





Upper Sixth Form Symposium

For approximately 15 years Whitgift Upper Sixth Formers have taken part in an annual Symposium, which was held at North London Collegiate School (NLCS) in October 2018. The Symposium is an opportunity for students to develop collaborative as well as independent research skills.

Whitgift students had been working with a partner student at either NLCS or Tottenham Academy since the start of the Michaelmas Term, identifying a controversial or little-known topic in the field they wish to study and preparing a presentation on it to small groups of peers.

On the day of the Symposium, the students gave their presentations in pairs and then participated in open discussions with a wider group focusing on their subject area. They then had a Q&A discussion, tying different topics together.

Head of Sixth Form, Mr Thomas Burnside commented, "The presentations covered a range of engaging topics, from developmental economics to Shakespearean drama. They displayed a high academic standard which will really prepare them for presenting in undergraduate study. We were impressed at their approach to collaboration and the professionalism they showed when presenting their ideas and during the Q&A."

The Symposium is also a great opportunity for students to practise skills that will benefit them not only when applying to university, but also at university and in the workplace.

2018 Academic Highlights

This year saw excellent results in Public Examinations coupled with a huge range of wider academic success across all areas of school life.

At GCSE, nearly half of new style entries were awarded at the top grades of 8 or 9. An impressive 32 pupils achieved the top grades possible (9 or A*) in 8 or more of their GCSE subjects and 3 achieved the rare feat of gaining top grades in all eleven of their subject entries. 95% received A*-B grades and 22% achieved Grade 9 which compares with 4.3% nationally.

Fifty pupils in the Upper Fifth
Form completed the challenging
Additional Mathematics
qualification, with 24 obtaining
the top grade. In the Upper Sixth
Form, results in the International
Baccalaureate were again
outstanding, with an average

outstanding, with an average point total of 38 out of a maximum of 45. The A Level and Pre-U examinations experienced 84% of all grades being awarded at A*-B; this rises to 86% when combined with the IB result. Shintaro Nishijo achieved a remarkable 7 A* grades and 35 pupils

gained straight A* and A grades at A Level or Pre-U equivalent.

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A total of 114 Whitgiftians are going to universities in The Times top 20 for 2018, which is a testament to the hard work and determination of students and staff. The Headmaster and staff at Whitgift would like to congratulate all boys on their achievements and wish them the very best in their future studies.

This event is unique in the School's theatrical programme, as it is the only one in which no creative input from staff is allowed. This gives the boys the opportunity of doing everything themselves: directing, rehearsing, choreographing and providing a technical script.

The Houses put tremendous effort into their plays, with

Dodd's House pre-recording their own video clips to segue between their live performance. The judges for the night, acclaimed actors Keith Bartlett and Jacqueline King, praised all eight Houses for both their skill and endeavour, but they were in agreement with the audience that the Andrew's performance stood out as the highlight of the night.

Andrew's House was victorious with their self-written play, 'The Play'. It focussed on two budding playwrights (Fourth Formers, Jack Godwin and Will Allnutt) trying to come up with an idea for a script for a drama competition. Whilst they discussed their ideas, the rest of the cast mimed around them wearing an assortment of costumes to bring their fantasies to life. This seemingly simple concept worked well dramatically and allowed the audience to view some of the Upper Sixth Form in a wholly new light: Charlie Barber skipping in a full length Edwardian dress and School Captain Ben Goldby as the dancing alien. Senior Housemaster and English Teacher, Mr Dominic Edwards commented, "Andrew's House was a 'metatheatrical' success! The boys went all-out in their quest for the cup."

CERN trip

In the Michaelmas Half Term. 33 of Whitgift's Sixth Formers visited CERN - the European Organization for Nuclear Research - in Geneva. The organisation operates the largest particle physics laboratory in the world.

The students had a guided tour of the Cryogenic facility and the control room for the ATLAS detector, one of the four main detectors in operation around the Large Hadron Collider particle accelerator. The boys also learned of the proposed expansion of the tunnel to a 100km circumference, enabling the maximum energies of the particles to be increased. The

immense scale of the project demonstrated how international collaboration was necessary to achieve such a feat.

Lower Sixth Former, Gavin Murugan commented, "One of the first things we were told on our tour of CERN was its modus operandi is the pursuit of knowledge. For me, the pursuit of knowledge is what I enjoy about Physics."

The staff and pupils also enjoyed a trip to The History of Science museum, providing insight into how problems were solved in the past using lesser equipment and how instruments have developed over the years.

