The island has a rich calendar of events taking place throughout the year, so whether you are interested in live music, local history or great food and drink, you are sure to find something to suit.









Population Management is important in Guernsey as the island is only 25 square miles, its small size means there is a limit to the number of people the island's resources can support.





The rules governing who can live and work in the island are fairly straightforward and have been established in order to protect Guernsey's environment and to preserve her resources.

Essentially, if you are a British Citizen, (or have the right to live in the UK and her islands) or are a national from the European Economic Area or Switzerland, then you are able to live and work in Guernsey. However, there are strict controls on the admission of non-EEA nationals to Guernsey and the Bailiwick (Alderney, Sark and Herm) and immigration work permit controls are also in place for such nationals.


Visa requirements for entry to the Bailiwick are the same as those required to enter the UK and further information can be obtained by contacting the Immigration and Nationality Division or, if resident abroad, a British Diplomatic Mission.

If you have any specific questions regarding your personal situation, or are unsure about your immigration status, you are advised to contact the island's authorities.

The size and make-up of Guernsey's Population is regulated by The Population Management Law.

The Law is designed to make sure that the island has the right mix of people supporting our economy and community now and also for the future. This is done by using a system of Permits and Certificates.

It aims to support local businesses by controlling Permits designed for employment purposes, allowing us to employ a diverse range of skilled people where needed to strengthen Guernsey's workforce.

It also determines who can live in certain accommodation. Guernsey's properties are primarily split into two 'Housing Markets' the 'Local Market' and the 'Open Market'. To be able to live in the Local Market you have to be either residentially qualified, or hold certain permits to be able to access accommodation in this Market. Anyone can live in Open Market. Guernsey boasts an excellent health service with modern facilities staffed by experts in their fields.

Guernsey is not part of the NHS and operates its own Health Service. Our Social Security System runs a specialist health insurance scheme, covering the cost of most specialist care available from the Medical Specialist Group (this provides emergency and elective specialist medical services on a consultant-only basis) and specialist physiotherapy provided by the Guernsey Physiotherapy Group.

The scheme is funded through either earnings-related or income-related insurance contributions and all new residents are granted immediate cover. Once you register for contributions you are eligible for benefits that cover part of the cost of GP visits and bring prescription charges down to a nominal amount.





Outside of the health insurance scheme, residents are responsible for meeting the costs of medical care. These include treatment from their GP, chiropodists, physiotherapists (for treatment not covered by the health insurance scheme), opticians and dentists.

Guernsey has an excellent hospital offering both in and out-patient care. Treatment and accommodation is not usually charged here, unless a patient elects to be treated privately. Charges are made to patients for attendance at the Emergency Department. Costs can be viewed online at www.gov.gg/edcharges.

A number of private hospital and medical insurance schemes are operated in the island, if you wish to opt for private medical treatment or wish to take out cover in addition to that included in the Health Insurance Scheme.

The St. John Ambulance & Rescue Service provides 24-hour professional ambulance services on the island. However, because there is no National Health Service in Guernsey, patients are charged if they receive treatment or transport in an ambulance.

Because of this, the Service operates a subscription scheme. Members pay an annual fee and in return any ambulance services they may need during the year are free. The ambulance station also has a first aid room where treatment is offered free of charge, though you will have to pay any fees that arise from then being referred to a doctor or hospital, or if you need ambulance transport.

Our curriculum

Our schools deliver the 'Big Picture' Curriculum, which has been developed by teachers from primary, secondary and special schools working together. We have designed this curriculum to help our schools improve, to promote and raise standards, to secure the essentials for learning and life and to make learning the best it can be for all children in all schools.

Our curriculum aims to retain the best of current practice whilst seeking to place greater emphasis on important elements required to secure well-rounded learning.

There is a bigger focus on:

- > Taking learning outside the classroom
- > Promoting positive mental health and wellbeing
- Understanding the world of work and the life skills linked to managing money
- The understanding of other cultures and their languages from a younger age

Our Schools and Services

Education is organised along similar lines to the other home jurisdictions. Compulsory education is from the age of 5 to 16 but children are able to start primary school at the beginning of the school year in which they will reach the age of five.

