STUDENTS IN KEY STAGE 3 HISTORY CLUB CELEBRATE A SUCCESSFUL HISTORY THEATRICAL PERFORMANCE ON THE 'PENDLE WITCHES', WHICH THEY PERFORMED IN THE SCHOOL'S DRAMA STUDIO ON THE 17TH JANUARY 2018.

It was a brilliant way to mark the beginning of the New Year in school, and showcase the talent of so many budding historians who have been committed to the club since its inception. History club was set up in October by Miss Bartle who introduced the students to the Pendle Witches of 1612. The students played games and created Fact Files. They decided to perform a mock Pendle witch trial to show other students in school what it was like to be involved, whether they were accusing someone or the accused victims themselves. Students were assigned roles and they all contributed to writing a script which culminated in this

exceptional performance.

The students not only played an active role in the performance, many of them had written and produced diary entries where they described what it might have felt like to be accused of witchcraft in the 17th Century before being sentenced to death. Other students decided to create posters advertising the event, and tickets which were given out to students and staff in school so they could attend. It was a fantastic turnout, almost every seat was filled in the Drama Studio, and money was raised which will be donated to the club's chosen charity – Claire House Children's Hospice.

Without these students' dedication and commitment to attend rehearsals on a weekly basis, the show could not have been the success it was. Well done Key Stage Three History Club!

GEOGRAPHY TOUR OF ITALY

43 STUDENTS AND 5 MEMBERS OF STAFF MET THE COACH OUTSIDE SCHOOL LATE EVENING ON FRIDAY 6TH FEBRUARY. WHAT AWAITED THEM WAS A JOURNEY TO LONDON FOLLOWED BY A FLIGHT TO NAPLES.

The first stop when arriving in Naples was the Archaeological Museum which houses ancient Roman remains. Its collection includes works from Greek, Roman and Renaissance times, and especially Roman artefacts from nearby Pompeii and Herculaneum. After an hour and a half perusing the delights the museum had to offer the group walked a short distance to try some traditional Italian Pizza.

The next day the group awoke early refreshed from their much-needed sleep and headed to an impressive Roman Villa called San Marco which in its past glory had an atrium containing a pool, a triclinium with views of the bay of Naples, and a colonnaded courtyard.

Herculaneum was next on the itinerary, located on the outskirts of Naples it is a fascinating archaeological site to visit.

Students were treated to an in-depth insight of the old city by our knowledgeable guide Laura. The well-to-do Roman coastal town was destroyed by the eruption of Vesuvius in AD79 and now it provides an insight into how its Roman residents lived. Vesuvius itself awaited next for the eager students and staff. Towering above Naples we were all keen to see the power of physical geography up close. After the long walk up what awaited was a stunning crater and breath-taking views of the Bay of Naples. The souvenir stall at the top of Vesuvius did remarkable



business that day as evident by the smile on the stall owner's face as we left. Back to the hotel in Sorrento that evening and eager anticipation for Pompeii the next day.

Our last full day brought remarkably pleasant weather for our guided tour of Pompeii. We'd seen the immense physical prowess of Vesuvius the day before and it became evident as the day went on just what havoc this volcano could wreak. The volcano buried the ancient Roman city of Pompeii under a thick carpet of volcanic ash. The dust "poured across the land" like a flood, one witness wrote, and shrouded the city in "a darkness... like the black of closed and

unlighted rooms." Two thousand people died, and the city was abandoned for almost as many years. When a group of explorers rediscovered the site in 1748, they were surprised to find that—underneath a thick layer of dust and debris—Pompeii was mostly intact. The buildings, artefacts and skeletons left behind in the buried city have taught us a great deal about everyday life in the ancient world. The highlight was the amphitheatres, beautifully preserved streets and with the vastness of the city we could get a real sense of what life would have been like.

Our last day saw us head back to Naples for our underground tour of Naples. As the city has grown and with a lack of space

people over centuries have simply built on top of the City. This has left a cavernous underground world which saw the students in awe. After this, our walk through the streets of Naples saw us drenched. A quick change and a McDonalds at the airport and the students were refreshed for the flight home.

LAIRD

NAMED AFTER WILLIAM LAIRD

William Laird was born in 1780. He was a Scottish shipbuilder and developer who was responsible for what later became the Cammell Laird shipyard, and for starting the substantial development of its adjoining town, Birkenhead, on the Wirral in England.

William Laird commissioned Edinburgh architect James Gillespie Graham to design an

elegant new town close to the shipyard. This became the centre of Birkenhead, focused on Hamilton Square and Birkenhead Park.

Laird's shipbuilding business moved in 1856 to a new site on the river bank at Tranmere, and in 1903 amalgamated with Charles Cammell & Company to become Cammell Laird.



MAYER

NAMED AFTER JOSEPH MAYER

Joseph Mayer was born in 1803 in Staffordshire. By the late 1850s he had moved to Bebington, into a house called 'Pennant House' after the traveler and naturalist. Joseph Mayer quickly immersed himself into village life, which had the effect of transforming and enriching the lives of the community. He was instrumental in bringing gas and water services

to the village and founded many clubs for sports and recreational activities.

