#WHITGIFTBEYONDTHECLASSROOM

During the last two weeks of term, Whitgift pupils engaged in a variety of stimulating learning experiences, with lessons and activities that went beyond the classroom.

Lower First and First Formers enjoyed a carousel of mask performance, circus skills and samba drumming, led by external facilitators. There were team-building activities including an Escape Room challenge and Global Citizenship Day. Other pupils learnt to storyboard, film, and edit in a fantastic filmmaking workshop under the guidance of a leading video production agency, Chocolate Films. They all thoroughly enjoyed taking their creativity, imagination and skills to the next level.

Second Form students participated in a two-day course on Sustainable Entrepreneurship which culminated in pupils modelling an idea for an eco-initiative with the company 8billionideas, who delivered the remote course 'Home Hack' last year. It was taught using a hybrid of Zoom broadcasts, on-site external facilitators and teachers.

The two-week celebration ended with Third Formers participating in a Model United Nations on 'Vaccinating the World', while other Third Form students followed on from their Home Hack course last year, performing a pitch for a sustainable business.

FINALIST AGAIN IN 2021

We are delighted to have been announced as a finalist for Independent Boys' School of the Year for the second consecutive year.

Organised by the publishers of Independent School Parent magazine, the finalists were announced on 7 September 2021 with the winners of each category, plus the overall Independent School of the Year, to be announced at a virtual awards ceremony held on Thursday 7 October 2021 at 3pm. The judging panel is chaired by Dr Helen Wright, an international education adviser and Former President of GSA and Vice-Chair of the Independent Schools Council who is supported by a panel including Headteachers and representatives of several professional associations in the education sector.

IB MEGA COURSE

Upper Sixth IB (International Baccalaureate) students marked the end of their assessments with a two-week Post-IB Activities *#MegaCourse*. The programme consisted of six themes: Culture Club, DIY, Future Prep, Get, Social and Volunteer.

'Culture Club' incorporated crash courses in dinner party conversation proficiency and presentations from profound external speakers, including Documentary Filmmaker and Movie Fan Extraordinaire, Kiran Acharya and Private Secretary for Parliamentary Affairs to the Prime Minister (1982-1986), Tim Flesher CB. Students wishing to learn a new language were also offered a crash course in Polish with Modern Languages Teacher, Ms Young.

'DIY' activities featured independent learning, where students were tasked with challenges to take time out

of their day to show their appreciation for nature such as planting a tree, contributing to the wildflower meadow, growing vegetables, reading books outdoors or feeding birds.

Students enjoyed a wide array of 'Future Prep' sessions on topics from applying for a job to travelling the world. Mr Burnside (Director of Sixth Form), Mr Morgan (Geography Teacher) and Miss Flood (IB Administrator) gave insightful talks on their experiences of travelling to various parts of the world for extended periods of time.

The 'Get' series aimed to provide students with some of the relevant skills needed to succeed in life. Courses included a Business Management session on turnover and profit with Whitgift's Director of Finance and Operations, Mr Godwin and a financial crash course on taxes, rent, and mortgages

with Assistant Head of Higher Education, Mr Van Dort.

The 'Social' activities were a highlight for many students. From singing workshops with accomplished chamber choir, Pegasus Choir, to beginner guitar sessions with Second in IB, Mr White, the students had a broad range of activities to participate in.

Finally, the theme of 'Volunteer,' involved a wealth of opportunities collated by Director of Partnerships & Community, Mr Marlow. Activities covered were primary school placements, an outdoor music recital for Whitgift House (local care home) residents and the opportunity to teach a lesson to other pupils.

The action packed *#MegaCourse* concluded with a much deserved *#MegaFeast* provided by the School's wonderful Catering Team, following an afternoon of

sports and games organised by the PE Department.

Headmaster, Mr Ramsey summarised, "These are all valuable activities and deserve new followers and future experts. But we do encourage them to come out of their comfort zones, to learn new things, to learn from failure, to learn to work with others, to learn about themselves."

The UK Linguistics Olympiad (UKLO) is a national competition in which students of any age or ability level are required to solve fiendishly difficult linguistics puzzles. Whitgift has been entering pupils into the UKLO since 2012. This year, 12 brave Whitgift pupils took part. Many of them are considering applying to read Languages at top universities.

