Ofsted – Outstanding (December 2011)

'Southend High School for Girls is an outstanding school. All aspects of the school's work are excellent and the great majority of parents, carers and students are extremely pleased with the quality of education and the care, guidance and support it provides.' (OFSTED)

Southend High School for Girls is a girl's Selective grammar school based at the eastern side of Southend. There are currently 1,187 students in the top 26% of the ability range. 180 girls are admitted into year 7 annually. There are 317 students in the mixed sixth form.

The School was founded in 1913 and moved to the present site in 1957. The buildings are situated in beautiful grounds which include tennis courts, hockey pitches, a football pitch and facilities for athletics. Within school facilities include 10 laboratories, over 500 computers, a sports hall; with fitness suite, an art and technology block, a well-stocked library, sixth form block and specialist facilities for media, music, drama and dance. A significant new build of eight classrooms opened in October 2018 which houses geography and English.

'The curriculum is innovative in providing an outstanding range of opportunities to ensure students study the subjects they want, and have enrichment activities that widen their experiences.' (OFSTED)

The senior team was delighted when one of the Ofsted inspectors said "the school is at the forefront of innovation". Year 7 have a 'flexible Friday' every other week when they concentrate on one topic for a whole day. For example, they learn about a medieval village by enacting it with lord and knight and peasants. We create similar curriculum days for all year groups on a less regular basis. This facilitates group learning and teamwork and develops the students' abilities to articulate their ideas. All students take two languages at KS3 and at least one language to GCSE. The majority of students take triple science at GCSE. At A' level the school offers over twenty subjects.

'Teaching is excellent, never less than good and effective in promoting outstanding progress and sustained high levels of achievement.' (OFSTED)

The School has a long and well-established tradition of academic excellence. It is one of the most successful schools in Southend; regularly in the top 100 state schools nationally. The majority of our students are retained into the sixth form and after A' levels go on to Higher Education, mostly to the best universities and colleges.

We believe that our bright students have the right to the best teaching: teaching and learning are our core purpose. There is a strong commitment to CPD for all staff in the school; there is rigorous training for Trainee Teachers and NQTs as well as opportunities at middle management level. Teachers are well supported by accomplished associate staff.

The school has an extensive outreach programme. It facilitates primary PE events and has a Fronter (VLE) ambassador on the staff. We also lead on innovative work in maths across the Borough. We have a tradition of dialogue with and support of other schools. In September 2014 became an accredited ITT Provider and runs the Southend SCITT.

'The range of out of school activities is excellent and extremely well supported by students.' (OFSTED)

Education here extends well beyond examinations. There are numerous and challenging opportunities for students: the engineering scheme, World Challenge, project work in Vietnam, maths challenge, exchange trips, visits to theatres, concerts, lectures and art galleries. The School is regularly in the finals of the National Athletics and Cross Country. The athletics team has represented England, four times in recent years, at the World School Games. About 125 girls take instrumental lessons and drama and music play a central role in the life of the school. Most year 9 students take their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award. Some progress to Silver and Gold. The School has been awarded the coveted International Award four times, which acknowledges the extensive work done in the curriculum to promote international understanding. Students also take Arts Awards at bronze, silver and gold levels.

We have also gained the Healthy Eating Award, Eco-school status and Arts Mark Gold.

'Pastoral arrangements are outstanding and class tutors have exceptionally good relationships with their students.' (OFSTED)

SHSG is known for its pastoral care and has a reputation as a happy school. There is a strong pastoral system with a Learning Manager responsible for each year group. In addition, there is a House system which encourages students to take responsibility and work for others. The school raises over £10K a year for charity.

The School has always aimed to help young people develop independent, open minds, curiosity and a keen sense of responsibility. We want them to relish their learning and their experiences, to attain a very good education and to have the resilience and strength of character to enjoy a fulfilling life and contribute to their community.



Southend High School for Girls Curriculum Information

AIMS

Southend High School for Girls is a selective school and aims in its curriculum to develop its students to their full potential to enable them to become responsible, active members of society and to lay the foundations for lifelong learning.

The School aims to provide a broad, balanced curriculum which will stimulate and challenge students to achieve their best and which will instill intellectual curiosity and a love of learning. The curriculum is enriched by an international dimension and an awareness of other cultures.

11-16 CURRICULUM

At Key Stage 3 students study subjects in the National Curriculum. Students undertake an accelerated (2 year) Key Stage in years 7 & 8. The curriculum is also enhanced by the study of German or Spanish and drama.

At Key Stage 4 students will undertake courses leading to GCSE examinations in at least nine subjects. A range of subjects is offered including Business Studies, Media Studies, Drama, and Physical Education.

All students follow a Religious Studies programme of study leading to either Full or Short Course GCSE.

In PE students have the opportunity to complete a Sports Leader award and in art the opportunity to complete the Arts Award.

