### YEAR 9 & 10 STUDENTS VISIT POLAND

At the end of February, 40 students from Years 9 and 10 visited Krakow in Poland with the Humanities department.

We chose to visit Krakow because of the opportunity it offered to allow students to explore aspects of the Holocaust and the treatment of Jewish people throughout

history. Both year groups had previously taken part in our activities for Holocaust Memorial Day and the trip to Poland offered a fantastic chance to connect with the stories and events of the time even further.



All students who attended the trip behaved impeccably, representing Broadoak well. It was a pleasure to be able to have conversations with

students who were so clearly interested and passionate about the topic.





Whilst in Poland, we visited some incredible sites and discovered that Krakow is a truly beautiful city with a rich and intricate history.

The fundamental element of our trip was to visit Auschwitz-Birkenau. This was a very moving day, for both staff and students, as we discovered first-hand the conditions in the camps and learned in detail about the treatment of those who were taken to the concentration camps. Many students were shocked by the size of Birkenau.



We also visited the Galicia Museum, where we looked at the progress of Jewish culture through time in a series of photographs. Whilst there, we were privileged to meet a survivor of the Holocaust, Monica Goldwasser, who told her story about how she was saved from the concentration camps.

### **HOLOCAUST EDUCATION**

This year to celebrate Holocaust Memorial Day, the Humanities faculty ran a collapsed curriculum project. Year 9 students had a fortnight to take part in learning activities around the Holocaust and were then given four lessons to express themselves artistically. The theme this year was 'How can life go on?' Students explored real life stories of people whose lives were affected by the Holocaust and by more recent genocides. We were delighted with the pieces of work that students created. They responded in a mature and very thoughtful manner. Some students made models that were symbolic of the events during the Holocaust, others expressed themselves through poetry and some created moving pieces of art that expressed the emotions of those that suffered.



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We had many students who sometimes struggle with social and emotional behaviour who engaged with the project positively and took the opportunity to display their artistic talents.

The collapsed project was a fantastic lead up to the Humanities trip to Auschwitz. The project offered a fantastic chance to connect with the stories and events even further.

Whilst in Krakow, we were privileged to meet a survivor of the Holocaust, Monica Goldwasser who told her story about how she was saved from the concentration camps.


### **FUN MATHS ROADSHOW**

### **MATHS HIGHER ORDER THINKING DAY**



On the 20<sup>th</sup> March, Broadoak held its annual “Maths Higher Order Thinking Day” where eight of our brightest mathematicians were joined by twenty other students from five different schools for teaching by Ted Graham.

After looking at formulae such as  $s = ut + \frac{1}{2}at^2$ , the group went on to discuss the

speed particular items (e.g. a £5 note) would drop under different criteria, as well as on the moon, and discussing the effect of gravity on moving objects, such as a human cannon ball and whether or not survival was possible under certain conditions.



The day was very informative and students really enjoyed it.

## FESTIVAL OF LITERATURE

To celebrate "World Book Day", the whole school had a week of activities to celebrate reading. Across the week, students from all year groups got involved in a variety of activities that promoted the benefits of reading and literacy.

At the beginning of the week, we had an author visit, Tracey Alexander, author of 'Hacked' and 'Alias', and she spoke to all of the Year 7 students about writing (pictured below). She spoke about how to engage a reader and gave a fascinating insight in to the work that goes in to producing a novel.

Midweek, we had 2 visiting poets who worked with 60 Year 9 students. These groups worked with the poets and their class teachers to write some original poetry in groups, and perform in a poetry slam. There was plenty of action and lots of poetic skill on show.



Thursday was "World Book Day". All the staff were encouraged to dress up as their favourite literary characters. It created some great conversations between staff and students about reading for pleasure. The effort put in to costumes was outstanding. The Learning Support Department all dressed up as Shakespearean characters, Technology were various incarnations of James Bond and there were several Harry

Potter favourites too. There was also a treasure hunt for students to complete during the day which encouraged them to find various characters and discuss these books with staff.

