#### **Core Purpose:**

The core purpose of the role is to support the Science team with the delivery of practical work and other resources. As the Senior Science Technician you will be expected to lead the other technicians, coordinate the operations within the preparation room, keep all records updated and liaise with the Science Coordinator.

#### **Main Duties:**

#### Maintain the delivery of resources to the Science Department, including:

Ensuring the maintenance of a system for notification of practical requests, with appropriate notice periods and feedback to teachers on availability.

To prepare and set up equipment and materials for any of the three subject areas ready for use in accordance with manufacturer's instructions and the requirements of teaching staff in the appropriate laboratory.

To prepare and make resources, teaching aids and demonstration models for use in the teaching areas, including all aspects of any new Schemes of Work.

To provide technical advice and assistance to teachers and to assist teaching staff with the general running of practical work sessions in a non-teaching capacity.

To ensure that all equipment and materials are stored safely and to dispose of used chemicals in a safe manner as well as ensuring that hygiene and health and safety standards are maintained in the laboratory and preparation areas.

To undertake basic maintenance and cleaning of equipment and to assist in organising its servicing and repair as required in accordance with manufacturer's instructions.

To operate a safe and secure system for the storage and racking of equipment and materials ensuring that they are maintained in good condition and readily available for issue.

Administration of capitation with Science Coordinator.

To monitor levels of stock and re-order stock as appropriate. Oversee ordering of all equipment and materials and checking of deliveries in accordance with the schools financial procedures.

To maintain inventories of equipment and materials as required in particular with regard to COSHH regulations.

To assist in maintaining appropriate records, statistics and filing systems in accordance with stated requirements.

To keep up-to-date with curriculum developments within the Science area

To undertake safety checks as required and comply with the requirements of Health and Safety, COSHH and other relevant legislation and school documentation and keep records of checks carried out by all departmental staff.

To clean and make safe spills, breakages and related incidents that requires careful handling.

To remove all used/broken glassware from laboratories and ensure that equipment trollies are fully stocked with clean equipment.

To support the Science department with ensuring resources are prepared for all assessments and lessons.

To carry out specific tasks as directed by the Science Coordinator during the school holidays.

To ensure all laboratories are clear at the end of the school day and are prepared for the first lesson the following next day.

# To provide supervision and guidance to the other science technicians within the department, including:

Develop systems within the preparation room to ensure the Science department are fully supported.

Ensuring the efficient deployment of science technicians throughout the department in order to provide an effective service to teaching staff.

Providing advice and guidance to other science technicians within the department.

Setting standards of work and monitoring the standard and quality of work of the technicians to ensure support is of a high standard.

Reporting any difficulties to the Science Coordinator, as appropriate.

#### Other general responsibilities:

- To work flexibly this may include evenings, open days, parents' evenings and possibly weekends. This may also involve cover across the wider team in times of need.
- To be available to assist and undertake break duties.
- To participate fully in Staff Appraisal according to the Academy requirements.
- To participate in training and other learning activities and performance development, as required.
- To work safely, consider the safety of others and work within the guidelines stated in the Academy Health and Safety Policy.
- To comply with all decisions, policies and standing orders of the Academy; comply with statutory













requirements, including Equal Opportunities legislation, the Health and Safety at Work Act and the Data Protection Act.

- To have a commitment to Child Safeguarding, to promoting the welfare of children and young people in accordance with the Academy's agreed procedures.
- To contribute to the overall ethos/work/aims of the Academy and the Trust.
- To appreciate and support the role of other professionals.
- To recognise own strengths and areas of expertise and use these to advise and support others.
- To respond to requests in a timely manner and in line with set deadlines.

