OUR FIRST EVER WOMEN IN LEADERSHIP EVENT

TKAT was delighted to host our first Women in Leadership event, one of our most successful conferences ever. Around 75 delegates attended the day in person or virtually, and 94% of evaluation responses said that the programme and its impact were excellent.

TKAT CEO Dr Karen Robert's presentation on her path to leadership moved one participant to say, "I was blown away listening to Karen's career journey."

The Learning and Development team put together a fantastic line-up of speakers:

Our Chair of Trustees Gaenor Bagley rounded off the event excellently. One delegate concluded, "It was an amazing day, I'm proud to work for a Trust that recognises the need for this type of event"

ORCHARDS GETS GREEN LIGHT FOR A RE-BUILD

Orchards Academy, based in Swanley, has successfully secured funding to be rebuilt as part of the School Rebuilding Programme, announced by the Government in 2020.

The news marks the end of a year-long campaign led by the local MP Laura Trott, alongside local councillors and TKAT.

The school joined TKAT in November 2010 and since then it has become one of the most improved schools in the country and is rated as good by Ofsted.

Following the announcement, Laura Trott MP said, "I'm delighted. It's been wonderful to see the local community truly get behind this campaign."

Executive Headteacher Natalie Willbourn said, "Being able to learn and work in modern, state-of-the-art buildings will be transformational. We're all proud of our school, now we'll be proud of the buildings too."



GARFIELD WESTON FOUNDATION SUPPORTS TKAT ACE TUTORS

In the summer term, we were delighted to learn that we had secured £90,000 in funding from the Garfield Weston Foundation to support TKAT ACE Tutors across all

The aim of the Garfield Weston Foundation (www.garfieldweston.org) is to support charities that have effective solutions to helping those most in need.

The TKAT ACE (a champion for every child) programme is designed to give 1:1 support to pupils and their

families on a regular and sustained basis, so that they can identify and overcome any challenges to learning.

From January 2021, 7 TKAT schools piloted the programme, and it is now running in all TKAT schools from this September.

TKAT CEO Dr Karen Roberts said, "We were absolutely delighted to hear that we had been successful in our bid. The funding will make a significant difference as we look to roll out TKAT ACE Tutors more widely, more quickly and more sustainably to the children and families who will most benefit from this work."

SEAL PRIMARY WINS READING COMPETITION

Children at Seal Primary Academy, Selsey were delighted to learn that they 'd come top of the class in a reading competition and won 300 books plus shelving for their library.

The competition was sponsored by Renaissance Learning, who provide 'Accelerated Reader' across all our schools. This offers reading assessments and engaging quizzes and activities to help hone students' reading skills and develop a love for reading, and it is an integral part of our Trust's reading strategy.

Entrants to the competition read a total of over 12,000 books.

Seal's Headteacher, Melanie Strachan said: "It is so lovely to know that our children are understanding and enjoying the books they're reading. We are delighted with our prize. The new books will strengthen the reading culture at Seal even more!"

Dr Mandy Hartley, a published children's author and DNA scientist, awarded the prize.

Her book 'The DNA Detectives - To Catch a Thief' won the ASE Book award. She commented, "It is so pleasing to see reading taking its rightful position at the heart of the curriculum. Well done to Seal Primary Academy."

PARTNERSHIP WITH PHYSICS PARTNERS

TKAT is delighted to be working in partnership with the dynamic educational charity Physics Partners (www.physicspartners.com).

Their mission is to provide hands-on training and support for non-specialist and newly qualified physics teachers in state secondary schools.

NOMINEE FOR PRIMARY HEADTEACHER OF THE YEAR

We were absolutely delighted to learn that Susan Manzi was one of the nominees for Primary Headteacher of the Year at the National Teaching Awards, and received a Certificate of Excellence in

recognition of her achievement.

Susan's response on hearing the news was, "This is strange territory for me - I like praising other people!"

Susan has just retired after almost 20 years at East Wickham Primary Academy, where she was headteacher when it was the first non-secondary school to join TKAT in 2011.

