It is two years since the formation of the Squires Lane Learning Federation, bonding Manorside and Tudor schools. Our vision for the Federation was two distinct schools, each with their own unique character, working together to ensure the best possible outcomes and provision for the children of our local community. Ms King's departure at the end of this term is an opportunity to reflect on the achievements to date and look forward to our aims and goals.

Manorside continues to deliver an outstanding teaching and learning experience across and beyond the curriculum. Tudor achieved one of the biggest challenges fac-

ing the federation in being judged 'Good' by Ofsted under the new framework. By joining together under the federation the schools retained their independence. Tudor was under the very real threat of falling under the control of an academy chain. With the wider financial pressures heightened by a shortage of school places, Manorside too was exposed to the possibility of a merger outside the control of the Governing Body and the community.

The platform of the federation allows us to work across both schools to develop shared experiences and best teaching practice. This is at a time when the sustainability of the single-form entry Primary School is coming under increasing financial pressure. Federating the two schools maintained their individual ethos whilst also introducing vital cost savings through combined services and leadership.

The Governing Body has changed dramatically and new members bring a breadth of skills and experiences to support the staff, offer informed criticism and ask challenging questions. The Governing Body is highly representative of the school community with parents and staff committed to the future development of the Federation. The strong roots that have been established by the federation are a reflection of Ms King's drive and vision. As we undertake the search for a new Executive Head Teacher, a fresh perspective will form the basis to deliver a strategy for a successful future.

The Governors continue to work towards the development of the two wonderful schools we have the privilege to represent. This report helps to outline our role, but more importantly celebrates the achievements of your children.



Fundraising

One of the intentions of the Squires Lane Learning Federation was to produce cost saving benefits to both schools by shared services and combined contracts. However, a fall in demand for places in Barnet in 2017 means that it looks likely that the numbers at Manorside school will diminish in the coming years, whilst not growing as hoped at Tudor. This will result in less funding for both schools. Some of the schools' activities will need to be cut back or find alternative sources of funding. We are lucky that we have such active and successful parent involvement with the Friends associations and we will be working closely with them to see what additional fundraising activities can take place.

Website

One initial target will be raising the money needed for both schools to be given modern up-to-date websites. These will come with new school apps to communicate best and most cost effectively with parents allowing messages to arrive directly on parents' phones. These messages can be addressed to the whole school, to year groups, classes and also societies and activities. This will enable a reduction in paper letters as well as timed morning reminders, urgent messages, and greater interaction.

There are of course many areas of school life which would benefit from additional funding. The SLLF and the Friends will be working together over the coming year and in consultation with staff and pupils will be highlighting other funding targets and needs.

School Highlights

Road Safety

Last year's Walk Safe Squires Lane campaign was a great success. After media coverage, a petition and presentations to a Barnet Council meeting by a child from Manorside's Year 5, it was agreed to introduce a 20mph speed limit on Squires Lane.

Additionally a new crossing is being planned across Squires Lane near the junctions of Etchingham Park Road and Avondale Road.



The next aim of the campaign is to persuade TfL to alter the timing of the lights at the junction between Squires Lane and Long Lane to make crossing safer.

Tudor

Tudor continued to go from strength to strength last year following our successful Ofsted result.

Our children made us very proud last year when they represented Tudor in the dance festival and music festival. We finished the year with an amazing Year 6 production called Darwin Rocks and then showcased the amazing talent across the school in our Tudor's Got Talent show!

Tudor had another fantastic year of sporting achievements last year. The highlights included our best ever performance in the gymnastics competition and the primary athletics tournament. We now have more pupils than ever before taking part in sporting clubs and activities outside of school.

We are very proud to have received three national awards last year. A bronze award for eco schools, a silver Sainsbury's sport award and gold medal for our school travel plan.

Federation Key Stats

Pupil Numbers

The start of this Academic Year sees enrolment of 325 pupils at Manorside and 272 at Tudor. These numbers have already risen following appeals.

Achievement Data

- An improved picture at Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) at Tudor brings us in line with national average a very successful bulge class year
- At Manorside the EYFS picture is stable, however, we will still be below national average
- Both schools' Year 1 Phonics Test results bring us in line or above national average (a key indicator for the good and outstanding OFSTED judgement)
- Manorside's result has significantly improved and 92% is an incredible result
- Tudor has maintained the progress in phonics it made last year with the impressive result of 80%
- At Key Stage 1 (KS1) there has been significant improvements across the board at Manorside which is a great achievement
- The KS1 results at Tudor secure the improvements that we saw last year which is great and good percentages of children made more than expected progress from the end of EYFS: reading 22%, writing 28% and maths 33%

Last year's Y6 cohort were significantly below national expectations at KS1 and although it appears that there has been a substantial decrease in the % of children meeting the expected standard in all subjects except writing progress measures show that overall children has made significantly more progress than expected from the end of KS1 to the end of KS2.

In comparison to last year's Y6 results it is a very positive picture overall. There has been significant improvements in attainment and progress in all subjects bringing Tudor more in line with national averages than we were last year. The only decrease can be seen in writing which will be a focus for this year's cohort. We will continue to focus on accelerating the progress of children throughout the year groups aiming to secure and further improvements in progress scores so that we are 0 or above in progress scores for all subjects.