The week concluded with a busy lunch time where around 20 students from across the school competed in a well fought "Spelling Bee". We also hosted a book swap in the LRC. Tutor groups completed World Book Day quizzes across the week to see how much they really knew about literature. Year 8 also had the amazing opportunity to read a whole Anthony Horowitz story in a day,



with each of their class teachers reading them the next part of the story throughout the day. As well as all that excitement, students all received a £1 World Book Day token which they could exchange for a completely free book in the LRC. A fantastic week was had by all and there was a real enthusiasm about reading around the school, which we hope will continue.

## MATHS VISIT TO UWE




On Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> April, 9 students from Year 10 attended the “Maths Is For Everyone” event at the University of Bristol with a number of other schools.

To start the day, the students had a few problems to solve. The morning activities began with a lecture on “Swarm Engineering” where the students got to see an analysis of the movements of flocks of birds and the recreation of this using robots. They then listened to a lecture on creative calculations and how we can make problems easier which the group found very useful.

The students also had a chance to take part in a Q&A session with a variety of Bristol University students to get an idea of University life and finding out details on courses and what they entail.

After lunch, a current Bristol University student took us a tour of the University and we all took part in the “Dragon Quiz”. The students thoroughly enjoyed the quiz as they were split up into teams with members from different schools. They had a chance to show off their competitive side as the quiz was set up in a relay style race with the motivational prize of chocolate!

The day ended with a talk on “Animal Locomotion” which looked at the Mathematics behind how animals move.

With auditions for the next production coming up soon, this time a musical, there is clearly a lot of talent to behold in the students of Broad oak!




## **ENTERPRISE 4 U**

Miss Baxter-Hunter (Head of Textiles) took the Year 10 Textiles GCSE group to the Bath Fashion Museum.

For some, this was the first visit to Bath, as well as their first visit to a museum. We got to spend some time enjoying the 100 years of fashion exhibition, where the students were able to take photos, sketch and come up with ideas.



The students focused on looking at surface embellishment and how to add beautiful details to a garment. Their collection of research to develop embellished samples, using nature as our main inspiration. By selecting areas of photographs they produced mini collages using paper, fabric, thread, feathers, card, beads and buttons to create textures and outlines.

The workshop allowed the students to develop their creative thinking by challenging them to something they'd not done before and exploring ways in which they can enhance their GCSE projects through surface embellishment.

Some of the students felt 'it was fun to learn about fashion in the past', 'the workshop was great', 'it was more than I expected' and finally that the 'best bit was dressing up in olden day clothes!'



## **CILLIP CARNEGIE MEDAL 2017**

This year, as well as running our normal Carnegie Challenge, we have challenged Year 9, 10 and 11 students to read and review as many shortlisted titles as they can during a three-month period. The winner will be announced. On June 19<sup>th</sup>, we are also inviting a number of top readers from Year 9 to "Shadow" the Carnegie judging panel. We work as a group to read, discuss, review and blog about the shortlisted titles.

The Carnegie Medal shortlist is dominated by novels of identity, friendship, love and survival, Debut children's author Lauren Wolk's "Wolf Hollow" - a US-set coming-of-age tale of a young girl's experience of bullying, survival and friendship in a small town in the 1940s - vies with previous Carnegie Medal winner Philip Reeve's intergalactic fantasy thriller "Railhead", where hi-tech trains transport passengers between planets and galaxies in a mere moment. Journalist-turned-debut-author Bonnie-Sue Hitchcock's "The Smell of Other People's Houses" - inspired by her own experiences of growing up in Alaska in the Seventies - is joined on the eight strong shortlist by Zana Fraillon's "The Bone Sparrow" a story of unexpected friendship in the tough world of an internment camp in Australia, and Glenda Millard's tale of survival and redemption through friendship, love and the power of poetry, "The Stars at Oktober Bend". Previous Medal winner Frank Cottrell Boyce's "Sputnik's Guide to Life on Earth" about family, fostering, the power of friendship and how a boy called Prez regains his voice, and Ruta Sepetys's "Salt to the Sea", a WW2-set story of refugees and survivors inspired by a real life naval disaster, complete the Carnegie shortlist for 2017.

## **YEAR 9/10 CATERING ENRICHMENT PROJECT**

Six students were selected to take part in an exciting project organised at Weston College to provide an introduction to the Catering and Hospitality industry. During the course, the students developed skills in food preparation, cooking and serving.


The course ran for four sessions in Weston College's professional kitchen in which the students prepared a three-course meal, each session focussing on a different course.
