Classification of the school

Elfed High School is an 11 to 16 mixed comprehensive school, maintained by Flintshire County Council.

Language

Elfed High School is an English medium school. All students study Welsh as a second language and are encouraged to use Welsh in informal situations. The Welsh culture, language and heritage of the Buckley area are an essential part of the school's ethos. Students from Year 7 to Year 11 learn Welsh as a second language and all are encouraged to use Welsh in social and informal situations.

The School Admissions Policy

The Admissions Policy is determined by the Local Authority. Normal admission is into Year 7 (students aged 11), but older students are welcomed to the school. They will be guided and mentored to take a full part in all the activities the school offers. Parents and carers who are considering transferring their child to the Elfed should contact the school reception for advice and guidance.

Transition from other schools - Elfed 'Smooth Move'

Primary school pupils and families enjoy the Smooth Move to Elfed programme of learning opportunities in the years running up to their change of school. We keep in touch with primary school teachers so that we really know and understand every child's strengths and know about any support that may be needed. We help new students settle in quickly, so that they feel happy and confident and reach their true potential at Elfed High School. All treasonable provision is made for students with mobility problems or other difficulties to enable them to access teaching and learning and play their part in the life of the school. Wheelchair access to the first floor is via a lift.

Parents, carers and primary pupils are invited to the Open Day in October, to see the facilities and meet students and staff. New students spend two days in Elfed High School during the last term of Year 6, to get to know one another and for a taste of life in a secondary school.

We do our best to keep friends together when allocating tutor groups, whilst keeping a mix of ability in every class. All new students and parents sign up to the Home School Agreement that sets the standard for us to work together with shared values and expectations. We welcome students from schools other than our local partner schools and those who transfer mid-year. We are pleased to meet with parents of prospective students at any time to ensure a 'smooth move' for all our students. Please contact the school on 01244 550 217 to arrange an appointment.

Number of places available in the school

We follow Flintshire County Council's admissions policy.

The designated capacity of the building is 1037, although this may be reduced after the refurbishment of the building to adjust the capacity in line with the outcome of the Local Area review.

There is a pupil admissions limit of 175. In 2017 we received 160 preferences and no appeals were made.

Visits to school

Parents and carers who wish to visit the school are welcome to make an appointment with the office reception staff who will try to arrange a date and time with the appropriate member of the team who can answer your questions and respond to your needs. Notice will be given of Open Days and other events to which parents and carers are encouraged to attend and give us feedback on how we are doing. The governors Annual Report to Parents/Carers is published in March and all parents and carers are invited to attend a meeting with governors to discuss the report and school performance.

Elfed High School students benefit from individual care and support.

Elfed High School is a very friendly school with a positive ethos based on understanding, respect and co-operation. Learning Directors encourage excellent attendance, punctuality and outstanding academic progress. Students benefit from the care and attention from their tutor and personal mentor. Pastoral Support Teams remove any barriers to learning through advice, guidance and by working with parents and carers. Learning Coaching is also available to support students as they prepare for their examinations.

We welcome contact from families. If there are any concerns we want to can address them efficiently and quickly. Similarly, if there are any suggestions which can improve what we do, we'd like to hear about them

Expectations and Rewards

The Wellbeing Policy encourages all students to be the best they can be. Teachers look out for reasons to praise and reward students when they take on new challenges. We use the Vivo online rewards system which parents are able to monitor. Students enjoy exchanging their points for goods from our Vivo Shop or making donations to charity.

At the end of each academic year all students who have met rigorous standards of behaviour and attendance meet with the Chair of Governors and receive recognition and reward for their efforts.

Curriculum Provision

We provide excellent learning opportunities for the whole community of Buckley, working with our partner schools: Mountain Lane, Westwood, Southdown and Drury Primary Schools and beyond. Students learn in a calm and safe learning environment where everyone is included. They benefit from excellent facilities with modern laboratories, studios and workshops. Our theatre, music suite and drama studio are very well used to develop skills in the Arts. The indoor swimming pool, full sized all-weather pitch, gymnasia and sports hall are shared with the Buckley Leisure Centre, providing a wide range of sports activities outside school hours.