One of Susan's career highlights was taking on East Wickham Junior School in 2012 when it was in special measures, amalgamating the 2 schools, and leading it to become one of the top 250 schools in the country for outcomes.

VIRTUAL OXFORD UNIVERSITY DAY

Although we weren't able to attend in person this year, we were honoured to be invited by St Peter's College at Oxford University to attend their first ever virtual access day, exclusively for TKAT students.

St Peter's College is rightly

proud of its work to widen access and help more and more state school pupils to see that Oxbridge could be for them.

Derek Hewlett, Head of Sixth Form at Hylands School, said "The Oxford open day arranged by TKATwas a huge success. It allowed our students to realise that they are more than capable of applying to top universities. After completing the day, our students were all excited to start their applications, and were all inspired to aim high and apply to Oxbridge or a Russell Group university."

Each of our 7 school sixth forms was invited to bring 4 of their Year 12 students to the day. It started with an introduction to Oxford life, with very useful tips on the application process and interviews. Then there was a choice of an artsbased or science-based academic taster session.

Our sixth formers had the chance to hear from current Oxford undergraduates, and ask them their burning questions about student life. The day finished with a video tour of Oxford and the university.

A Hylands School student said, "The open day was really informative; the opportunity to interact with an academic at the cutting edge of research left me fascinated and strengthened my motivation to study at a top university. The admissions tutors provided lots of useful information that I've used in my university application."

Professor Judith Buchanan, the Master of St Peter's College, said "I'm delighted to hear that the students enjoyed their day."

OUTSTANDING OXBRIDGE RESULT AT DEBDEN PARK

Debden Park High School was absolutely delighted that three of its former Year 13 pupils had offers to Oxbridge.

Overall, ninety percent of their sixth formers secured their first choice university after another set of outstanding A-Level results.

Executive headboy Max Bolton will be studying philosophy, politics and economics (PPE) at University College, Oxford. He said, "I've had a fantastic seven years at Debden Park and am so grateful for all the support they have given me to help me. I couldn't have done it without them."

Ashwin Gohil has been offered a place to read history at Emmanuel College, Cambridge, and Anil Chatterjee has been offered a place to study human, social and political science at Lucy Cavendish College, Cambridge.

The school and staff put in a huge amount of effort to identify and nurture the potential of all their students, and just one example of that is their work to encourage their sixth formers to aim high with their university choices, and to support them through the application process.

Headteacher Helen Gascoyne said: "We are delighted with the excellent achievement of our students. Despite the disruption of the last 18 months, our students have been rewarded for all the hard work they put in. We are pleased that the exam boards recognised the rigour with which our teachers approached these assessments, with no grades being changed."

MEET TKAT TRUSTEE JOHN HARRSION

John Harrison

What is one of your best school memories?

I really enjoyed my school years. I remember the excitement of getting BBC micro computers and being introduced to IT in lessons for the first time.

Prior to that the only school computer filled a room. I remember the teachers letting us 'play' on the new machines and how quickly they became central to our lives both in and outside of school.

What career did you choose and why?

I started as a maths teacher and spent the last 10 years as a headteacher before I retired. The fact that I enjoyed school, had fun whilst learning and was lucky enough to have some really excellent and engaging teachers fired my enthusiasm and was responsible for me becoming a teacher. I wanted to share my enjoyment of learning and especially of maths. I absolutely loved my time in the classroom, and was very lucky to work with some amazing colleagues.

Why did you become a TKAT Trustee?

What did TKAT do well in 2020/21?

The biggest success was the way TKAT schools worked together to support one another in coping with the pandemic and all the additional difficulties it brought. The way school staff and leaders kept their 'eye on the ball' and kept teaching and learning going whilst supporting children and families through such difficult times is something everyone within TKAT should be immensely proud of.

What is a key priority for 2021/22?

I chair the education committee and it's great to hear about the progress of the ACE (A Champion for Every child) pilot.

