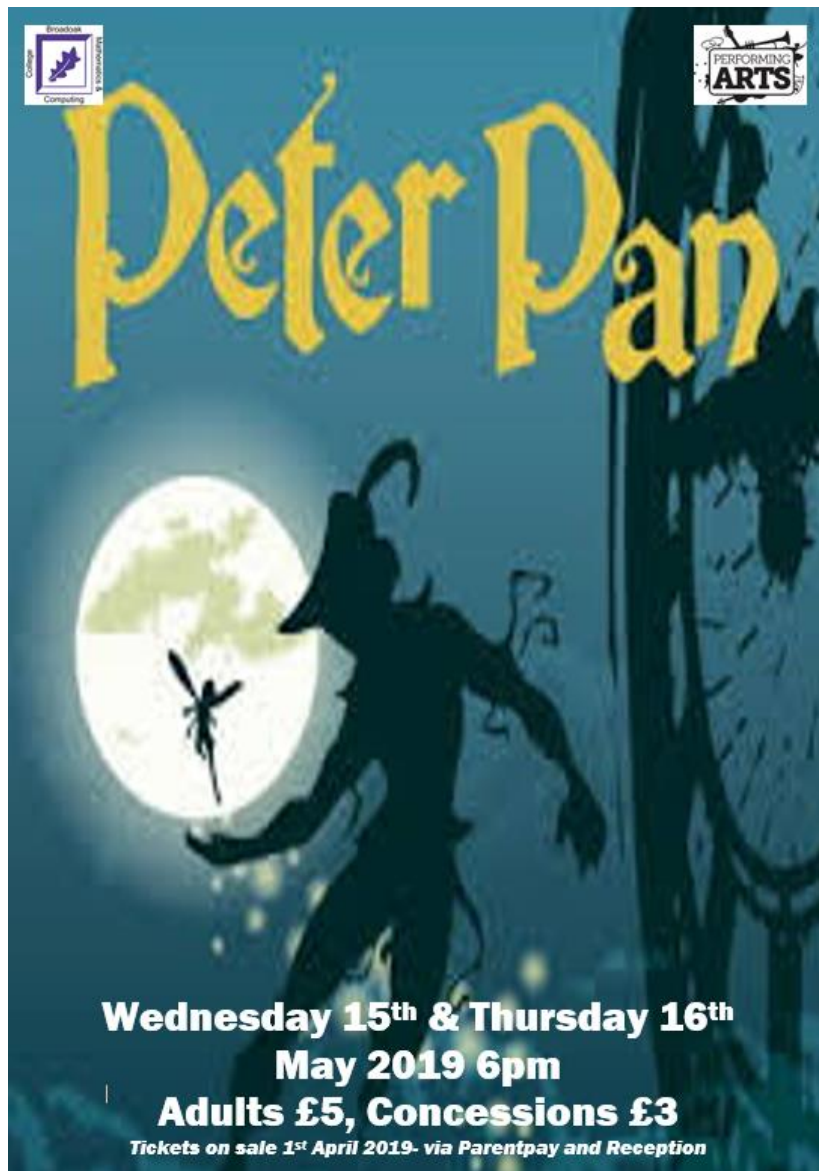


## PETER PAN REHEARSALS

5. Can people say/do whatever they want online? Why/why not?

- What is consent online and when do we need to ask for it?
- How do we ask for consent online? How do we give consent online?
- How do we say no/not give consent?
- What happens if we share something about someone else without their consent? What happens if someone doesn't want to give consent?
- How do we explain to our friends and family about consent? What would we like them to know/do?
- How do my friends and family ask for my consent and permission?
- Do you have any tips for how to show respect online and be considerate of others with what we share?

**Talk about managing privacy and data online**

- Who owns content online?
- What is copyright and how can I use and share work?
- What does the internet know about us?
- How do you sign up to things? What are terms and conditions?
- Who owns your data?
- How do connected devices, apps, games ask for my permission to collect or share my information - can I ask for that back?
- What happens if something is used without my consent?

