Year 7 visited Magna Science and Activity Centre, Year 8 took part in the 999 Challenge day, Year 9 students visited

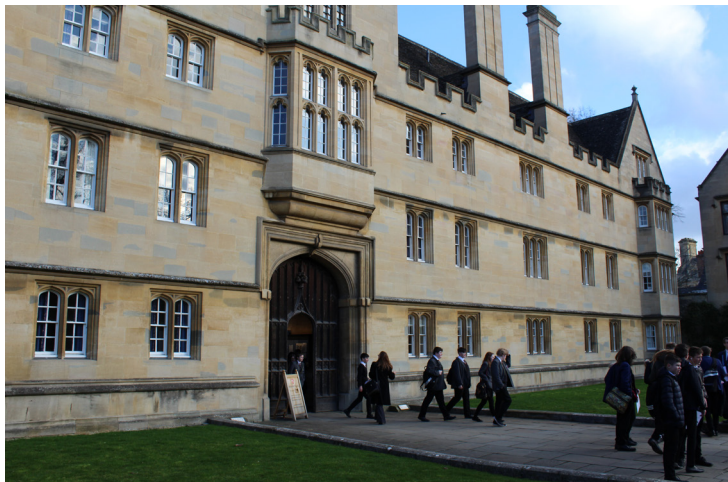

On Tuesday the 5th of February, a number of students in Year 10 visited Wadham College, part of Oxford University to celebrate their graduation on completing a scholars programme run by 'The Brilliant Club'. This gave students the opportunity to get a taste of Uni life and to reflect on the past 3 months completing the programme.



Students left for London at 7.30am and arrived at the college just in time to start the day planned and led by 'The Brilliant Club' and Dr Hugh Monro, a member of Oxford University. Students enjoyed an inspiring talk by Dr Hugh Monro about the benefits of going to University and shared interesting facts and figures about Oxford. After the morning's session, students were invited to the picturesque dining hall to enjoy lunch, provided by Wadham College. During the afternoon session, there was a chance for The Brilliant Club to reflect on the scheme to give our students more of an insight of the skills developed. Prior to the celebration ceremony, students were invited to tour of the grounds. Students then re-joined other schools in the theatre for the celebration ceremony, where they were presented with a certificate for their incredible achievement.



What is the Scholars Programme?

The Scholars programme is a great opportunity for students to gain valuable skills going into their final year at GCSE level and to gain knowledge and information to help with their choices in further education. For students to complete the programme they had to attend a session each week, run

by an expert from Nottingham University, Margareta Clarke. They had also been to Sheffield University on a day trip to meet members of The Brilliant Club and to experience Uni life. In the final stage on the programme they had to write a two thousand word essay on the topic that they had been studying. This was then passed onto Margareta to mark and was then nationally moderated by The Brilliant Club and other PHD's, to determine their overall result.



Margareta also commented that one of the essays completed was to the standard expected by an undergraduate in their second year of university! This is truly remarkable!