Joseph Mayer's enthusiasm for people to enrich their lives, through access to learning and culture, led him to establish a free library in Bebington in 1866. He later also developed 5 acres of parkland, orchards and a public hall, all for the community.



STANLEY

NAMED AFTER THOMAS STANLEY

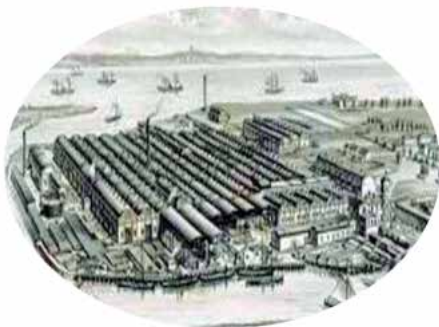
In 1846, the owner of the ferry, Thomas Stanley, built the Eastham Ferry Hotel and shortly after, the Pleasure Gardens were added to attract more visitors.

The gardens were landscaped with rhododendrons, azaleas, ornamental trees and fountains. Attractions included a zoo, with bears, lions, monkeys and antelope, an open-air stage, tea rooms, bandstand, ballroom,

boating lake and a water chute.

The bear pit is still there, along with the remains of three fountains, once part of the 19th century zoo.

Eastham Ferry still remains a popular leisure spot for locals with great views of Liverpool and scenic walks through the woodland.



The Wilson family established Price's Patent Candle Factory in Bromborough Pool in 1853. The wellbeing of their employees

WILSON

NAMED AFTER THE WILSON FAMILY

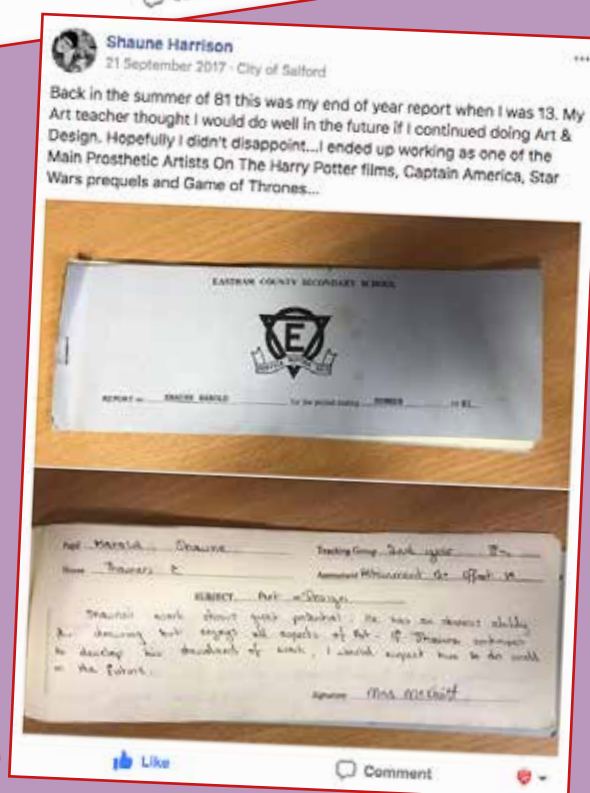
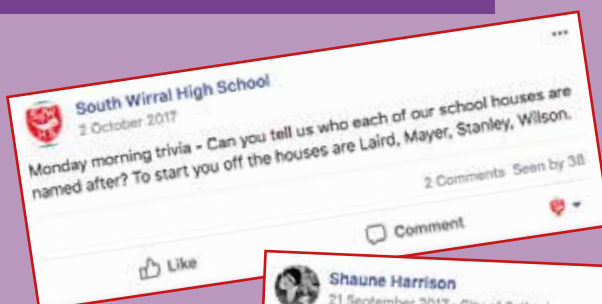
was so important that they built a village of 147 houses with a church, institute, shop and library for its workforce. This was the second oldest 'industrial village' in the United Kingdom. There were also numerous sport and pastime clubs.

This model village was an inspiration to other employers

and was copied at Lever's Port Sunlight factory adjacent to Bromborough in the 1880's and by Cadbury's Bourneville village in the 1890's. Other examples of the company's far-sighted approach to its employees included the introduction of a contributory employees' pension in 1893 - the first scheme in the country to include floor workers.

THEIR PLANNING AND ORGANISATION WAS EXEMPLARY AND RESULTED IN A FANTASTIC TRIP TO LONDON FOR BUSINESS, TRAVEL AND PE STUDENTS. WE ASKED THE STUDENTS TO PUT TOGETHER A REVIEW OF THE TRIP FOR THE DIGEST.

Day 1

The planning of this day worked out really well, we all planned out times really well and all got to lime street at the set time so we would be on time for the train which was at 7:47. The travel to London went smoothly and when we got to the Hostel we explored Bayswater for 30 minutes until our room was settled in our rooms for about 40 minutes until we were ready to leave for Wimbledon.

Wimbledon -