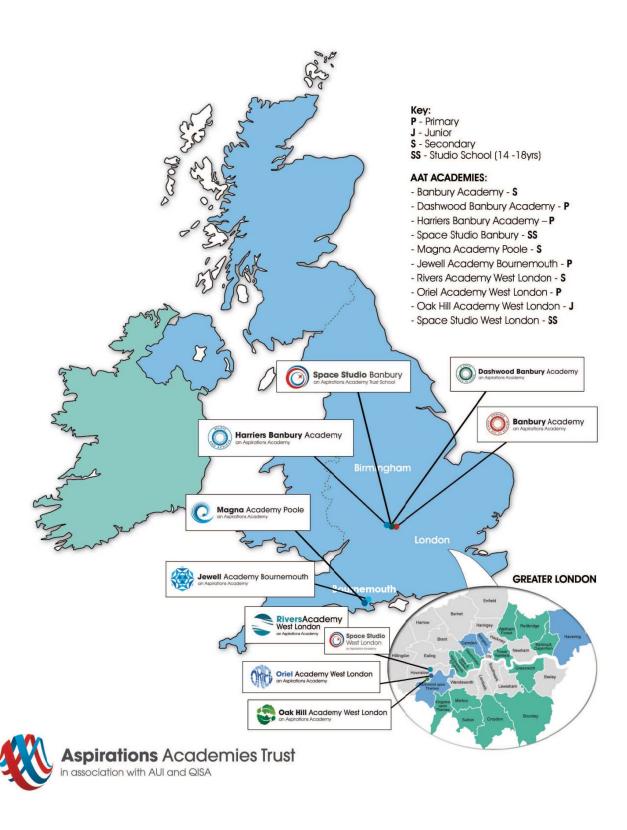

## **Continuous Professional Development**

We offer unique and bespoke training for staff at all levels. This includes Senior Leadership Training, Aspirations Training – Level 1 & 2, Polishing Pedagogy, Coaching and Mentoring. Staff will be supported to develop a positive orientation to professional learning as reflective practitioners and will be empowered to take ownership and responsibility for their professional learning and development.

We strive to embed the voice of students (for example, through My Voice, iKnow My Class Surveys and student voice and leadership developments) and the active engagement of students in the process of CPD and staff professional learning.

### **Promoting Aspirations Project**

CPD in AAT Academies will have a research orientation. All staff will be expected to engage annually in a Promoting Aspirations Project and make use of research reports to inform their practice. The Promoting Aspirations Project is undertaken over the course of an academic year. Staff can conduct their Promoting Aspirations Projects alone or in collaboration with a small group of colleagues from within their academy or across Aspirations Academies. Innovation Awards will be given to the best projects and they will be shared with other staff at the yearly forum when all staff from all academies come together for an exciting event.

My Aspirations Action Plan (MAAP) focuses everything we know about educational "next practices" into an integrated, practical system. This revolutionary, online portfolio provides students with an active voice in their own learning by allowing them to set goals and track their academic achievement and personal growth along the way.

Using progressive gaming and mobile technology, this interactive and engaging platform also invites teacher participation so they can better understand their students' personal and academic aspirations, and guide their progress toward those goals. MAAP additionally allows optional access to parents, and selected students for peer mentoring.

### Safe Recruitment Procedure

The AAT is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and young people in its academies. In order to meet this responsibility, its academies follow a rigorous selection process to discourage and screen out unsuitable applicants. This process is outlined below, but can be provided in more detail if requested.

#### **Disclosure**

This post is classified as having substantial access to children, and appointment is subject to an enhanced police check of previous criminal convictions (DBS). Applicants are required, before appointment, to disclose any conviction, caution or binding over including 'spent convictions' under the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 (Exemptions) Order 1975. Non-disclosure may lead to termination of employment. However, disclosure of a criminal background will not necessarily debar individuals from employment – this will depend upon the nature of the offence(s) and when they occurred.

#### **Shortlisting**

Only those candidates meeting the right criteria will be taken forward from application.

#### Interview

- 1. Longlisted candidates will be subject to a screening interview. Those shortlisted will take part in an in-depth interview process including a lesson observation.
- 2. Candidates will be asked to address any discrepancies, anomalies or gaps in their application form.

#### Reference checking

References from the previous and current employer will be taken up for shortlisted candidates, and where necessary employers may be contacted to gather further information.