CHEMISTRY OLYMPIAD

In January 2021, 28 students took part in a remotely invigilated Chemistry Olympiad paper after school. The Olympiad is designed to challenge and inspire students and is the leading Chemistry

competition in secondary education across the UK. Students taking part have an enriching opportunity to push themselves further in the Chemistry field.

14 Whitgift students achieved an award at either Bronze or Silver level and were given their certificates just before the Easter holidays. The School would like to congratulate all the students for participating in what is a very rigorous and challenging competition.

Head of Chemistry, Miss Herring commented, "With the competition being primarily aimed at Upper Sixth students it was excellent to see half of the awards being won by students in the Lower Sixth after just a term of study."

PHYSICS OLYMPIAD

The British Physics Olympiad (BPhO) encourages the study of physics, running annual competitions to recognise excellence in students across the



UK. Over the course of the Lent Term, budding physicists in the Fifth Form and Lower Sixth took part in the Intermediate Physics Challenge (Year 11) and Senior

Physics Challenge events (Year 12), respectively.

The students' enthusiasm and efforts were reflected in an impressive 16 Gold, 22 Silver and 1 Bronze award in the Intermediate Challenge. A special mention goes to Harvey Rendall (Fifth Form) who achieved Gold with a score of 38/40, placing him in the top 15 of almost 5,000 entries and putting him in the 0.3% nationally. Congratulations also to JinYingfan Cheng (Third Form), Si Ru Huang (Third Form) and Guanyu Wu (Fourth Form) for completing in the Year 11 category and achieving Silver.

In the Senior Physics Challenge 3 Gold, 9 Silver and 3 Bronze awards were achieved, with this event being completed as part of Whitgift's Physics Enrichment programme. Furthermore, subsequent to finishing in the top 100 nationally in the British Physics Olympiad round 1 event, Anant Gupta (Upper Sixth) was invited to take part in the ever more challenging round 2 event for a place on the British Physics Olympiad team.

Teacher of Physics, Mr Hanley commented, "Congratulations to our students on their success and hard work for these events, we are extremely proud of your achievements."

OXFORD GERMAN OLYMPIAD

Third Former, Oliver John's description of the mythical Alpine creature "der Wolpertinger" was selected as one of the joint winners for his age group in the prestigious Oxford German Olympiad, run and judged by professors and language specialists at the University of Oxford.

3 MODERN LANGUAGE GCSES



This year, seven Whitgift pupils sat three GCSE language qualifications each gaining 8 or 9 grades in all of them.

Congratulations to Daniel Aspandiarov (Chinese, German, Russian), Artem Boyarov (Chinese, German, Russian), Daniel Bronk-Navas (German, Japanese, Spanish), Eden Kong

(Chinese, German, Japanese), Thomas Faillenot (French, German, Spanish), Seb Rubio-Prida (French, German, Spanish) and Martin Van Domselaar (French, German, Spanish). A very

large number of our pupils also gained two GCSE languages with top grades.

Following on from this excellent news, three Sixth Form students had their Oxbridge places confirmed for Languages after excellent results: Gus Bradford (Spanish and Linguistics at Oxford), James Darsley (Japanese at Cambridge) and Eoin Finn (German and Spanish at Cambridge).

Head of Languages, Mr Hunt, puts the success in languages down to "Whitgift's strong ethos of international mindedness, dedicated teachers and language assistants, the extensive programme of trips and exchanges, and the innovative Languages curriculum which sees pupils start the First Form studying three distinct languages, rejecting textbook learning in favour of a more tailored and creative approach."

PEN PAL SCHEME

Senior Housemaster and Teacher of Spanish & French, Mr Morris started a pen pal scheme during lockdown for First Formers studying French. Whitgift students have been writing back and forth with students from a school in

Morez, North-East France; Collège Pierre Hyacinthe Cazeaux. This opportunity has allowed them to learn about different people, cultures and languages in a unique way while developing their writing skills in French.

The highlight of the week was the 'After Whitgift' Conference, where students were off timetable for two days as they heard from a range of speakers about their options at university and beyond as well as receiving important subject taster sessions from their teachers.