Notably, they learnt more about famous physicists of the past, such as Faraday, and their iourney to discovering many of the fundamental laws of Physics CERN is reliant on.

The last excursion was a visit to the UN Palace of Nations, visiting the iconic meeting rooms and gardens. This was followed by a traditional Swiss meal consisting of a cheese fondue and an opportunity to play a traditiona Swiss alphorn. Afterwards, the students went on a boat tour along the Geneva Lake, enjoying the scenery of the city and ended the day walking around the Geneva waterfront.

The Rugby season at Whitgift has been busy, with the teams working hard and making great progress. The summer holiday voluntary sessions for the U14s and above were well attended which helped the teams start the season well-equipped. The U15s had an excellent pre-season training camp to San Sebastian, Spain to help with their preparations over the summer.

The U15s and 1st XV have been advancing in the Schools Cup Competitions. The U15s have done well after winning games against John Fisher and Langley Park. It is encouraging to see all age groups developing well, the

U14 A and U15 A teams having had excellent seasons to date.
The 1st XV have had exceptional winning games also, against teams including Warwick, John Fisher, Bishop Wordsworth, RGS High Wycombe and Dulwich, to name a few, as well as winning the Esher Presidents Cup in September.

In particular Harry Williams and Elliot Daly, who played for England in the Autumn Internationals and also on tour to South Africa. We were delighted when Elliot returned to the School to visit the boys (see article on page 14).

Mr Chris Wilkins, Director of Rugby summarised, "Everyone is looking forward to the remainder of the season, including the New Zealand tour in summer 2019, where we will be taking a 50 man squad for what will be a great experience for all."


In the U12, U13 and U14 age groups, 27 boys represented Whitgift with seven of them competing in their first ever biathlon. An impressive number of personal best performances

Award-winning ideas

Upper Sixth Form student and entrepreneur Arminder Dhillon (originally of Dragons' Den fame) has won the 'Horners Bottlemakers Award 2018' for his impressive Boot Buddy invention. The annual prize is awarded in conjunction with the British Plastics Federation and entrants are required to have significant UK content in design, materials or manufacture and a proven record of commercial success. Arminder is the youngest person to have ever received this accolade in the 16 years' since the award was launched.

This accomplishment follows Arminder's placement in

TransferWise's '20 Under 20' list. TransferWise hosted a search with a panel of successful entrepreneurs, investors and advisors from other well-known brands, to find Britain's most promising young entrepreneurs. During a pitching, training and mentoring trip to Estonia, Arminder faced the judging panel and was selected as one of the top five entrants.

One of the panel judges Will Shu, CEO and co-founder of Deliveroo, commented on Arminder's invention, "With Boot Buddy, Arminder has created something rare - a genuinely useful and clever product, which I can see doing really well."



Alongside his studies, Arminder has been able to grow his already successful Boot Buddy business, with support from his family as well as ongoing input from the Dragons. He is also a speaker at various industry events, most recently at Peter

Jones' Enterprise Festival (EntFest). His business plans include further expansion into additional markets as well as launching useful new variations such as Paw Buddy, an adaptation for cleaning pets' muddy paws.

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
New STEM computer built by Sixth Formers

Sixth Formers Freddie Rawlins and Andrew Bonner have been working closely with Physics Teacher and Head of STEM, Mr Matthew Taylor to build a new computer for the STEM department at Whitgift.

Their work of conceptualising the plans and developing the core requirements began last term; the computer needed to be able to run simulations and edit complex Computer Aided Design (CAD) files. Utilising industrylevel components and watercooling technology, the boys were involved with all elements of the project, from ordering the parts to building and configuring the computer.

The computer has been used to model the STEM car as part of the Green Power Car competition to design, build and race an electric vehicle.

Freddie commented, "It's been a great experience and the ability to carry out virtual testing has meant we have been better able to design components for





the STEM car. The computer is also able to produce renders [visualising 3D models] in a matter of minutes."

The computer has also helped numerous departments and projects, as well as allowing Design Technology and Engineering students to ensure the size and scale of their modelling is suitable for the real world.

Mr Taylor stated, "Building a powerful computer presented an

David Crystal

Whitgift welcomed British linguist, academic and author David Crystal, OBE, FBA, FLSW, FCIL in September 2018. Professor Crystal delivered an engaging lecture on Shakespearean 'OP' or 'Original Pronunciation'. OP is the production or performance of Shakespeare's lines as they were spoken during his lifetime. He successfully collaborated with Shakespeare's Globe in an OP production in 2004 of Romeo and Juliet, which attracted interest worldwide and sparked further OP productions.

