## MAKING CONNECTIONS

I have had the pleasure of visiting some of our local primary schools over these past few weeks to make stronger community connections and look forward to visiting more after the half-term. It is incredibly important to us here at Broadoak that we know where the children are coming from and how we can best hold their hand as they move to secondary. Similarly, we have had assemblies for our Year 11s on their next steps and have had visits from sixth form providers - it is such an exciting as well as nerve-wracking year for them. We urge all parents with students in Year 11 to get in touch if they have any questions or comments about how we can make this year the most successful it can be.

## CYCLE SAFETY

I have had a few conversations with members of the public who are concerned that some of our young people, particularly in the lower years, are not keeping themselves as safe as they should when they cycle home. If your child cycles please do speak with them about road safety, using a cycle helmet and, as we enter the darker nights, high visibility clothing. ## FIZZY DRINKS/ENERGY DRINKS

In keeping with the theme of developing healthy young people, we will be asking that after half term no students bring fizzy drinks or energy drinks into school. The effects of such drinks on young people can be immense in terms of their concentration, behaviour, dental health and physical health. Students will receive the message through assemblies and tutor time where they will be encouraged to share their views but we would very much like to encourage them to rethink sugary drinks and opt for healthier choices.

## INSET DAY

Some of you have asked, quite rightly, what teachers do on inset days. In our last inset day on $29^{\text {th }}$ September the teaching team worked with an educational consultant looking at ways to develop their teaching strategies to maximise impact. You may have seen some of the comments and pictures on Twitter. It was an invaluable training day that allowed us to work collaboratively on professional pedagogy so that our young people make more progress in the classroom. Our next inset day on $30^{\text {th }}$ October will be dedicated to curriculum planning in light of the raised standards at both key stage 2 and key stage 4. Again, it will give us time to work together to calibrate and redesign where necessary what is happening in our classrooms to make sure pupils make as much progress as possible.

We are very keen on students developing their independent study skills - vital for their own progress but also for further study beyond school! ## BOOKS HOME

We are pleased to announce that students in Years 7, 8 and 9 will be bringing books home to parents again this academic year.

Last year, parents and carers told us that they thought the initiative was a great way to find out more about what children know and what they need to learn or practise further. Parents and carers also commented that they thoroughly enjoyed looking through books in the comfort of their own home.

This year, the scheme begins with Year 8 and Year 9:-

Students in 8S, 8M and 8W will bring home exercise books on Wednesday 22nd November. Books must be returned to College on Thursday $23{ }^{\text {rd }}$ November.

Students in 8B, 8D and 8K will bring home books on Wednesday 29th November. Books must be returned to College on Thursday 30th November.

Students in 9S, 9Q, 9R and 9W will bring home books on Wednesday $6^{\text {th }}$ December. Books must be returned to College on Thursday $7^{\text {th }}$ December.

Students in 9B, 9D, 9K and 9M will bring home books on Wednesday $13^{\text {th }}$ December Books must be returned to College on Thursday $14^{\text {th }}$ December

The scheme will start in January 2018 for Year 7 with 7S, 7M and 7W bringing books home on the $17^{\text {th }}$ January and 7B, 7D and 7 K bringing books home on the $\mathbf{2 4}{ }^{\text {th }}$ January. A reminder will be sent to parents nearer the time.

We hope that you agree that this is an exciting opportunity to find out more about your child's learning and progress. Of course, we do ask that you support your child by returning books to College the next day.

## INTRODUCING THE STUDENT LEADERSHIP TEAM

Congratulations to the newly appointed Head Girl, Madison and Head Boy, Dylan. The Deputy Head Girl is Alyx and the Deputy Head Boy, Tim. They were selected from a total of 11 other students who applied for the roles, all of whom had to give a presentation to students and staff for them to vote.

As well as our Head Girl and Head Boy team, we have also appointed a further 19 students as prefects. Prefects are a group of students in Year 11 who represent the personal best values of Broadoak College.


As well as excellent attendance, punctuality and attitude to learning, prefects undergo a rigorous application process, including a letter of application with supporting statements from peers and teachers and an interview with the Headteacher.

Students who are selected as prefects receive an afternoon training session, a different tie, and a pin badge to enable students to recognise them around the school. Prefects act as student ambassadors on Open Evening and often as tour guides for visitors throughout the year, and they support staff in break and lunchtime supervision. One of the prefects' key roles is to assist in organising the Leaver's Prom, year book and hoodies. They hold fund raising events throughout the year to help with the costs so that all students get an opportunity to participate. The Head Boy and Girl will be representing Broadoak in the community and they will also participate in assemblies, give a presentation at Open Evening and sit on the School Council.


Broadoak opened its doors for its annual "Open Evening" on Thursday $28^{\text {th }}$ September to showcase all the best things Broadoak has to offer.

Every faculty pulled out all the stops to make the evening as informative and enjoyable as possible. In Mathematics there were exciting puzzles and games, English had a time machine theme visiting literature though the ages, a poetry pedestal, story writing and some Dickens bah-humbugs!

The Geography classroom was transformed into a Disaster Zone with sound, lighting and smoke effects to give you the atmosphere of a genuine disaster.

The talents of the students were on display with student pianists playing the grand piano throughout the evening as well as a short scene from this year's Performing Arts production of The Wiz.

Head Girl and Head Boy, Maddie and Dylan, led the proceedings in the Main Hall with a wonderful speech full of their personal reflections of the opportunities they have enjoyed at Broadoak and our new Head Teacher Ms McGillycuddy delivered a speech highlighting her vision for the future of the school.

## BIKEABILITY



As part of the schools' Active Travel Plan we aim to raise awareness and create opportunities for young people to travel actively and safely to and from school. We know that this will benefit the whole school community.

To give young people the confidence to travel actively we are offering Bikeability Level 3 training. The training is free of charge (funded by North Somerset Council) and will be led by Life Cycle UK (www.lifecycleuk.org.uk).

## What is Bikeabilty Level 3 Training?

Level 3 training is fun and suitable for children at secondary school and covers dealing with hazards, making 'on-the-move' risk assessments and planning routes for safer cycling. Training will happen on the school site and away from the school site in the local area.

Once students have completed their Bikeability Level 3 qualification green badge, they will be able to cycle almost anywhere, and:

- Make a trip to school, work or elsewhere on any roads

Use complex junctions and road features such as roundabouts, multi-lane roads and traffic lights

- Understand driver blind spots
- Know how (and when) to pass queuing traffic
- Identify and react to hazardous road surfaces
- Plan a safe cycling route
- Interpret road signs

Sessions were held on the MAVIS bus (Multi-Agency Vehicle in Service) raising awareness of Hate Crime.

The students learnt how Hate Crime is tackled in North Somerset and how they can get advice, support and how to report Hate Crime.

The roadshow had a range of interactive activities and representatives from agencies including the Police, SARI (Stand Against Racism \& Inequality) and Citizens Advice. "This was a great opportunity for Broadoak students to understand the seriousness of Hate Crime and the importance of living in harmony with, and being proud of, our multi-cultural society".
