## Curriculum

Key Stage 3

Students follow a two year key stage 3 curriculum pathway, choosing their option subjects in Year 8. Geography, History and RE are taught as discreet subjects at key stage three and are grouped by their literacy ability.

One less able group is also taught Humanities as a separate course in year 7.

Key Stage 4

The Faculty offers History as a Full Course GCSE from year 9 onwards.

Key Stage 5

The Faculty offers an A2 course in History.
