



DURHAM JOHNSTON APPRAISAL 2018-2019

From September 2014 ALL teachers' pay progression is dependent upon meeting the Teacher Standards and successful appraisal. There will be NO AUTOMATIC INCREMENTS based on experience after September 2013.

Therefore, for the appraisal cycle which begins in the autumn term 2017, you need to use the following:

1. Read the **Teachers' Standards 2012**. **All teachers must meet all of these standards**. Use them to prepare for your appraisal meeting in September. Go through it on your own, reflecting on the past year. You and your appraiser will discuss it and may use your comments to help you identify your next objectives.
2. If you are on, or aspire to the upper pay scale, read the **Post-Threshold Standards: all UPS teachers must meet all of these standards**. Consider this as well as the Teachers' Standards if you intend to apply for progression to UPS so that you assess yourself at the right level and set suitable objectives.

Department for Education Teachers' Standards 2012

PREAMBLE

Teachers make the education of their pupils their first concern, and are accountable for achieving the highest possible standards in work and conduct. Teachers act with honesty and integrity; have strong subject knowledge, keep their knowledge and skills as teachers up-to-date and are self-critical; forge positive professional relationships; and work with parents in the best interests of their pupils.

PART ONE: TEACHING; A teacher must:

1 Set high expectations which inspire, motivate and challenge pupils

- establish a safe and stimulating environment for pupils, rooted in mutual respect
- set goals that stretch and challenge pupils of all backgrounds, abilities and dispositions
- demonstrate consistently the positive attitudes, values and behaviour which are expected of pupils.

2 Promote good progress and outcomes by pupils

- be accountable for pupils' attainment, progress and outcomes
- be aware of pupils' capabilities and their prior knowledge, and plan teaching to build on these
- guide pupils to reflect on the progress they have made and their emerging needs
- demonstrate knowledge and understanding of how pupils learn and how this impacts on teaching
- encourage pupils to take a responsible and conscientious attitude to their own work and study.

3 Demonstrate good subject and curriculum knowledge

- have a secure knowledge of the relevant subject(s) and curriculum areas, foster and maintain pupils' interest in the subject, and address misunderstandings
- demonstrate a critical understanding of developments in the subject and curriculum areas, and promote the value of scholarship
- demonstrate an understanding of and take responsibility for promoting high standards of literacy, articulacy and the correct use of standard English, whatever the teacher's specialist subject
- if teaching early reading, demonstrate a clear understanding of systematic synthetic phonics
- if teaching early mathematics, demonstrate a clear understanding of appropriate teaching strategies.

4 Plan and teach well structured lessons

- impart knowledge and develop understanding through effective use of lesson time
- promote a love of learning and children's intellectual curiosity
- set homework and plan other out-of-class activities to consolidate and extend the knowledge and understanding pupils have acquired
- reflect systematically on the effectiveness of lessons and approaches to teaching
- contribute to the design and provision of an engaging curriculum within the relevant subject area(s).

5 Adapt teaching to respond to the strengths and needs of all pupils
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • know when and how to differentiate appropriately, using approaches which enable pupils to be taught effectively • have a secure understanding of how a range of factors can inhibit pupils' ability to learn, and how best to overcome these • demonstrate an awareness of the physical, social and intellectual development of children, and know how to adapt teaching to support pupils' education at different stages of development • have a clear understanding of the needs of all pupils, including those with special educational needs; those of high ability; those with English as an additional language; those with disabilities; and be able to use and evaluate distinctive teaching approaches to engage and support them.
6 Make accurate and productive use of assessment
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • know and understand how to assess the relevant subject and curriculum areas, including statutory assessment requirements • make use of formative and summative assessment to secure pupils' progress • use relevant data to monitor progress, set targets, and plan subsequent lessons • give pupils regular feedback, both orally and through accurate marking, and encourage pupils to respond to the feedback.
7 Manage behaviour effectively to ensure a good and safe learning environment
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • have clear rules and routines for behaviour in classrooms, and take responsibility for promoting good and courteous behaviour both in classrooms and around the school, in accordance with the school's behaviour policy • have high expectations of behaviour, and establish a framework for discipline with a range of strategies, using praise, sanctions and rewards consistently and fairly • manage classes effectively, using approaches which are appropriate to pupils' needs in order to involve and motivate them • maintain good relationships with pupils, exercise appropriate authority, and act decisively when necessary.
8 Fulfil wider professional responsibilities
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • make a positive contribution to the wider life and ethos of the school • develop effective professional relationships with colleagues, knowing how and when to draw on advice and specialist support • deploy support staff effectively • take responsibility for improving teaching through appropriate professional development, responding to advice and feedback from colleagues • communicate effectively with parents with regard to pupils' achievements and well-being.

PART TWO: PERSONAL AND PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

A teacher is expected to demonstrate consistently high standards of personal and professional conduct. The following statements define the behaviour and attitudes which set the required standard for conduct throughout a teacher's career.

- Teachers uphold public trust in the profession and maintain high standards of ethics and behaviour, within and outside school, by: treating pupils with dignity, building relationships rooted in mutual respect, and at all times observing proper boundaries appropriate to a teacher's professional position
- having regard for the need to safeguard pupils' well-being, in accordance with statutory provisions
- showing tolerance of and respect for the rights of others not undermining fundamental British values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect, and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs ensuring that personal beliefs are not expressed in ways which exploit pupils' vulnerability or might lead them to break the law.
- Teachers must have proper and professional regard for the ethos, policies and practices of the school in which they teach, and maintain high standards in their own attendance and punctuality.
- Teachers must have an understanding of, and always act within, the statutory frameworks which set out their professional duties and responsibilities.

The Standards for the Upper Pay Range (formerly known as the Post-threshold Standards)

In order to progress ONTO the upper pay scale, teachers must apply to be assessed against the following standards. To progress UP the UPR, all the following standards should be met.

Teachers on the UPR must be judged against the Teachers Standards 2012 as well as the following.

1	Contribute significantly, where appropriate, to implementing workplace policies and practice and to promoting collective responsibility for their implementation.
2	Have an extensive knowledge and understanding of how to use and adapt a range of teaching, learning and behaviour management strategies, including how to personalise learning to provide opportunities for all.
3	Have an extensive and well-informed understanding of the assessment requirements and arrangements for the subjects and curriculum areas they teach, including those related to public examinations and qualifications.
4	Have an up-to-date knowledge and understanding of the different types of qualifications and specifications and their suitability for meeting learners' needs.
5	Have a more developed knowledge and understanding of their subjects and curriculum areas and related pedagogy including how learning progresses within them.
6	Have sufficient depth of knowledge and experience to be able to give advice on the development and well-being of children and young people.
7	Be flexible, creative and adept at designing learning sequences within lessons and across lessons that are effectively and consistently well-matched to learning objectives and the needs of learners and which integrate recent developments, including those related to subject and curriculum knowledge.
8	Have teaching skills which lead to learners achieving well relative to their prior attainment, making progress as good as, or better than, similar learners nationally.
9	Promote collaboration and work effectively as a team member
10	Contribute to the professional development of colleagues through coaching and mentoring, demonstrating effective practice and providing advice and feedback.