Early Years

The States of Guernsey provides 15 hours per week, term time only, free pre-school education for all three to four-year-olds in the year before they start school. This entitlement is delivered by a range of private pre-school providers.

Primary Education

We operate 11 all-ability primary schools. Admission to these primary schools is by catchment area. There are two primary schools for children who are baptised Catholics, and three private schools for primary age children. Our primary schools use a process of moderated teacher assessment to measure and record progress and attainment. We do not use SATs.

Secondary Education

Secondary education is currently delivered in all-ability 11-16 schools. Primary schools are partnered with named secondary schools for admission into Year 7. All secondary schools offer a range of public examinations and qualifications including GCSEs, iGCSEs, BTECs and other recognised courses. There are three grant-aided Colleges providing 11-16 education for fee-payers with two of these Colleges also offering sixth forms (A Levels).







Post-16 Education

A Levels and the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IB) are offered at the Grammar School & Sixth Form Centre and a range of full-time and part-time vocational qualifications and apprenticeship programmes are offered at the College of Further Education.

Post-16 education is going through a process of transformation. From September 2021 there are likely to be some changes to the structure of delivery of qualifications and courses but the breadth of provision including academic and vocational pathways will be maintained.





Additional Needs

The majority of children with special educational needs or additional needs are supported within our mainstream schools. In a small number of cases, and following a process of formal assessment, children may be placed at one of our three special schools (one for primary age pupils, one for secondary age pupils and one all-age school for pupils with social, emotional and behavioural difficulties) or receive additional support from our specialist bases or education support services.

Other Education Services

We provide a range of education support services including Educational Psychology Service, School Attendance Service, Communication and Autism Support Service, Sensory Support Service, Careers Guernsey, Schools' Library Service and Guernsey Music Service.

Further and Higher Education and Adult Learning

Further and Higher Education on-island and adult community learning is provided by the College of Further Education, the GTA University Centre and the Institute of Health & Social Care Studies alongside a range of private training providers.


Higher Education Funding

The States of Guernsey invests more than £4 million per year supporting more than 600 students studying full-time higher education degree courses outside of the Bailiwick.

Students attending UK Universities are treated as 'home' students and are charged tuition fees at the home rate.

Financial support is through a means-tested grant scheme and dependent on a number of factors including an assessment of gross household income. Grants consist of two elements; living and travel costs (known as a maintenance grant) and tuition fees. Visit www.gov.gg/studentfinance for more information.

Pet Travel

Your pet cats and dogs can travel without a Pet Passport if they travel directly between the United Kingdom and Guernsey.

Pet cats and dogs travelling from Europe (or UK pets which have travelled to Europe and are returning via Guernsey) must use the only approved route operated by Condor Ferries from St Malo.

Pets travelling from Europe must have a Pet Passport and must have been given tick and tapeworm treatments before embarking for Guernsey as required by the Pet Travel Scheme. Pets will be checked for conformity with the Scheme at St.Malo and those that fail will not be allowed to board the ferry for Guernsey. Please contact Condor Ferries regarding travelling with your pet before making travel arrangements.

Pet Passports can be obtained from vets, and it takes between seven and eight months for a pet to qualify for travel.

Driving and Vehicle Licensing

If you bring a car into the island you will need to re-register it within 14 days of your arrival. In addition to the registration fee, a 'First Registration Duty' will be applied to all new and second-hand vehicles being imported and registered in Guernsey for the first time.

New residents need to apply to exchange their foreign licence for a Guernsey driving licence within one year of arriving in the island. Any foreign licence will become invalid for exchange or use on the island after that time

You can exchange licences issued by many countries, including the UK and other EU members, for a Guernsey licence. However, there are a number of countries whose licences cannot be exchanged. In such cases, you will have to apply for a provisional driving licence and then pass a theory and practical driving test before you can be issued with a full Guernsey licence.