David performed a range of entertaining renditions from memory for the boys, using examples from OP productions and held a workshop with Sixth Form pupils to examine the shift in vowel and consonant sounds over the last 400 years. He ended the day with a talk on 'The Perils of Being a Linguist' - drawing on his vast experience of anecdotes to highlight the diverse applications of linguistics in fields such as translation, computer programming and sociology.

Professor Crystal held a chair at the University of Reading for 10 years and is presently the Honorary Professor of Linguistics at the University of Wales. He is well-known for his books in the field of language, particularly his two encyclopaedias for Cambridge University Press, The Cambridge Encyclopaedia of Language and The Cambridge Encyclopaedia of the English Language (3rd edition 2018).

National Poetry Day

To celebrate both National Poetry Day and Black History Month, Whitgift invited two established poets to lead creative workshops; Ruth Sutoyé and Spoz (aka Giovanni Esposito).

Ruth is a poet, facilitator, creative producer and visual artist. Her work has featured in several publications such as True Africa, Bad Betty Press and The Cob Gallery. She hosted an Upper School assembly and led workshops for Sixth Form students. Her workshops focused on free writing techniques and studied poetry that tackled modern day issues.

Spoz has been performing poetry since 2005 and has featured at high profile events such as the Glastonbury Festival and Cheltenham Literature Festival. He has held poetry workshops at hundreds of schools and been

commissioned by the BBC for his work. Spoz performed during Lower School assembly and held interactive and fun workshops for various year groups. The workshops encouraged the boys to use rhyme by creating raps on the popular subject of chocolate. They enthusiastically demonstrated clever word-play and it was evident they enjoyed performing their work. The pupils were also treated to a book-signing session at lunch and a few had the opportunity to interview him.

Both visits created a hive of activity around the School, celebrating the power of poetry to bring people together and to explore how it can be used in reading, writing and performing. Whitgift would like to thank both Ruth and Spoz for making National Poetry Day a memorable event.

Whitgift Junior Literary Festival

The annual Whitgift Junior Literary Festival is organised in the spirit of the Hay Festival – a literature festival held in Wales, for ten days from May to June. Began by Norman, Rhoda and Peter Florence in 1988, the festival has been described by Bill Clinton as "The Woodstock of the mind."

In 2018, Whitgift had six wellestablished authors visit the School: BAFTA Award winning screenwriter and author Ciaran
Murtagh, poet and hip hop artist
Karl Nova, novelist Stephen
Davies, best-selling children's
author Steve Cole, author and
journalist Nikki Sheehan and
novelist and inspirational speaker
Matt Whyman.

The festival is held for the Lower First and First Formers, and began with an assembly in Big School led by Ciaran Murtagh who entertained with a talk on how to find ideas for writing stories. After assembly, the boys went to various workshops led by the authors who taught them different story writing skills.

The authors also held a signing session in the Performing Arts
Centre which proved very popular and allowed the boys to interact with their favourite artist. Finishing off the day, Karl Nova talked about his poetry being influenced by his life, delivering the message

of 'going against the grain' in his witty and energetic style.

The festival is a fun-filled day designed to inspire the boys, encouraging them to attend English Society, or qualify for the residential trip to the Literary Festival, or even to enter into writing competitions such as the PRISM essay competition. Upcoming Literature incentives include the annual Whitgift Anthology and the First Form Reading Challenge.

On Friday 9 November Whitgift held a poignant Remembrance Day assembly and service for the School, marking the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War. The morning assemblies for the Lower School and Upper School were honoured with a visit from Old Whitgiftian Colonel Michael Cornwell OBE, who paid tribute to all the OWs who participated in the First World War. Head of History, Mr Keith Smith delivered an engaging and thought-provoking talk, asking half of the boys in the hall to stand up to Whitgift boys that went to war.

After the assemblies, the Lower School congregated outside in preparation for the annual remembrance service led by Reverend Alan Bayes. Members of the CCF performed the role of Flag Party including the tradition of flags at half-mast, followed by the laying of the wreaths by History Teacher Mr Oliver Roberts, Old Whitgiftians Lord David Freud and David Straw and Upper School Captain Ben

Goldby. Ben and Lower School Captain Nifemi Bankole then delivered readings, followed by the choristers and brass ensemble performing For the Fallen by Douglas Guest.