Whitgift's Director of Marketing and Communications, Mrs Ghumra led a session about 'How to create a great LinkedIn profile', while Economics & Business Studies Teacher, Mr Al-

She went on to express her gratitude to those involved in the TOK Exhibition; "I would like to thank Mr White and Ms Young for coordinating the Year 1 TOK course on 'knowing', 'the knower' and the relationships between knowledge, technology and politics with such assured expertise."

Hasso provided students with an insight into internships. Thank you to all the staff who created presentations, workshops, labs or training sessions, and to all the external speakers who have helped prepare our students for life beyond Whitgift.

Following the 'After Whitgift' Conference, around 70 Lower Sixth Form students participated in an Oxbridge Preparation Day, with an Oxbridge Dinner for current offer-holders in the Upper Sixth and OWs who are studying at Oxford or Cambridge.

The next presentation was by Roshan De Silva who explored 'To what extent can neurological treatments improve the symptoms and quality of life for Parkinson's patients?' Roshan intends on studying Medicine at University and his EPQ project is excellent preparation for this.

Tobias Trafford discussed his dissertation and how he narrowed down his topic to 'Are humans meant to be monogamous or polygamous?' Tobias did a fascinating presentation, exploring many different disciplines in his project.

The final presentation from Finlay Webb was slightly different to the others as it was an artefact project rather than a dissertation. An artefact project is where a student creates something based on the research they've gathered. Finlay created an intuitive musical composition, and his presentation was based on the idea 'Rhythm is a saucepan: are found sounds the lockdown answer?'

Well done to all the students who completed their EPQ projects during this challenging year. All of them have demonstrated excellent research and organisational skills.

THEORY OF KNOWLEDGE EXHIBITION

Whitgift's inaugural Theory of Knowledge (TOK) Exhibition took place on Thursday 24 June 2021 in Big School. TOK plays a special role in the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme, by providing an opportunity for students to reflect on the nature of knowledge, and on how we know what we claim to know. Sixth Form Celebrations

To celebrate the end of the Upper Sixth Form Transition Courses, Head of Lower First



Form & Maths Teacher, Miss Seal, kindly treated her Upper Sixth Maths class to a pizza lunch using her own pizza oven, while Head of Science, Mr Elliott, prepared a voluntary Pirate Science activity programme for A Level and IB pupils intending to study sciences at university.

Pirate Science Activity Programme

For the last two years, Whitgift has not been able to participate in the IB Group 4 Project – a

programme that required pupils to focus on group work, tight deadlines, active participation, accurate practical work and creative and effective presentation skills. Knowing the importance of this project and the expectations from many science courses, Mr Elliott prepared a voluntary mini-Group 4 project for any A Level and IB pupils intending to study sciences at university.

The theme was Pirate Science and in small groups, pupils were tasked with using science to explore one aspect that could help make someone a better pirate. They used investigative skills, carried out practical work to generate data and gathered evidence to support their claims. Finally, each group had to present their findings in a walkaround business style.

Curing infections on-board the ship, testing different sails, choosing the right wood for the ship, and building an effective cannon to blow others apart were some of the tasks pupils chose to investigate. Mr Elliott commented, "Pupils approached the task with energy and enthusiasm, especially given this was a voluntary programme."

Mr Elliott was extremely grateful for all the help and inspiration from the Science Technicians, the Drama Department for the props and the Maintenance Department for building the bow of the pirate ship – a perfect scene for the grand finale.

A special mention goes to the 'Beating Infection Crew' who were voted the winners. Mr Elliot expressed it was "a tightly fought contest" but more importantly, "in a time when so many things have been different, it was great to give pupils a vibrant experience of what we know science can be."

COMMUNITY SUMMER SCHOOL 2021

Funded by money raised by the 2020/21 Upper Sixth cohort and donations by their parents, 186 pupils from 20+ primary schools in the Croydon area visited Haling Park over the holidays for the second Whitgift Community Summer School. Enrichment lessons in Art, History, Philosophy, Geography and Economics as well as the core subjects of English, Maths and Science helped to stimulate academic progress, alongside building confidence by trying out a number of activities from the co-curricular programme.

