## EXAM RESULTS DAY

All the staff, students and governors at Broadoak are thrilled with their 2016 GCSE results. This year's results are the best ever for overall GCSE grades with 5 or more $A^{*}-\mathrm{C}$ at $56 \%$ with English and Maths, a notable $15 \%$ of the grades being $A^{*}$ and $A$. English was at an outstanding $71 \%$ and Maths at 60\%.

However, the College is particularly delighted with the excellent progress the students have made since joining at the age of 11, which means a high number of students have achieved their personal best!

The number of students gaining $\mathrm{A}^{*}$ and A's across all subjects was really excellent and bucks the national trend. An impressive
 number of students also gained Distinction* awards for our BTEC vocational courses. In other subjects, Triple Science and Drama results were outstanding and a notable $100 \%$ of Further Maths students passed with $\mathrm{A}^{*}$ - C.


This year there was an international feel for some of the subjects taken. Three students took GCSE Greek, two studied and excelled in Polish and one in Russian. The College also welcomed Astrid
 Moritz from Germany who joined the College for just 1 year and gained $10 A^{*}$ - C grades including an $A^{*}$ in German!


Ms Pritchard, Headteacher, added, "We are really pleased with these excellent results. We have introduced some very structured testing and monitoring regimes, which has ensured that every student understands exactly where they need to be so they can reach their full potential. We have also adapted some of the learning models from our "More Able and Talented" programme and again this has added great value across the whole curriculum. I would like to thank all the students and their families for all their support and commitment and wish
 them well as they say goodbye!".

Across the year, we have awarded literally thousands of achievement points, presented countless bronze, silver and gold certificates, enjoyed celebration pizza lunches and Ms Pritchard has met with students from all Year
 Groups to present Headteacher Commendations.

Charity events have raised thousands of pounds for local, national and international causes; so many of our young people give up their time to help others, from sports coaching, supporting Brownies or Guides groups to charity fundraising. We can't forget our intrepid Morrocan explorers who spent long, hard hours building a school playground during their half-term holiday.


## A VISIT TO BRISTOL HARBOUR



On Thursday $6^{\text {th }}$ October, Year 11 Art and Photography students will be visiting the historic docks at Bristol.

Bristol harbour was one of the most important dock areas in Britain until the mid-20 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Century, and provides a wealth of interesting sights to inspire our students as they work on their practise exams. Students will be sketching and photographing the historic buildings, boats, cranes and trains, as well as exploring the many newer developments that have transformed the harbour in recent years. They will also be able to see public artworks and exhibitions in the Arnolfini gallery, and the displays in the M-Shed museum.

With so many exciting and diverse opportunities to gather information and observations, every student will be able to find something exciting to explore. We expect each student to return from the trip with a distinctive set of images, which they can develop into a personal artwork, which will add great value to their GCSE coursework.
 teams of three Year 8 female students entering the "Sharp Shotz" competition for 2016 has won with their film on tackling exam stress, this film has now been produced by the BBC, UWE students and local charity IDEAL.

Having had family members struggle through the important exam period, this topic stood out above the others in the brain storming stage for the girls.

They were also conscious of the new examination requirements of $100 \%$ final exam and the proximity of their exams.

The ChildLine National Exam Stress Survey revealed that $96 \%$ of the 1300 who completed the survey felt anxious about exams and revision, with $59 \%$ feeling pressure from their parents to do well and $64 \%$ saying they have never received any support in dealing with exams.

Not having techniques to deal with these stresses means that young people may turn to drink, drugs and self-harm as negative ways of coping with examinations. The film, "Don't Stress, It's Pointless", follows the story of one female student who, at hearing of an upcoming examination, struggles with her anxiety which results in a panic attack. A real life interview with a NHS school nurse provides strategies and relief for the young person. The girls who created the film wanted to firstly offer support to those who are struggling with these issues and also to start discussions based around the inclusion of strategies to the National Curriculum.

The launch of the film was on Wednesday $13^{\text {th }}$ July 2016 at The Watershed in Bristol.

## A Weston teen's battle to help the town's homeless - one photo at a time



17-year-old Weston student is on a mission to change society's perception of homeles medium of photography Rhys Davies is a second-year photography student at Weston College.
He decided to combine his studies with a desire to help people by publicly exhibiting 'before-andafter' photos of homeless people in Weston town centre, to show how their enotions offort to chat to people make the effort to
them and offer support.
Rhys, who is preparing to go to university, told the Mercury he has university, told the Mercury he has
been helping homeless people since he was a child and decided to begin documenting the issue through photography last year.
He said: "I am highly passionate about photography and documenting the world through pictures.
"My main ambition is to show the public how homeless people are not a burden to society. As part of his project, Rhys approached various homeless
people in Weston town centre to see people in Weston town centre to see
if they were happy to be included if they were
in his work.
Once he gained their trust be would sit and chat with them before offering the person help kindness and a listening ear:
Rhys said: "I would ask the homeless person if it would be alright to photograph them and I would explain that I am trying to document how they feel and what they think society thinks of them.

"I would then sit down and speak to them, making them feel wanted and not an outsider, me. I would then offer them food, drink and some money if they wished.
"As I started to leave them I would ask to take another portrait of them and ask them to demonstrate how they felt now, to get a before-and-
after receiving some help and a conversation.
"I want to show people how something so little can mean so much to someone they can make to someone." to someone.
Rhys photos were unveiled to his friends and family at a public exhibition earlier this year, where his board was hailed as the exhibition's top piece of work by college lecturers.
He said: "I completed my first year with a distinction and was awarded best exhibition board, but it was all thanks to my three tutors, Paul French, Jamie DormerDurling and Mary Pearson. "They guided me and told me to follow my passion."

Rhys spotted Nou Nou outside Peacocks, in Regent Street. He said: "Nou Nou is 40 years old and used to be a head chef. "He divorced his wife, lost his job and then couldn't afford to pay his rent, so everything started going downhill.
"The life advice I received from Nou Nou was not to look down on someone unless you're helping them up.
Rhys also met 29 -year-old mother Stacey, who broke down when asked to share her story. explain any stacey didn't want
became homeless after being a
full-time mum, so I bought her some lunch and advised her about some local shelters. "She told me to always value life and stay grateful for everything you have." The last person Rhys met in
Weston was 46 -year-old Tony, who
wanted to be known as Taffy. wanted to be known as Taffy.

Rhys said: "He told me his wife had an affair and took everything he had, including the kids. He then couldn't find work, so he ran out of money for rent and ended up homeless. "Taffy said 'don't regret anything, take your chances when you can and enjoy life when it's good'."
