Our community has got a wonderful history of pulling together after tragedy. U14 Irish Open Ski Champion

Yr 8 Student Rebecca completed the 2018 artificial dry ski slope season off in style at the final round of competition held on the outskirts of Dublin, over the weekend of 6/7th October. She took first place in both events for her age group, returning home as the U14 Female Irish Open and International champion. At the Irish Open championship, she was placed 10th overall, a fabulous outcome as she was the youngest competing female athlete. This was her first overall win at this level, which is reflected in the final national seeding list released in December ,which ranks her 6th U14 female slalom skier in England and Wales.

Rebecca continued her good form into December when she won her own club championships at both U14 and overall female categories. She now has a winter of hard training ahead in preparation for the start of the 2019 season in May, which will be her first season as an U16 athlete.

She is quite rightly very proud of her achievements, which are hard earned, as she needs to train hard and really dedicate herself to her chosen sport. This can result in some painful injuries, which makes her no stranger to x rays and bandages!

We look forward to learning of her future successes, well done Rebecca!

Junior Football Leadership Award

The course was held over two days, with a total of 32 students. The group of students were taught the rules of football and how to respect the game. During the course, students were separated into groups of 6. Within these groups, the students had to plan a football activity that they were given and then to coach in front of their peers. Each student showed outstanding leadership, communication and teamwork skills throughout their planned sessions.

After everyone finished coaching their planned sessions, each student was given the chance to become a referee or manager. An FA coach gave them instructions as a manager to be negative or positive towards individual players. This was to ensure every student had the experience of understanding how a player feels throughout the game as well as the manager.

Overall the course was a massive success with increasing numbers from last year. Great sportsmanship from all who took part.









Premier League Enterprise Challenge

Six Year 8 students, *Hannah*, *Rebecca*, *Will*, *Theo*, *Jack and Jess* were chosen to take part in the 2018 Premier League Enterprise Challenge. The Enterprise Challenge was to come up with a business plan to attract 18-23 year olds to buy Bolton Wanderers season tickets. They had to make a power-point presentation which contained ideas for different packages to attract this age bracket to the games. The 6 worked together in a good team for just under 8 weeks and put together a great presentation to present to the judges.





The students said "Presentation day was 23rd November 2018, we were taken to a box at the ground on the 'Nat Lofthouse' stand side. We practiced our presentation to make sure we were word perfect. We were then very lucky to be taken on a tour of the stadium, we were able to walk through the tunnel where the players walk out on to the pitch, see the difference in changing rooms, the press office (where we got to sit in the chairs like the managers themselves), we also went to the top of the stadium where the media go on match days. We were then ready to present! We were confident, prepared and polite towards the judges. They were really impressed by our ideas and the way we presented it. Despite losing out to 1st place by just 1 point we all know we did ourselves and the school proud. We all had a really fun day and it is something we will remember when we are older. We wouldn't have been able to do it without the support of Bolton Wanderers and the support of our Student Support leader. Thank you Miss Goffett for all your time and support during the last 8 weeks."





Planning Permission Granted - School Improvements

We are excited to have had planning permission passed for the building project commencing early in 2019. Bolton Council has undertaken a process of identifying how they can create much needed school places in the area. This exercise identified that Westhoughton High School should expand to take in 40 additional students per year. This will change the pupil admission number, resulting in the whole school population gradually increasing to 1350.

To accommodate this increase in pupils, and to provide more up to date facilities, the school is working with the Local Authority and Good & Tillotson Architects to build a new block containing classrooms, demolish a current building and replace it with a new toilet block, and redevelop the outside social spaces for our students. The school will also be undertaking some internal refurbishment works to improve existing buildings. The new block is due to be ready for September 2019 with the other work quickly following.








Open Evening Competitions


Parent to School Communication

This message is received and routed appropriately to the correct person within school and ensures that a response is given.



Parent Portal

The Parent Portal is a single place where you can view school information for one or more children. With a Parent Portal Code provided by school, you can register and view attendance, behaviour and achievements, parent letters, school calendar, parent communication, homework and more.

National Apprenticeship Show

As part of our careers programme, 100 students from years 10 and 11 took the opportunity to visit the National Apprenticeship Show North West held at Bolton Arena. Students had the opportunity to have an employer encounter with a range of organisations which offer apprenticeships to students at the age of 16 and 18. Our students were able to appreciate the diverse range of apprenticeships on offer to them and obtained an understanding of how they might access them.

As a follow up, several year 11 students attended a workshop where they registered with the National Apprenticeship website, while a number of GCSE Science classes had an encounter with apprentices from MBDA. As a school we are keen to give our students plenty of opportunities to gain an appreciation of apprenticeships as a post 16 pathway.















Youth Speaks Competition

Rotary Past President Phil Wood welcomed the teams from both Westhoughton and Ladybridge High Schools saying how delighted the Rotarians and their guests were at the prospect of a keen competition between the schools and their Senior and Intermediate teams.

After the teams drew for the order of presentation, Ladybridge Intermediate spoke first stating that younger generations were not being sufficiently prepared for their future lives and potential careers. They said that the problem was not just in schools but also in their homes. For example, teachers weren't encouraging creativity and the over protectiveness of parents was preventing the development of individual resilience.

Next, Westhoughton Seniors asked why our communities were falling apart. As more time was being spent with virtual friends on social networks, people were losing contact with real people with many not even knowing their neighbours. Indra Lilley explained how students were finding that new contacts with local people through initiatives like 'Let's Share Christmas' were equally rewarding for both pupils and local older people alike. He told the audience how he'd been learning to play dominoes at the Senior Solutions Carers' Group. Chairperson Natalie Rea and proposer Evie Munroe added their thoughts on how little things could make a real difference.

Westhoughton Intermediate team then gave an impassioned plea on behalf of hard pressed teachers, worrying that the pressures on them were causing stress if they were required to teach topics which could best be learned through parents acting as good role models.

Ladybridge Senior team's presentation was intriguingly entitled "We are more than pink or blue" by explaining their concern about the constraints imposed by preconceived stereotypes. Career aspirations were being affected with girls being less likely to study STEM subjects and boys being reluctant to enter nursing. The need for men to be manly or be seen as potential 'knights in shining armour' risked depression if they failed to live up to such expectations..

On behalf of the judges, President Bernard Howes announced the results of the competition saying how impressed they had been with the choice of relevant topics delivered with passion by all four teams. They were delighted that the standard seemed to go up each year with schools building on their experience of previous competitions.

The overall winners were Westhoughton High School Intermediate team of Chloe Pritchard, chairperson, Charlotte Rea, speaker and Louis Fitzpatrick, proposer of the vote of thanks. They and the Westhoughton Senior Team would be going forward to the next stage in the competition, to be held in Bolton in February. The Jack Cowburn Cup was then presented to the winners by Bernard Howes & Margaret Cowburn, together with a book token for each winning team member. All of the competitors were congratulated on their performances and presented with individual certificates. In closing, Phil Wood added his congratulations and thanks to everyone involved in an excellent and inspiring evening.


Kindness Army
