# Dear Parents,

It was lovely to welcome the children back to school last week after the Easter break. The weather felt like mid-summer and the children have been making the most of our school grounds. The school field has been prepared for our programme of summer sports and the children have enjoyed playing cricket and other games during their break times. The tennis courts have been busy with children practising their tennis skills and playing matches both in lessons and during their playtimes. The cricket nets are up and this week saw the first Home cricket fixture of the season.

There was great excitement in the Year 2 classroom last week with the hatching of some Bantams. The children had been carefully watching the eggs in the incubator over the last few weeks and the waiting was finally over. Using the wonders of modern technology, the Chick Cam went live and the whole school eagerly watched for signs of life. The chicks emerged from their shells to the great delight of the children and have been placed in a special brooder in the classroom this week. The rest of the school including the Nursery children, joined in the enjoyment; taking turns to see and hold the very newest members of our school community.

The benefits of teamwork have been evident in our classes this week with pupils working collaboratively within their classes.

Year 4 went off to the woods on Tuesday for a Mud Dragon Adventure. Each group of children were given instructions on how to sculpt part of a dragon out of mud. The groups had to actively listen to one another, articulate ideas and cooperate with each other. Finally it was only when every piece of the dragon came together that the groups realised they had made a complete Mud Dragon.

Working like this as a group or team within school can be very powerful for individuals; it can be the time for each child to shine and show others their skills and talents.

This was evident in the Year 5 assembly this week, which they wrote and produced collectively as a class. Every child had a distinct role and together they confidently presented an assembly on the theme of Skills and Talents; taking the form of "Battle Abbey's got Talent." After a varied programme of whale noises, guitar playing, singing and even a magic trick we soon discovered their hidden talents!

Year 2 have worked together collectively this year with their reading. The number of words read in their books has been totaled with every child contributing to the final number. Year 2 can officially say that they have now read over one million words collectively since the start of September, which is quite an achievement!

The Summer term at the Prep School promises to be wonderful with many events, activities and sporting fixtures planned over the next few weeks. Indeed the Prep pages of this week's newsletter show just what a very busy school we are. # Golf

130 Year 4 and Year 3 children from 13 local Primary Schools participated in the event at Cooden Beach Golf Club. The children were able to take part in a circuit of 8 different Tri Golf challenges, some involving chipping over short and longer distances and others involving the accuracy of their putting skills.

Each activity was scored over a 5 minute period to get accuracy points and then at the end the total of the 8 activities points were added together to get the final score.

Milo D, Kitty T, and Luke S excelled at the chipping whilst all the Year 3 showed good improvement of their putting skills as the morning progressed.

At the end of the 8 activities the Battle Abbey Prep Team scored 658 points, only 6 points less than the winning team. This was an excellent effort by all the children involved who received certificates to acknowledge their achievement.

It is effectively the Oxford or Cambridge of Art education and places on its Fine Art course are highly coveted. Competition for places is fierce and makes Ruby's deserved achievement all the more notable."





# An invitation to a dinner party in ancient Rome by William Ashenden and Nicky Bishop

'The first strange thing a time-traveller from today would notice about a Roman convivium (dinner party) is that everyone is lying down! Roman diners recline on couches around the table. In fact, the Roman name for a dining room is triclinium, which simply means "three couches". The fourth side of the table doesn't have a couch, so that slaves can bring and serve food from that side. Each of the couches holds up to three reclining diners, leaning on their left elbows with their head pointing at the table. The couch is made of criss-crossed leather straps supported on a wooden frame, with a wooden arm rest at one end. It looks so uncomfortable, but I suppose the Romans are used to it! The walls of the triclinium are decorated with murals, usually with food motifs.

An astonishing variety of food is served. Popular gustatii (starters) include salads, eggs, oysters, sardines, lentils and goats cheese. The prima mensa (main course) might be fish or meat. The Romans eat lot of game and an exotic variety of birds, including crane, ostrich and – for the very rich – peacock. They also enjoy larks tongues, dolphin, pig's udders, and dormice stuffed with pork and spices – yeuch! A lot of dishes use an intense fish sauce called liquamen, which is very similar to nam pla sauce used in Thai cooking. Dessert is usually fruit, nuts and cakes sweetened with honey (the Romans don't yet know about sugar). Diners drink wine mixed with water, which allows them to drink a lot without getting drunk. Their table manners are appalling: the diners just toss the bones and shells onto the floor! Another strange thing is that the host does not provide any napkins: guests have to bring their own! It is quite normal for guests to use their napkins to take away left-overs from the meal.

After the food, the drinking continues, while the diners play gambling games or there might be singer, actors or musicians to entertain them. If the main purpose of the dinner party is to gain influence in either business or politics, then this is the time for serious discussion with perhaps just some quiet background music. Some dinner parties go on for many hours, and some of the richest Romans host a dinner party every night. This is because upper-class Romans (known as patricians) love going to dinner parties, and not just for a free meal. They like socialising and meeting new people, and hearing the news brought by travelling strangers (yes, Romans often invite complete strangers to dinner!). And they love the opportunity to bend the ear of an influential politician or schmooze with someone who could help their business. But going to dinner parties is something only upper-class Romans can do. Ordinary Romans – who may not have any means of cooking for themselves in their cramped apartments – used to eat dinner in a thermopolum, which sold warm wine and a 'dish of the day' – the Roman equivalent of fast-food. Which would you choose?

### Cena Trimalchionis

The most famous Roman dinner party party – described in splendid detail by Petronius in his book Satyricon –was hosted by Trimalchio, a former slave who had become very wealthy. But although he had lots of money he had no class, and he entertained his guests with grotesque extravagance.

Trimalchio served 180-year old wine, which was wildly expensive but undrinkable. The first starter wass served off the back of a camel, and a later course was served from a life-size solid-silver skeleton. Two slaves carrying jugs came in having a violent quarrel; the jugs got broken in the fight and out poured oysters and scallops for the next course. A course of "eggs" arrived under a live hen, then the "eggs" – which turned out to be made of pastry – "hatched" and were found to contain whole baby chickens. Another course contained twelve different foods sculpted to look like the signs of the zodiac.

The main course of wild boar was brought in by a "huntsman" with a pack of hunting dogs; the boar was surrounded by "piglets" which turn out to be made of cake. The huntsman carved the meat in time with the music of the orchestra which had been playing throughout the meal, and a flock of real thrushes flew out from its belly! There were quinces that looked like sea urchins and a goose which turned out to be made from lard, while one of the "desserts" was made out of pork. Trimalchio's guests finally escaped at dawn!'

As part of their personal development programme they led an activity for the Year 7 class that involved solving clues to figure out a crime committed by one of the maths teachers!
