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Le Régent Crans-Montana College is a British International boarding and day IB World school in the Swiss Alps town of Crans-Montana, for children aged 4-18. It is governed by four school principles: COURTESY, COMPASSION, CREATIVITY and COURAGE.

- leave a lasting impression on our students so they feel the need, in their adult lives, to emulate the impact we, as a school, made on them.

CURRICULUM

From Reception to Year 11, we teach a curriculum which is based on the British National Curriculum. It leads to GCSE and IGCSE. In the final 2 years (Years 12 and 13 – equivalents of American Grades 11 and 12) our students follow the IB Diploma Programme. Our curriculum is designed around our four founding principles because we do not just teach but we educate our students. It promotes critical thinking and creativity while providing the competencies necessary for lifelong learning and holistic development.

CO-CURRICULAR PROGRAMME

Our rich co-curricular programme is designed to provide students with opportunities to challenge themselves well beyond their comfort zones and experience a wide range of different activities. Amongst them are our iconic Long Expeditions, which will never fail to leave our students with a lasting sense of accomplishment while building their resilience and character.

PASTORAL/BOARDING LIFE

Our first aim is to ensure that all our students are well-cared for and confident that they will find the help and support they might need at any time. Most students will take 9 (I)GCSEs. The school reserves the right to withdraw a subject if insufficient interest renders the teaching unviable.

The IB Diploma Programme is made up of the Diploma Programme Core and six subject groups. Students choose three subjects at Standard Level (SL) and three subjects at Higher Level (HL), one from each subject group. It is possible to study a second subject from Group 2, 3 or 4. Each subject (at HL and SL) is worth a maximum of 7 points, and the Core is worth a further 3 points, making a total of 45 points. To pass the Diploma, students must gain at least 24 points.

Group 2 - LANGUAGE ACQUISITION

Group 3 - INDIVIDUALS & SOCIETIES

Group 4 - SCIENCES

Sibling Discount: There is a 10% discount for the second (or subsequent) child in a family.

Registration Fee: A one-time non-refundable registration fee is required when the application form is submitted.

Deposit: On acceptance of a place, a deposit of 7,000 CHF is required, which will be refunded after the student leaves the school if proper notice is given and the account has been settled in full. In the case of a cancellation of an enrolment prior to entry, the deposit is not refunded.

Uniform: There is a one-time initial clothing charge for the standard school clothing and uniform.

Health Insurance: All students are required to join our compulsory health insurance scheme unless they are already covered by a comprehensive Swiss health insurance policy. The premium for students varies according to age from CHF 2,400-3,000. Rates are set by the insurance company and may increase during the academic year. Students from their 19th birthday pay full adult rates.

Pocket Money: Weekly pocket money (boarders) is charged in advance (Years 1-8=20; Year 9=30; Year 10=40; Year 11=60 CHF) Year 12 and 13 boarding students may open a supervised bank account or or receive : Year 12 = 80, Year 13 = 100 CHF

- Loan of text books (some may need to be bought)
- Use of the school library, computer network, and other school resources
- Laundry (for boarders only) but not dry-cleaning
- Pastoral care and tutoring
- Ski pass

APPLICATION PROCESS

1. MAKE INITIAL ENQUIRY

This can be done by either emailing **admissions@leregentscollege.com**, filling in the contact form on the website or calling through to Admissions on **+41 (0)27 480 32 02**.

2. COMPLETE THE APPLICATION PROCESS

- Application Form
- Medical Form (signed by the child's doctor)
- Registration Fee (non-returnable) of CHF 1,000
- Child's school reports for the previous 18 or 24 months
- A confidential letter of recommendation from the applicant's headteacher
- Eight passport photographs according to Swiss government regulations (please check for specifications)
- A **colour** copy of the child's passport (only the main page(s) required)
- A copy of the candidate's birth certificate (only the main page(s) required)

3. THE VISIT

Visit Le Régent Crans Montana College with your child for an interview with the Head Master and Director of Admissions.

4. ENTRANCE TESTS

These are usually arranged on the same day as the interview.

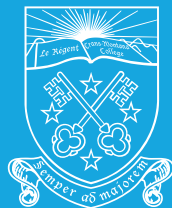
5. DEPOSIT

If a place is offered and accepted, an enrolment deposit of CHF 7,000 is required (non-returnable in case of cancellation) and final enrolment papers will be sent for signature.

6. SWISS STUDENT VISA

Non-European candidates will need to apply for a Swiss Student Visa. The latest date for this process is May as visas take 2-3 months to be issued and children cannot legally commence their studies without a valid visa.