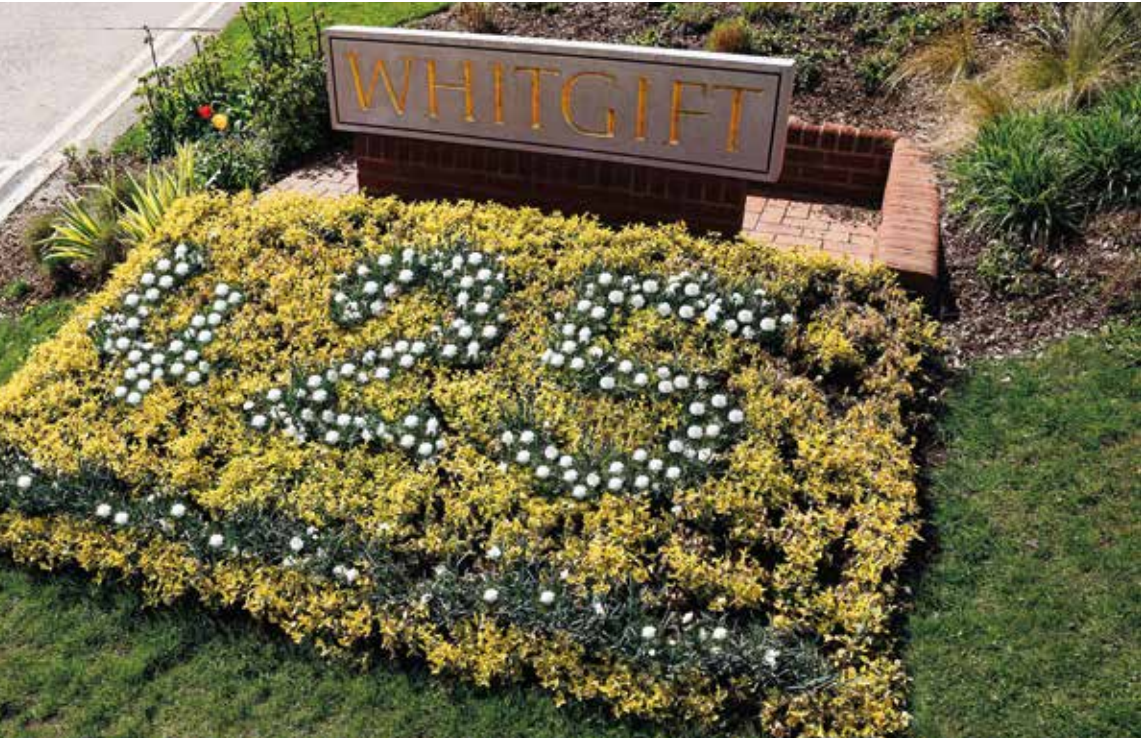
MARKING 425

In the Lent Term, under the direction of Miss Seal, a group of enthusiastic Lower First and First Form students created a radio play of *The Wardrobe*. Over 20 students were involved in rehearsing, writing the narrations and sourcing all the sound effects. As soon as Sound Technician, Mr Hill in the AV Department completed the editing, the play was shared across the School community.

Head of Lower First Form, Miss Seal added, "Students were keen to rehearse in their lunchtimes and after school and this is the fruits of their labour!"

Following the radio play's popularity, the Whitgift Community Audiobook was created which brought together nearly a hundred readers from across the community, and the local area, to perform Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's classic collection, *The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes*.

From enthusiastic young performers of nine and ten years old, to wise and experienced readers of over eighty, this buccaneering selection of tales were brought to life with energy and passion by pupils, staff and children from our Primary Project schools.

Director of Drama, Mr Hammond commented, "This Audiobook has provided us with the opportunity to join in collective storytelling."

EXAM RESULTS 2021



Whitgift's students have been celebrating exceptional GCSE, A Level and IB exam successes this summer. All grades were robustly and carefully calculated and reflect the work that both the students put in, and the members of staff who have ensured that they are well supported throughout their course studies.

Our 2020/21 Whitgift International Baccalaureate cohort achieved an average

of 41.6 points out of 45 – a success reached by just 12% of IB students globally – with three Whitgift IB students achieving the maximum score of 45/45.

Director of IB, Miss Mitchell commented, "We are so pleased for this year's cohort who have worked tremendously hard towards their final results. They have had a challenging few years, so this news is a very welcome reward, demonstrating their commitment."

