The Thinking School

•Learning happens when you think hard•

At King Harold Academy learning is fundamental to everything we do and we want every single one of our students to demonstrate the skills needed to be highly effective learners, such as resilience, independence and risk taking. That is why we are a Thinking School.

We firmly believe that struggle is a key part of long term memory. Our teachers will encourage our students to be critical friends and offer praise and constructive feedback through peer assessment of work, as well as regular written feedback that students will respond to in order to help them progress. This is based on cutting edge educational research regarding what has the greatest impact on learning.

Lessons at King Harold Academy are innovative, creative and challenging. They regularly involve randomised questioning, keeping all students engaged and involved in the learning, often through methods such as beach-balls,

lollypops sticks or random name generators. Teachers give students 'think time' before accepting answers to questions, they encourage peer-to-peer tuition, collaborative learning and meta-cognition to get students thinking about their learning because learning happens when you think hard.

Their Voice

We believe that students should have every opportunity to have a voice within our Academy and we offer opportunities for them to become role models and young leaders.

Student Leadership Team: A group of year 11 students lead by our Head Boy and Girl play a key role in the life of the school and are true ambassadors for our academy. Representing the academy at key events in our calendar, carrying out duties and leading the Student Council meetings for every year group.

Student Council members: Representatives from all year groups meet and their focus is centred around creating new and exciting ways to learn and to become actively involved in the classroom,

suggesting ideas for rewards and celebration, and how to further our involvement in the local community.

Subject Ambassadors: Every subject has two students from our lower and upper year groups. They work with the subject staff to suggest inspirational ideas for displays, to discuss how they best learn and lead clubs.

Admissions

King Harold Academy admits 180 students in year 7. All year 7, September entry admissions are handled by the Local Education Authority and we adhere strictly to our admissions policy as follows:

- Looked after pupils will be given first priority ahead of all other applications;
- Pupils living in the priority admissions area of the school with a sibling attending at the time of application and admission;
- Other pupils living in the priority admissions area;
- Pupils living outside the priority admissions area with a sibling attending at the time of application and admission;
- Remaining applications.

Child Protection Policy

King Harold Academy takes seriously its responsibility to protect and safeguard the welfare of students in our care.

We adhere to all the current legislation and guidance when executing our duty of care.

The designated person at King Harold Academy is Miss Gibbs, supported by Mr Freeborn, Assistant Headteacher.

Any adult within the school that has reason to suspect that a child may be at risk or may be suffering from abuse has a statutory duty to report this immediately to the designated person.

Careers and Work Related Learning

Careers is an essential part of your child's preparation for the future and our aim is to ensure all students are able to make an informed choice for their future learning and careers.

As part of this preparation our students are offered planned career lessons from year 7 to year 11; at key stage 3 we focus on skills and interests, so that students may begin careers exploration. During key stage 4 students have the opportunity to take part in work experience placements and industry days with local employers.

Mrs Hammond, Head of Careers, is a qualified Careers Adviser and all students have access to the Careers Department and library. In year 11 students are offered an impartial careers interview. We encourage our students to achieve success at every level in preparation for when they leave King Harold Academy.



Support For All

King Harold Academy has high expectations for all. We understand that some students require additional support and this is provided both in the classroom by teachers adapting the learning and with additional adult guidance with our teaching assistants. We also have small group teaching

We have a Pupils Additional Learning Suite which is dedicated to supporting students who need extra time and more specialist support to ensure that they achieve their potential.

King Harold believes that working closely with parents can be key to unlocking the success for our students. Full discussions with our parents are important and working together is vital for the well- being and success of every child.


