, as we know that offering the subjects that students want to study will ensure they can enjoy and achieve in their learning.

In Year 10 and 11

Key Stage 4 students embark on their IGCSE journey at the start of year 10. Students study a mixture of subjects that they select and these are based on the core, language and option subjects included below. Throughout year 10 and 11, students receive regular feedback on their progress through a combination of observations of their work, practice tests, end of unit exams and coursework. All these supporting components ensure that students are fully prepared for their IGCSE examinations. For most subjects, students will complete the IGCSE exams at the end of year 11.

- Science Combined and Coordinated IGCSE qualifications are available. Coordinated Science is the double award, in which students study more content and achieve 2 IGCSEs.
- Maths this is studied across Year 10 & 11. There is the opportunity to complete this qualification early should a student excel at a younger age. Students can then progress to IGCSE Additional Maths.

- Mandarin studied as a Modern Foreign Language, or as a Second Language or First Language qualification in order to challenge and extend our learners.

Reporting to Parents

Teachers are assessing students every minute of every day, so they are aware of what the students know already and what needs to be taught next. We track this progress and report on progress and current level of attainment in December as an interim report.

In June we report the children's progress and attainment against the UK year group expectations to parents. We also report how the children have made progress against our own 'I' values.

The progress of children in Early Years is judged using criteria given within the Early Years Foundation Profile. We use a programme called 'Tapestry' to show the children's attainments throughout the year in both Early Years, Key









Stage One and Key Stage Two.

We also invite parents to meet up with teachers in October to share initial targets. Further meetings are held in February to talk through the progress of the students. These meetings are held with class teachers for Early Years and Primary students. Parents are able to make appointments with all their child's subject teachers in Secondary.

Parents are invited to an open afternoon in June following their end of year report. Students show parents their work in books and around the school.