How we learn

Students develop their skills using individual programmes in literacy, numeracy and ICT that unlock their potential across the curriculum. Inspectors were impressed by our excellent practice developing students' literacy and numeracy skills. Enrichment programmes and personalised interventions boost skills at all levels and increase students' enjoyment of learning.

Elfed High school is an inclusive school, with opportunities for everyone to achieve personal excellence. Teachers plan lessons with learning activities to suit all students and learning styles.

- We recognise that more able and talented students thrive on extra challenge and provide extension activities to help them reach the highest levels.
- Students with additional learning needs have the best support to meet their social and learning needs. We overcome barriers to learning by working in partnership with parents and skilled professionals.
- The school building is accessible for all students, staff and visitors. Our additional needs resource supports students who find learning difficult.

How we assess and monitor progress

We support every student to make the best possible progress and update parents and carers regularly on their child's wellbeing throughout the year. Teachers monitor attitude and progress towards challenging personal targets. There is a full annual written report on progress and achievement. Families are invited to meet with staff at Progress Evenings and at any other time to suit them.

Learning is at the heart of Elfed High School, in lessons, outside lessons and through the students' personal development as members of our wider community. We support students to enjoy learning, to acquire the knowledge and skills for the world of work, develop enquiring minds and be confident to express their opinions.

What we learn

In Key Stage 3 (years 7,8 and 9) students learn English, Mathematics, Science, Welsh, Art, French, Geography, History, Information Technology, Music, Religious Studies, Physical Education, Technology and Personal and Social Education.

In Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11) individual learning pathways enable everyone to study the subjects they find interesting and that are suitable for their ability. Optional subjects include Geography, History, French, Music, Art, ICT, Business Studies, Design and Technology, Child Deveelopment, Food, Engineering and Philosophy and Ethics. All students continue to study English, Mathematics, Science, Religious Studies, Welsh and Physical Education.

We provide discrete additional support for students who are entitled to free school meals, funded by the Pupil Deprivation Grant. We provide remissions in accordance with Welsh Government Guidance on Charging and Remissions10/04/12.

Sex and Relationships Education

Learning about sex and relationships is set in the context of social responsibility and personal relationships and issues are discussed in relation to parenthood and family. The Sex and Relationships Education Policy conforms to the 1986 Education Act and is available by request. Parents and carers are entitled to withdraw their child from Sex Education as a whole, or any part of it. A request should be made in writing to the Headteacher.

Careers and the world of work

We help students to recognise their strengths and to welcome challenges in their learning. They are supported as they prepare for the world of work, employment and training. We have strong relationships with employers and all students benefit from a work placement that helps them to learn about the world of work, with local employers providing some excellent placements.

Arrangements for religious education and collective worship

Religious Studies are broadly non-denominational and part of the curriculum for all students. Students are involved in daily collective worship, based on a moral or religious theme, including a prayer. Learning about sex and relationships is set in the context of social responsibility and personal relationships are discussed in relation to parenthood and family.

Parents and carers are entitled to withdraw their child from Religious Studies as a whole, or any part of the on request in writing to the Headteacher and alternative activities will be arranged.

Arrangements for students who need additional support

Elfed High school is an inclusive school, with opportunities for everyone to achieve personal excellence. Teachers plan lessons with learning activities to suit all students and learning styles. We recognise that more able and talented students thrive on extra challenge and provide extension activities to help them reach the highest levels.

Elfed High School is a resourced school for students with a range of additional learning needs. Cyswllt is a generic additional needs resource providing support for students including a Flintshire funded resource for students with social and emotional difficulties and resource for students from Ysgol Maes Hyfryd.

The Additional Learning Needs team supports students in accordance with the Welsh Assembly Government Code of Conduct. We monitor progress, support learning and provide regular feedback to parents and carers. Teaching Assistants support students who benefit from individual attention whilst others are taught in small groups with the support of specialist teachers.