Headmaster, Chris Ramsey added, "This has been a particularly tough year, so to have achieved these results is outstanding. IB results were not entirely teacher-assessed this year, and we are incredibly proud of these excellent students."

Meanwhile at A Level, 82% of grades were A*/A and nearly 90% of A Level students achieved grades for their first choice university.

Chris Ramsey, commented, "This year reflects a unique set of grade outcomes and given this backdrop, their hard work and perseverance, combined with support and dedication of their teachers has meant their results reflect their significant achievements. We wish every one of them luck as they pursue their chosen paths to university or apprenticeships."

93% of GCSE grades were 7,8 or 9 (equivalent to the old A/A*) and over 50% of grades awarded were a 9. We look forward to supporting many of our 2020/21 GCSE cohort as they move on to their Sixth Form careers at Whitgift in the Michaelmas Term.

A SUMMER OF CRICKET

Summer Cricket Course

In July 2021, Whitgift hosted two 2-day Summer Cricket Courses for participants between the ages of 9-12. The first of the 2-day courses welcomed 65 participants on our school site each day and the second course welcomed 45 participants each day. The course was available to both Whitgift and non-Whitgift students of all ability levels and genders.

Participants enjoyed a balance of both hard ball and soft ball activities. Morning sessions covered batting, bowling, fielding and agility drills, while the afternoons were reserved for mini-matches and game-based activities.

Whitgift's Academy Head Coach, Mr Jackson commented, "It was wonderful to welcome so many smiling young cricketers to sunny Northfield over the few days of the Camp. The displays of enthusiasm and skill levels were exciting. We hope to have as many as possible return as either future Whitgift School students or on our future cricket activity Camps."



ACE Cricket Programme

The ACE (African Caribbean Engagement) Academy is a charity designed to engage and offer young people of African and Caribbean heritage access to Cricket. Whitgift's Cricket Academy Head Coach, Mr Jackson has been part of this ground-breaking scheme since its inception in January 2020 as one of their lead coaches and mentors to U14s and U19s. During the Summer holidays, Whitgift hosted a 1-week residential camp for 21 male and female ACE cricketers from across the country and four additional ACE cricketers who came on site daily to join the group, with full use of sports and boarding facilities and full catering provided by Whitgift at no charge.

The programme covered grass nets, fielding sessions, an insightful presentation on 'Right Eye Vision', and even squeezed in some evening yoga. Despite the unsettled weather, players managed to enjoy several days of intense training, classroom sessions and match simulations.

The residential ended with two exciting T20s, with the ACE cricketers up against the Jackson Cricket XI team, which included current and OW cricketers. The Jackson Cricket XI won the first game with Whitgift 1st team player, Arjun Gill scoring a century. ACE XI won the second match of the day, top scoring with a half century. The games were streamed live on the Whitgift Sport YouTube channel and can be rewatched alongside many matches from the Whitgift School cricket season.

Mr Jackson commented, "All the participants and staff from ACE are extremely grateful for the opportunity to experience Whitgift's hospitality and facilities. The experiences gained and memories made by the players will last a very long time." Deputy in Boarding House, Mr Sherwin also added, "From my point of view, the passion, enthusiasm and unity of the group was awesome to see, and I have passed this onto them. The expectations they have of themselves and the trust between the players created a really

positive atmosphere throughout. I hope our connection with the programme continues to flourish!"

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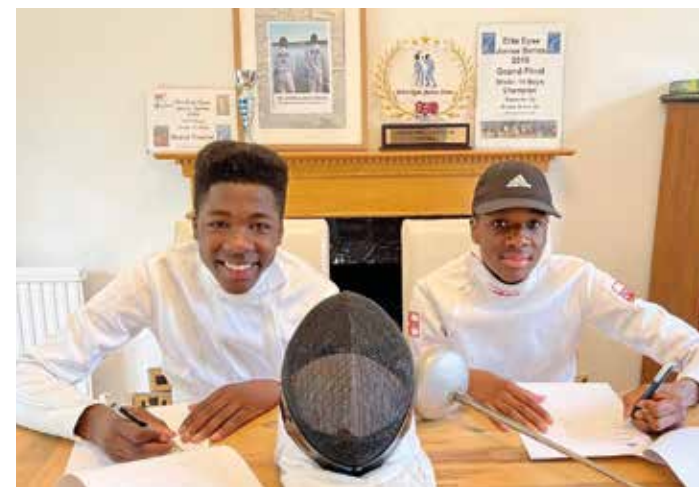
FENCING SUCCESS

