Thank you for your interest in this part-time, fixed term position which arises due to the maternity leave of the current post holder. The ability to offer Government and Politics to A-Level is desirable but not essential. The post is fixed term from May 2019 until approximately the end February 2020.

A high value is placed on Humanities education in the school and resources are excellent. The faculty comprises 14 teachers and is committed to high standards of teaching and learning, with a wide range of teaching resources used. The faculty is well equipped with text books, audio-visual and ICT resources and is based in a newly-refurbished suite of classrooms. In addition to working as part of the Humanities faculty, the successful candidate is also likely to be a form tutor.

Humanities Faculty

The faculty has the following aims it wishes to achieve:

- 1. To foster an appreciation of people and the world they have created past, present and future.
- 2. To develop communication and intellectual skills.
- 3. To encourage pupils to take responsibility for their own learning.
- 4. To develop an awareness of the environment and how we must respect it.
- 5. To encourage an awareness that we live in a multi-cultural world and that each individual has the right to equal opportunities to live a happy, successful life.

The teaching staff currently consists of 14 - 10 full-time, 2 part-time and two assistant head's. The subject areas which come under the responsibility of the Head of Faculty are:

Geography & History KS3, GCSE and AS/A-Level

Psychology AS/A-Level
Sociology AS/A-Level
Government & Politics AS/A-Level
Criminology Level 3

The specifications taught for external examination are:

The teaching accommodation consists of eleven classrooms. Resources are stored separately for the respective subjects. There is also an ICT suite with 10 PCs. We have access to the school's networked computer facilities, including two banks of portable laptops and two banks of iPads, which are stored in our area. There is a range of Humanities software available for use. There is also a library of teaching materials available on DVD, stored in our central resources area and online.

Students are taught in mixed-ability groups at KS3. In the upper school, most students take either Geography or History and are taught in mixed ability groups for each subject. Many students currently study both subjects. This is a reflection of their continued popularity. A variety of teaching strategies are employed, particularly those based on active learning. The faculty teaches using differentiated schemes of work. We fully subscribe to the principles of Assessment for Learning.

The Humanities results at both GCSE and A Level are strong. In 2018, 41% of History students and 35% of Geography students achieved 9-7grades. 12 A Level Humanities students achieved A* grades.

At Sheldon we believe that there are many obvious links between all of the Humanities subjects in terms of philosophy, with human experience at the centre of our studies, and methodology, with emphasis being placed on enquiry and learning through experience.

By acting as a single unit, the faculty can give its component subjects a powerful voice in forums to discuss whole-school issues and more efficient administration and staffing is made possible. Common policies are agreed on a range of issues and the faculty meets regularly to discuss and share ideas. In particular, the faculty has a common system of assessment and recording, which aims to inform pupils, parents and teaching staff and greatly assist the monitoring of an individual student's progress and the process of setting. Consumable resources are shared and many of the team teach both Geography and History in the lower school, though most of a member of staff's teaching commitment will usually be in his/her main specialist area.

Whilst the staff work together as a single unit, Geography, History, Psychology, Government and Politics, Sociology and Criminology enjoy a considerable degree of individual integrity, retaining their autonomy. The teachers of each subject meet on a regular basis and operate as individual teams within the faculty structure.