The PSHCEE programme addresses issues of personal development, cross-curricular issues, citizenship, economic education and study skills.

There is a programme of careers education and guidance. Students are prepared for the world of work through the careers and PSHCEE programmes, enrichment days, certain aspects of the taught curriculum and through work experience.

Year 7 are not timetabled for lessons one day per fortnight and participate in cross-curricular activities on or off site.

Students in Years 8 & 9 take part in cross-curricular themed days throughout the year.

DIFFERENTIATION

Individual students' strengths and weaknesses are identified by the use of data as well as performance in the classroom and through homework. These inform planning for teaching and learning. Students are formally assessed at regular intervals and information shared with parents via SIMs.

"Groups" are monitored and interventions are applied where necessary. The progress of Pupil Premium children is monitored throughout the year. Impact and funding are evaluated annually. Form tutors discuss progress with tutees throughout the year on a rolling programme, using information from termly assessments. Departmental schemes of work identify tasks and assessments for students of different levels of ability, together with strategies for supporting weaker students and extending the more able.

Schemes of work are regularly reviewed.

Support may take the form of help from a sixth-form student, mentoring sessions, differentiated tasks, Individual Action Plans, use of "maths angels", lunch time open houses or peer mentoring.

ACADEMICALLY MOST ABLE STUDENTS

The School aims to ensure that the most able students are identified, that appropriate provision is made for them in class and in extra-curricular activities and that they have the opportunity to work with students of similar ability.

Students are identified by departments. Students who show advanced social skills or leadership qualities are identified by Learning Managers and form tutors. Students who may be underachieving are identified by the use of data. A register is kept of AMA students. This is made available to staff. AMA students are challenged by opportunities to engage in higher-order tasks, to work independently and creatively in class and at home.

Opportunities and appropriate resources for extension and enrichment are identified in schemes of work.

A wide variety of extra- curricular activities is provided to challenge and stimulate.

The AMA coordinator has oversight of provision and liaises with the SLT line-manager and the named AMA Governor.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR OPPORTUNITIES

There are numerous opportunities to broaden students' experiences through a variety of clubs, visits and exchanges abroad, speakers, field trips, sporting activities, choirs, orchestras, wind band, jazz band, concerts, theatre trips, Flexible Fridays, Insight into Industry days, Insight into Management and Culture days, Sixth form Induction and special activity days for year groups.

SPIRITUAL AND MORAL DEVELOPMENT

This is achieved through:

- a) A programme of assemblies which encourages the involvement of students
- b) The Religious Studies course
- c) Aspects of the PSHCEE programme
- d) Students involvement in charity work through the House system
- e) The ethos of the school which emphasises care for the individual, respect for others and personal responsibility
- f) Incorporation of British Values in the life of the school

GROUPING

On entry in Year 7 students are placed in 6 mixed ability tutor groups. In the autumn term of Year 7 students are organised into sets for mathematics. In Year 8 students are placed in sets for Mfl.

POST 16 CURRICULUM

Students are offered a wide range of academic courses leading to A Level qualifications. Some ab initio courses are offered. Students have the opportunity to achieve the EPQ.

There is a full PSHE programme, which includes cross-curricular issues, citizenship, careers guidance and work shadowing.

Students have the opportunity to take part in community work and sporting activities. They have the opportunity to complete the Sports Leader award.

Students are prepared for the world of work through the careers and PSHCEE programmes, enrichment days, certain aspects of the taught curriculum, work experience, work shadowing and community work.

Southend High School for Girls, Safe Recruitment Procedure

Southend High School for Girls is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and young people. In order to meet this responsibility, the academy follows a rigorous selection process to discourage and screen out unsuitable applicants. This process is outlined below, but can be provided in more detail if requested.

Disclosure

This post is classified as having substantial access to children, and appointment is subject to an enhanced police check of previous criminal convictions (CRB). Applicants are required, before appointment, to disclose any conviction, caution or binding over including 'spent convictions' under the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 (Exemptions) Order 1975. Non-disclosure may lead to termination of employment. However, disclosure of a criminal background will not necessarily debar individuals from employment – this will depend upon the nature of the offence(s) and when they occurred.

Shortlisting

Only those candidates meeting the right criteria will be taken forward from application.

Interview

- 1. Shortlisted candidates will take part in an in-depth interview process including a lesson observation.
- 2. Candidates will be asked to address any discrepancies, anomalies or gaps in their application form.

Reference checking

References from the previous and current employer will be taken up for shortlisted candidates, and where necessary employers may be contacted to gather further information.

Probation

All new staff will be subject to a probation period of six months (which may, in certain circumstances, be extended by up to 10 weeks). The probation period is a trial period, to enable the assessment of an employee's suitability for the job for which they have been employed. It provides the academy with the opportunity to monitor and review the performance of new staff in relation to various areas, but also in terms of their commitment to safeguarding and relationships with pupils.