**Talk about safety**

- Do you know where to go for help, where to find safety advice and how to use safety tools on your favourite apps and games?
- What is okay/not okay to share online? Why?
- What could you do if you saw a friend online needed some help or support?
- How do you stay safe online? What tips do you have and where do you learn them?
- Help me! Can you show me how to do something better/safer online?

## National Storytelling Week

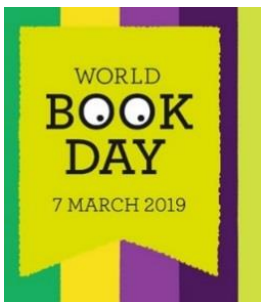
During Term 3 we celebrated National Storytelling week in style. The school participated in a range of activities as part of the celebrations.

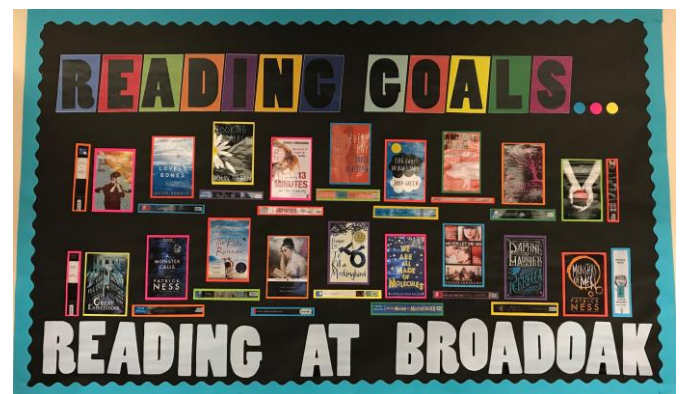
The LRC has compiled a list of some fantastic books specifically suitable for students in Years 10 and 11. There is something for everyone with a good mix of classic and contemporary fiction.

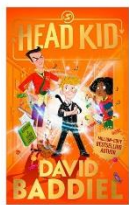
## New Books – Graphic Novels, Teenage Fiction and more!!

Students can visit the LRC every day before school, during break and lunch time to check out the great selection of fantastic new books.

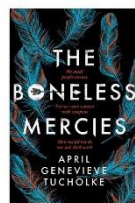

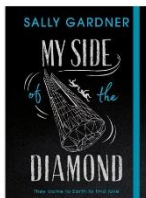

World Book Day is on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> March and once again we will be giving out the £1 World Book Day vouchers in school.

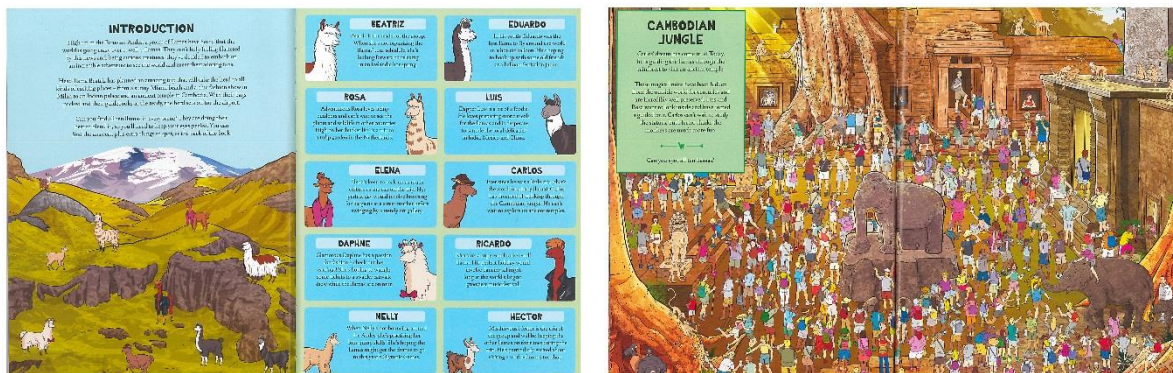
Every student will get a voucher which can either be exchanged for a special World Book Day book in the LRC on the day or at a local book seller.