The Whitgift Corps of Drums did a commendable job of playing at the start and end of the service and many OWs joined the service on the day. The Headmaster, Mr Chris Ramsey, also received a generous gift for the School from OW Nigel Platts; a set of campaign medals that belonged to Old Whitgiftian Reginald Gordon Hill who lost his life serving in the Royal Army Medical Corps [R.A.M.C.]. Nigel donated the medals as a 'thank you' for his time at the School and 10 years serving as School Governor.


Hockey professional returns as new coach

Great Britain and England Olympic hockey player Mr Ashley Jackson returned to the Whitgift hockey programme for 2018-19. After training the boys last year during the Michaelmas and Lent Terms, he re-joins the coaching team for his winter break from playing for the Dutch Premier League, the Hoofdklasse in Holland. Mr Jackson is England and Great Britain's leading goal scorer and three-time Olympian (Beijing 2008, London 2012 and Rio 2016).

Mr Jackson stated, "I am excited to be back and involved at Whitgift. The boys have access to an incredible environment and I look forward to working with such talented and enthusiastic players once again."

He joins the highly experienced coaching team, including National League goal scorer, Mr Tim Davenport (300 goals) and his brother Mr Wesley Jackson.

Dr Karl Stagno, Director of Hockey said, "Mr Jackson joins Whitgift's ever growing and successful hockey programme and will enable our boys to become inspired by and learn from one of the world's best."



Cricket

Over the October Half Term, the senior cricketers travelled to Perth, Australia for a once in a lifetime tour. There were a total of 26 boys across two squads, playing 15 matches against state and independent schools in Perth. Between the matches and training sessions the boys had the opportunity of learning to surf, making several visits to Perth's superb beaches, as well as completing a tour of Australia's unique wildlife. There was also a

visit to the WACA sports stadium to watch a Sheffield Shield match, along with the bonus of being able to watch the City's basketball team play against Melbourne at the RAC Arena.

Playing cricket in Australia is always a special experience for the students. English cricket teams have been playing Australia for over 140 years and this friendly, sporting rivalry was seen in every one of the matches played. They

were hosted for four nights by Australian families, and this once again proved to be a hugely enjoyable part of the tour with many new friendships established.

Aside from the cricket tour, the School was pleased to hear of Old Whitgiftian Rory Burns becoming the second OW to play test cricket for England, and OW Jamie Smith being selected to play for the Young Lions (England U19) squad, both in October 2018.

There have been many activities from Fives to Photography and Maths to Music.



Corsica

A new venture for Whitgift saw 35 Lower Sixth and Upper Fifth students set off to the mountains of Corsica in July 2018, to complete the expedition section of the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award. The seven day route along the famous GR20 began under good weather conditions. Carrying everything they needed for the trip on their backs, the boys worked in small groups; crossing bridges, climbing through rocks as well as taking in the scenic views and sunsets.

Although there were some seriously challenging parts of the terrain, the boys showed tremendous resilience and arrived in great spirits at the end of the expedition in the village of Vizzavona. The improvement in campcraft and fitness over the trip was impressive and they should be proud of all they have accomplished towards the completion of their award.



Valencia

The Spanish trip in October 2018 for the Fourth Form students had an exciting programme of activities, with the first day in Valencia taking them to the Bull Ring Museum to learn about the traditional yet controversial sport of bullfighting. Afterwards, the boys explored the foods of Valencia, including 'churros con chocolate' at the famous Horchatería Santa Catalina and visited the El Miguelete Cathedral.

The week continued with a bike ride around the city, before heading to the beach to enjoy some Valencian sun and football, samba-style. In the afternoon there was a visit to El Mestalla Stadium, home of Valencia CF for a full stadium tour in celebration of the club's 100th year anniversary. This included the changing rooms, trophy cabinet, press room, pre-match tunnel and dug-outs. The last day involved a visit to the Fallas Museum, which was filled with 'ninot' statues – large figures made of papier-mâché, cardboard, wood or plaster.

Student Finlay Webb explained, "I found it really intriguing to learn that the ninots we saw at the museum had been voted the best at the Fallas festival, which saved them from the tradition of being burned at the end of the festival."

They ended the trip visiting the Oceanographic, a giant outdoor aquarium where the students saw jellyfish, penguins and a dolphin show, returning to their exchange partner homes for a rest before preparing to fly home the next day.




America

Whilst being ranked 6th in the 4x50m Medley Relay, they persevered and worked their way to the podium to claim 3rd place

Head of Swimming and Athletics, Mr Daniel Webb commented, "This has been a great achievement and we're all extremely proud of all the boys who competed, particularly the Juniors who secured a podium position. We have had a great start to the year and now the aim is to build on this success."

