


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A message from the Head...

Dear School Community


















7/8HA




7/8LC Art






9CP trip to Disport

Each student took part in one track and one field event competing as an individual against other students from St. Hugh's as well as students from other local schools. Everyone in 9CP thoroughly enjoyed the event with some excellent individual achievements – in particular two student's regular Park Run sessions shone through in their running events, with both students completing their 400m events with competitive times. Similarly, we had some impressive throws in the soft ball throw heats with many of our students throwing in excess of 20m. Two students even recorded throws of around 30m! More importantly though, the students were all thoroughly supportive of one another and they showed great sportsmanship throughout the day. Well done!









10SB work experience

In April, 10SB spent a week gaining valuable experience in the workplace. We had students go to work at the Animal Care Centre at North Lindsey College, Brigg Community Wellbeing Hub, The Pods, Lindum Street Community Centre and Bushfield Infant School.


This student has sketched a range of animal images.

All of their hard work last term culminated in a CSI day provided by Pulse Education and Business Services in which they found out more about careers in forensic science and used skills they'd learnt (and some new ones they picked up along the way) to solve a murder! It was a full day of practical work, discussions and hard work. The pupils were engaged throughout and really enjoyed the experience. Their team work skills were fantastic and every group was able to correctly identify the murderer using all of the evidence they collected.

Year 10 Work Experience

This term, year 10 have had the very valuable opportunity to complete work experience in a range of different business areas. Students worked hard with their employers to complete different job roles including serving customers, preparing food, cleaning and looking after animals. Students really enjoyed their opportunities to practise existing skills and learn some new ones!

People who help us in school

James Wells – Garden Therapy

I have worked at St Hugh's for 3 years and work 1:1 with students to improve their wellbeing using therapeutic gardening intervention. Students maintain the garden; cutting the grass, pruning and weeding are all part of their session. They learn about animal maintenance and look after the chickens. In science, students watched chickens hatch and they now look after them. Some students have enrolled on animal courses at college.

I run a lunchtime garden club three times a week which is well attended. We grow lots of plants, blackberries, raspberries, pears, cherries and white strawberries, cucumbers, peppers, sweetcorn, potatoes and pumpkins. Last Halloween we sold pumpkins and made £40 for our school charity. We always have a plant stall at school fayres, which is run by the students.



Quad Kids inclusive event



On Thursday 6th June, I had the pleasure of taking 16 students to an inclusive Quad Kids event that took place at Quibell Park. The students were selected from a variety of classes and there were representatives from Year 7, 8, 9 and 10. The students were mixed into two teams that consisted of 4 boys and 4 girls each.

Quad kids sees the competitors each taking part in 4 events: a 50 metre sprint, Nerf Vortex throw, 400 metres run and standing long jump. All of our students completed all of the events and there were some outstanding performances on the day. This was a great opportunity for them to showcase their athletic prowess and pit their wits against students of a similar ability from other secondary schools from the North Lincolnshire area.