The £1 vouchers can also be used towards the cost of any full priced book at most book shops worth £2.99 or more.

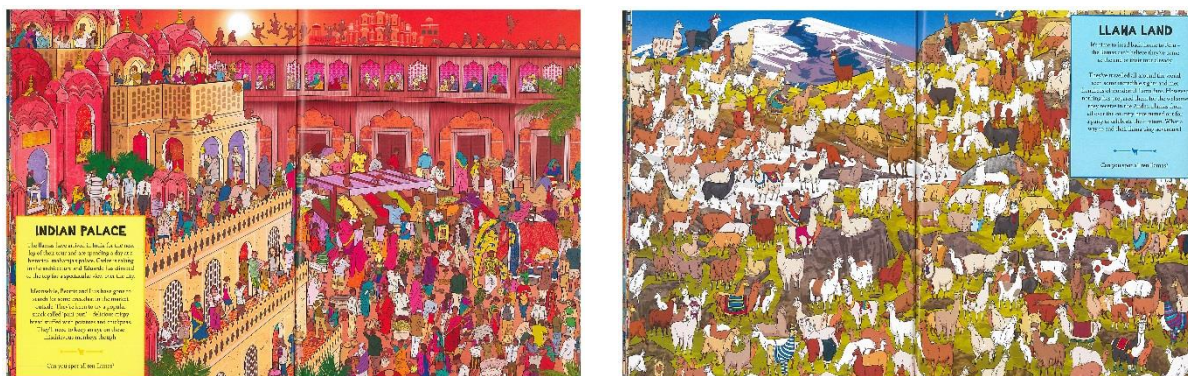




# LLAMA CHALLENGE FUNDRAISING FOR PERU

### Knitted Easter Chicks (to fit over a Crème Egg)

**You will need:**  
Any coloured double knit wool  
A pair of needles UK Size 11 (3mm)  
Orange felt for the beaks  
Black felt or thread for the eye  
Cotton wool ball/toy stuffing for head  
Coloured ribbon to finish off  
Chocolate Crème Egg (for size fit)

**Finish your Chick with a Crème Egg – it shouldn't drop out when you pick up the bunny by the head! Add a couple of extra stitches if required.**

- Cast on 20 sts
- Knit 1 row
- Inc in 1<sup>st</sup> st, k8, inc into next 2 sts, knit to end (23 sts)
- Inc in 1<sup>st</sup> st, k9, inc into next 2 sts, knit to end (26 sts)
- Inc in 1<sup>st</sup> st, k11, inc into next 2 sts, knit to end (29 sts)
- Inc 1 st at the beg of every row until 42 sts are on the needle
- Cast off 11 sts at the beg of next 2 rows (20 sts)
- Increase 1 st at the beg of the next 4 rows (24 sts)
- Knit 4 rows K2, then k2tog to last 2 sts, k2 (14 sts)
- Knit 4 rows K2, then k2tog to last 2 sts, k2 (9 sts)
- Draw wool through rem 9 sts and pull tight
- With that piece of wool, sew round the edge of work to the beg st leaving the cast on edge open so that the egg can be inserted
- Stuff the head with a cotton wool ball, sew around the neck and gather in
- Sew 2 eyes with fine black wool and stick or sew a small diamond shaped piece of orange felt for the beak. Try a few beaks to get it right.
- Tie a thin piece of ribbon around the neck in a bow
- Fill with egg and check it doesn't drop out when holding chick by head. Add extra stitches to tighten if required.