The water polo squads have had 14 fixtures in most age groups, playing against schools including Trinity, Dulwich, Alleyn's and Eltham. The U13s have been particularly strong during the Michaelmas Term, winning all their matches and putting them in a good position for nationals.

The U15s have also been outstanding, winning all their matches in the first qualification round for the English Schools Nationals. There were superb performances from goalkeeper Emile Thurston as well as Jon Cheshire, Omari Elliot and Cai Evans who all scored goals for Whitgift.





Fencing

Young Coders Meetup

In the summer of 2018, Second Former Femi Owolade-Coombes and Third Former Kian Patel collaborated with a group of young coders to create their own Young Coders Meetup. The group met through the South London Raspberry Jam, an initiative inspired by Femi in 2015, to create a coding community for young people.

The Young Coders Meetup (YCM) have created a crowdfunding campaign to set up a hub for 10-16 year-olds in under-represented communities to learn about coding in an inclusive and friendly environment. The pilot initiative has been supported by the open source corporate company Rat Hat at their Open Innovation Labs in London.

Both students have been volunteering their time to help bring technology to the wider

community. Kian regularly helps with leading workshops for Pijam, a non-profit volunteer-led community event focused on educating young people about technology and is supported by Raspberry Pi (the organisation that creates computers to learn about programming). In November 2018, Femi was presented with the Tech London Advocates (TLA) 25 under 25 award in recognition of his achievements within the UK technology sector. This followed a year in which he was invited to be a keynote speaker at the Red Hat Summit in May 2018 and was presented with the Prime Minister's Points of Light award in July 2018.

The Young Coders Meetup is planned to be launched at the beginning of 2019 and we hope to hear more exciting news from them.

Embracing diversity

The beauty of Whitgift lies in its unique palette of students and the School believes diversity enhances the pattern of life experienced by students and staff. Thus in early 2018, Upper Sixth student Joe Golding and Assistant Head of Fourth Form Mr David Powell (who also is an Old Whitgiftian) established the Whitgift Afro-Caribbean Society (WACS). The purpose was to share on Afro-Caribbean culture and societal issues within the School.

The group of staff and students who gathered for the inaugural Whitgift Afro Caribbean Society meeting shared a unique moment in the School's history. From then until now, they have met regularly to discuss and highlight the perspective of the Afro-Caribbean community at Whitgift on a variety of subjects.

Each session has proven to be invaluable to all who attend.
Topics discussed include both current and historical subjects, with a personal favourite being a discussion on the spread of Afro-Caribbean culture via music (both positive and negative).

Mr David Powell commented, "I have found that the beauty of being a Whitgiftian is not discovered in a uniformity of belief and opinion but rather in the evolution and exchange of culture and diverse views. It is when I have a healthy understanding of my neighbour that I am equipped to support and encourage them best. This, is the true essence of community."

Mr Powell also led a series of assemblies during Black History Month in October 2018 and plans on organising many more events for 2019.

Senior Maths Challenge

The Senior Maths Challenge is an individual competition run by the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust (UKMT) and is one of many enrichment activities offered by the Whitgift Mathematics Department. The first of three individual competitions (Senior, Intermediate and Junior), it is aimed at Fifth Form to Upper Sixth Form students and is designed to stimulate interest in Maths through challenging multiple choice questions. The competitions attract over 600,000 entries from over 4,000 schools or colleges. Gold, Silver and Bronze certificates are awarded to the most successful participants.

In November 2018, 117 Whitgift students took part in the competition including two Fourth Formers. The results were outstanding, with 17 students invited to take part in a follow-up round based on their excellent results. Anant Gupta (Fifth Form) and Nichika Waragai (Upper Sixth Form) scored an exceptional 121 and 120 respectively out of 125 marks, as well as Jing Ngan (Lower Sixth Form) who scored 103 and have been invited to take part in the British Maths Olympiad. Other students with excellent results include Benjamin Wong (Fourth Form) and Kai Lam (Fourth Form) who scored 100 and 98 respectively and to Second Formers Wei Shun Pham and Oliver Wong who scored an impressive 97 and 90 marks.

With 73% of boys achieving a Gold, Silver or Bronze certificate this is a fantastic example of Whitgift students demonstrating their passion and ability.