We have lift access to the first floor and ramps at all exits. Nearly all of the building is accessible for disabled students.

Students with additional learning needs have the best support to meet their social and learning needs. We overcome barriers to learning by working in partnership with parents and skilled professionals.

All staff are trained in Child Protection and have a duty to report concerns about the well-being of students to the Child Protection Coordinator.

Looked After Children are supported in line with Welsh Government recommendations and the Headteacher is responsible for promoting their educational achievement.

Equality and Diversity

Elfed Extra is an exciting programme of activities that take place before school, after school and at lunchtime. They provide excellent opportunities for our students to:

- Develop creativity and communication skills through art and drama.
- Take part in sport such as rugby, netball, rounders, gymnastics, dance.
- Travel on school visits in Wales, the UK and abroad.
- Learn from inspirational visitors from industry and former students.
- Develop teamwork and communication skills.
- Learn about leadership and working with others by organising charity events.
- Enjoy reading, writing and supporting other students through activities in the Library.
- Contribute to the student newspaper, Adlais Elfed Echo as reporter, editor or feature writer.

The School Day and Term Times 2017-18

Site Security

CCTV is employed at various locations around the grounds. Doors which enable access to the school are not accessible from the outside during school session times without prior authorisation or assistance from school staff.

Health and Safety

Students and staff co-operate to ensure the health and safety of all users of the school site. Students are expected to follow the basic rules that ensure a healthy environment for learning and teaching in school. Parents and carers are asked to support the school by encouraging their child to co-operate in this respect. A copy of the Health and Safety Policy is available on request.

Health

The School Nurse and School Doctor carry out health and medical inspections with permission of parents and carers. All health issues are strictly confidential. We inform parents and carers by telephone if their child is injured or taken ill during the day. It is essential that emergency contact numbers are up to date. Details of all accidents and incidents are recorded. Parents and carers are asked to notify the school of any medical or clinical condition that may affect their child's work or behaviour.

Home School Agreement

The Home School Agreement is signed by students and parents / carers and the Headteacher. It sets the standard for us to work together with close co-operation, shared values and expectations. Copies of the agreement are available to all new students and their families.

Concerns / Complaints

We encourage those who care for our students to raise any concerns they have as soon as possible. If the first response to a concern/complaint is felt to be unsatisfactory, the issue should be put in writing to the Headteacher who will investigate and resolve the complaint. If the complaint remains unresolved, a formal complaint can be made to the Chair of the Governing Body at the school. The school complaints procedure (insert link) conforms to Welsh Government guidance.

For student concerns (complaints) we follow Welsh Government and The Wales Children's Commissioner guidance. Students can raise any concerns they have with the School Council, Tutor or mentor. There is a formal process to follow where concerns/complaints are not resolved in the first instance.

Pupil Participation / Pupil Voice

We encourage all our students to take an active part in school life and get involved with decision making that affects the way they learn and enjoy their time in school. There are opportunities for students to represent their peers on the Sports Council and School Council. Two students from Year 11 are nominated by the Student Council every year to join the governing body. These students play an important role in helping their fellow governors to make the right decisions for the school to flourish.

Charging Policy

Materials for Projects and Practical Subjects A charge will be made for materials / ingredients when parents and carers have agreed in advance that they wish to own the finished product. Agreement will be sought in advance of the beginning of each course on the understanding that children may not be excluded if no contribution is made.

Optional Activities outside the School Day A charge shall be made for activities outside school hours and not part of a public examination syllabus or a requirement of the National Curriculum or religious education within the Charging Policy determined by the Governing Body.

Public Examinations

Students prepared for a prescribed public examination will be entered free of charge.

Supplementary Information

Governors shall determine reasonable requirements for school clothing, including games clothing, and protective clothing in laboratories, workshops etc. Where school property or equipment is damaged or lost as a consequence of students' behaviour, payment from parents or carers shall be requested.