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### Knitted Easter Bunnies (to fit over a Crème Egg)

**You will need:**  
Double knitting wool  
Pair of needles UK size 11  
Black thread for eyes, nose & mouth  
Length of wool for tail  
Toy filling  
Coloured ribbon to finish off

**Finish your bunny with a Crème Egg – it shouldn't drop out when you pick up the bunny by the head! Add a couple of extra stitches if required.**

- Cast on 26 sts
- Knit 1 row
- Increase in 1<sup>st</sup> st, K1, inc. in next st, then every 3<sup>rd</sup> st until 24sts, K1, inc in last st. (36st)
- Knit 11 rows
- Cast off 1st at beg of next 4 rows (32 sts)
- Cast off 6sts at beg of next 2 rows (20 sts)
- Increase 1 st at beg of next 4 rows (24 sts)
- Knit 4 rows
- K2 then K2tog to last 2sts, K2 (14 sts)
- Knit 4 rows
- K2 then K2tog to last 2sts, K2 (9 sts)
- Draw wool through rem stitches and pull tight
- Sew with that piece of wool round the edge of work to the beg stitch, leaving the cast on edge open so that egg can be inserted
- Stuff the head with toy filling, sew around neck and gather in tight, fasten off
- Fasten off, cut wool and sew in end of yarn.
- Fold ears in half lengthways and using the length of attached wool sew on towards back of head starting about 3-4 rows from the top and meeting down centre back of head
- Before cutting yarn from sewing on 2<sup>nd</sup> ear, sew a few stitches through both ears lengthways and pull tight. This helps to shape the bunny's head and hold ears together
- Embroider nose, mouth and eyes. Slightly pulling thread between the eyes helps to draw in and shape the head. Add a tail (lazy daisy stitch flower with a French knot centre works well)
- Tie a ribbon around neck

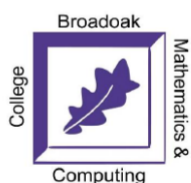

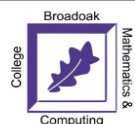

Each week, every tutor group will earn 1 point for every green (improved attendance) or gold (100% maintained) arrow that their tutees achieve.

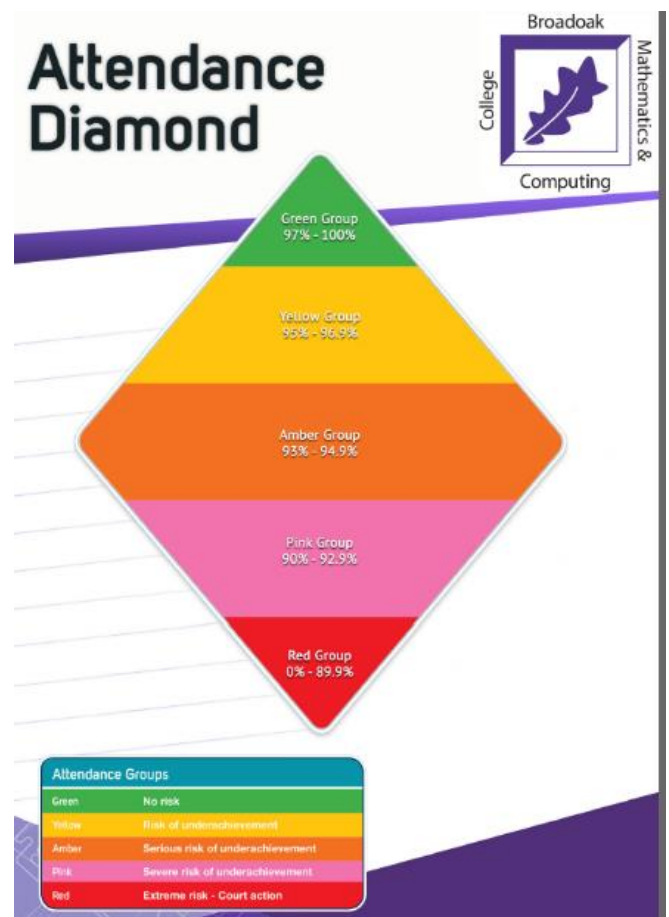
These will then be accumulated over each week of the term and a prize will be awarded to the tutor group with the most points at the end of the term.