Trafalgar Night dinner

Choristers

ORGAN INAUGURAL CONCERT

Croydon Minster is a Grade I listed building with a history dating back to Saxon times. The organ was built in 1869 by the distinguished organ builder William Hill & Sons. It is central to the worship and rich choral tradition at the Minster, and also plays a pivotal role in the civic life of Croydon, taking centre stage when the town's civic community gathers. Following three years of fundraising the Minster Organ Restoration Appeal raised £250,000 and Whitgift was delighted to celebrate the arrival of the newly-restored organ with an Organ Inaugural Concert in November 2018.

The Whitgift Chamber Choir joined forces with the Choirs of Croydon Minster to perform a collection of cathedral anthems under the direction of Organist & Director of Choral Music, Mr Ronny Krippner. The concert opened with an organ piece entitled Thanksgiving, composed and played for the reopening by the Minster's Organist Laureate, Mr Martin How. This was then followed by a rendition of Benjamin Britten's festival anthem Rejoice in the Lamb which demonstrated the varied colours of the organ, the choir and percussion played by Mr John Rockliffe. There was a sense of gratitude by all for having a fully restored Minster organ which now benefits the Whitgift Foundation as well as the wider community.

PORTSMOUTH CATHEDRAL

Every term, the Whitgift Chamber Choir visits one of the UK's magnificent cathedrals to sing Choral Evensong. During the Michaelmas Term, the choir travelled to Portsmouth Cathedral to sing for the first time in what is known as 'the Cathedral of the Sea'. The service included music from Bernard Rose's Responses as well as Herbert Howells' Westminster Service. Commemorating the centenary of the end of World War I, the choir sang John Ireland's Greater love hath no man as the anthem. This provided a wonderful service and tribute in the beautiful setting of the cathedral.

Pinocchio

In October 2018, the School presented Lior Navok's musical re-imagining of the well-known tale Pinocchio. The concert was a culmination of musical collaboration between the London Myriad Ensemble (LME), an international prize-winning wind group, and the Lower First Form boys.

The concert opened with a moodsetting performance of Pinocchio from the Cantate, Bambini (by Virginia Campolieti) and moved swiftly into the story of Pinocchio. The vocal tones of Graduate

Music Assistant, Mr Liam Connery, narrated the story as the students took turns creating the sounds of footsteps, twinkling stars, along with imaginings such as sadness, longing and many other mood settings.

Each group of students was led by one of the players from LME. One group offered a largely allegoric performance of their section of text, using many extended techniques to create their sounds and sound effects, while others opted for a more reflective, sonorous experience;

quite a difficult task using only djembes, glockenspiels and other auxiliary percussion.

After Pinocchio became a real boy, and the percussion instruments were put to one side, the LME took centre stage to give the audience a demonstration of professional ensemble playing and nuanced technique. They began with the first movement of Francis Poulenc's Sextuor for wind quintet and piano by Yuki Negishi. Following on from this, composer Paul Patterson introduced his setting of Roald

Dahl's Red Riding Hood for wind quintet and piano.

It was a hugely successful performance for the Lower First boys and a unique opportunity for their families to experience quality music from the LME; made up of Ms Julie Groves (flute), Mrs Fiona Joyce Myall (oboe and Head of Woodwind at Whitgift School), Ms Nadia Wilson (clarinet), Ms Lisa Ridgway (horn) and Mr Ashley Myall (bassoon). Thank you to everyone who joined us at the concert and hope you all enjoyed the evening.





Morocco

During the half term break, 17 boys from the Lower Sixth and Fourth Forms embarked on an adventurous expedition to the Atlas Mountains and Atlantic coastline of Morocco for their Outdoor Education trip.

The trip started with a cultural day in Marrakech before they left the plains and set towards the mountains. After a couple of days of acclimatisation, the team started their ascent to the summit of Mount Toubkal, North Africa's highest mountain, before descending to basecamp in Imlil. The unusually cold weather made for a challenging trek and similar conditions met the boys at the start of the mountain biking challenge which followed. Snow and swollen rivers created an adventurous experience and the trails through the mountains provided beautiful scenery as well as testing terrain.

Filming took place in various locations around the School. showing Alan reminiscing in Andrew Quadrangle and Big School. Alan states, "I think



He reveals, "Whitgift School is all about opportunity. It has been a great opportunity for me to develop myself as a person and find my passions." Marcel continued his studies at Cambridge University and is currently studying Natural Sciences.

The full version of the video follows the stories of six alumni from all three schools and was produced to illustrate real case studies of how bursaries can change lives. The video is available to view on The Whitgift Foundation's website and has been shared on social media channels. We hope the video continues to inspire more generations of local young people to apply for the scheme.