Lent Singing Competition Final

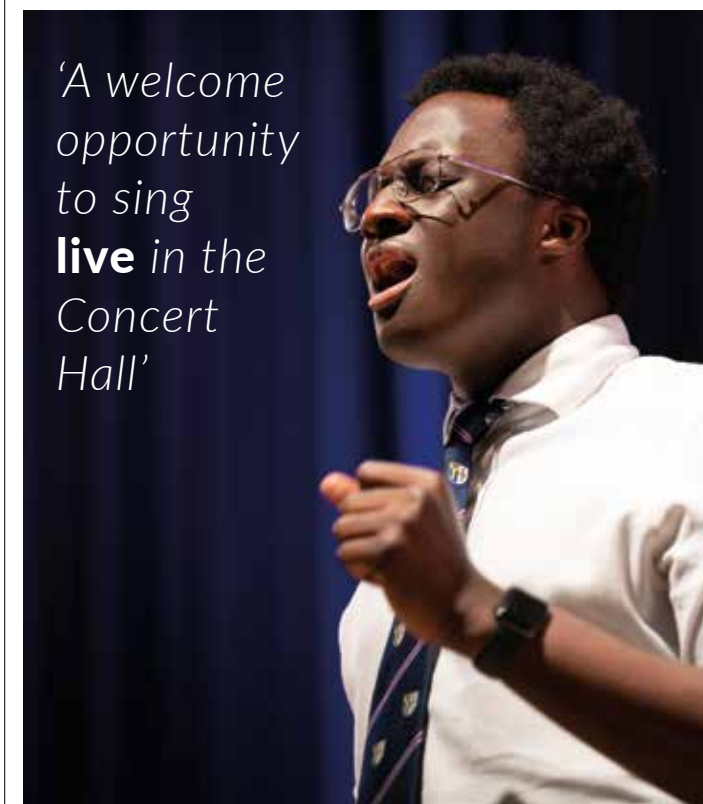

Whitgift mourns passing of esteemed Headmaster David Raeburn



In February 2021, it was with great sadness that we announced the death of David Raeburn, Headmaster of Whitgift from 1970-1991.

David was held in very high esteem by very many of his former pupils and colleagues, of whom a small number are still here at Whitgift; many others followed him into teaching and indeed Headship.

In his time, David expanded the school, overseeing the building of the science and design buildings; his close concern for and regard for pupils was evident throughout his life and retirement. During his last illness, many past students have written to Mr Ramsey to share their personal gratitude to him.

In 2018, at a Class of 78 reunion where David was guest of honour, one OW said of him, "Whitgift in the 1970s had an ethos that espoused the best values of Western civilisation, such as tolerance and mutual respect, and that came, I think, from David Raeburn." That observation was met with universal approval by all those in attendance. Francis Charig OW (1970-1978) wrote of the same event "The level of affection for

him [David] was a remarkable endorsement of the respect with which he is held and recognition of the rounded, liberal and ethical education that he sought for his students."

David had a distinguished career beyond Whitgift; after retirement he spent almost as many years tutoring Classics at New College, Oxford. Last summer, he recorded a piece from Ovid's Metamorphoses reflecting that 'sad times may be followed by happier days...'

We pay proper tribute to David's long and successful Headship at a memorial service in September 2021.

Whitgift mourns the loss of Head of History and Politics



In April 2021, we were deeply saddened to report the death in Maidstone Hospital of Keith Smith, Head of History and Politics, after a brave battle with cancer. He had been Head of History and Politics for many years, and a greatly loved colleague at Whitgift since the 1980s.

Current and former Whitgiftians will have known him for his leadership of the CCF, Fencing, his Housemastership and his wonderful teaching and mentoring.

JOHN O'GROATS TO LAND'S END

In June 2021, Upper Sixth Formers set themselves a challenge to complete the distance of John O'Groats to Land's End in the gym, all within one school day, in aid of the Whitgift Community Summer School (WCSS) fund.