It is really exciting that we are ahead of the game with this home grown initiative that rolls out across all TKAT schools this year. There is an underlying determination to support those pupils most in need, close attainment gaps, and help children achieve their academic and career aspirations.

SUPPORTING OUR EARLY CAREER TEACHERS AT TKAT

The Learning and Development Team has been really pleased to welcome colleagues back to the Atkins Centre this term.

One of their priorities is support for our early career teachers (ECTs), who are just at the start of their teaching journey and were previously known as newly qualified teachers (NQTs).

It was the launch of the Early Career Framework where teachers found out about the new two year programme of training and support and started exploring some of the key aspects of the framework.

The schools' induction coordinators had done a fantastic job ensuring so many

ECTs could get out to this event, and over 130 teachers attended one of the three days in September.

There was lots of positive feedback about how useful the day had been but also how good it was to meet other ECTs and have the opportunity to be in a room together again.



BUILDING HEALTHY HABIT HEROES AT SELSEY

The Academy, Selsey was really pleased at the start of term to learn that it had won £3,000 in funding from the CPL Group (www.cpl.group). This is an education-owned charity that provides procurement services to members and clients.

The funding will support the school's work to build healthy habit heroes. This project complements TKAT ACE - a champion for every child, and provides additional support to Year 7 students who need it most with their transition to secondary school. They work together with a number of partners such as Action Your Potential, ImpactEd, and Albion in the Community, which is run by Brighton and Hove Football Club.

Headteacher Jo Ford said, "This project provides invaluable support to students most in need, and it is helping our school community to grow."

CONTINUED SUPPORT FROM COMPUTERS 4 KIDS

Set up by Colin Hill in response to the BBC's Make a Difference campaign, the charity **Computers4Kids** has continued with its wonderful support for TKAT schools.

In 2020/21, the charity was able to help a number of our primary schools with good quality second hand devices that supported children with their remote learning at home.

This term, they have come up trumps every time we've asked them if they were able to help out our secondary schools.

Chichester High School received 20 desktops to support its students with their

ever-expanding offer of sports courses.

Havant Academy secured 30 IPads to support pupils with their tutoring and additional

support.

Craig Noble, the new headteacher at Havant, said, "a huge thank you to Computers4Kids for the excellent news. This IT will really help pupils at Havant!"

DUKE OF EDINBURGH SCHEME IN MORE TKAT SCHOOLS

The Duke of Edinburgh Award team (www.dofe.org) has very generously offered to support two of our schools, Orchards and Rainham School for Girls, to expand their delivery of

the programme for their students.

Their significant funding and advice will help the schools to train up leaders, buy equipment for expeditions, and help less advantaged students with the participation costs. Since the Duke of Edinburgh's Award started 65 years ago, almost 7 million young people have taken part. The programme has Gold, Silver and Bronze levels, and young people aged 14 - 24 can join.

TKAT hosted its first ever Wellbeing Week in the summer term, with a variety of events and publications to highlight what individuals can do to promote their own positive mental health and wellbeing, and to encourage our staff, pupils and families to support each other.

TKAT schools participated in a "Pay It Forward" exercise, helping others by doing good deeds. Schools were also invited to deliver a special assembly to their pupils which promoted awareness of the importance of keeping well.

TKAT SCHOOLS GIVE BACK TO THEIR COMUNITIES

Ten TKAT schools have signed up to be part of the First Give programme in 2021/22. First Give (www.firstgive.co.uk) is a charity that runs a subsidised and fully resourced social action programme for schools. Since it was set up in 2014, First Give has worked with over 115,000 students.

Through a series of workshops and lessons, students are encouraged and supported to identify a local charity or a charity that resonates with them, plan and deliver a series of fundraising activities, and present at a programme

finale to their school community, parents and the charities involved. The winner at the finale secures an additional £1,000 from First Give for their chosen charity, on top of the money students have raised themselves. Teachers say that the programme really ignites the spark of social conscience in participating students.





We continued to have a series of very positive Ofsted visits right through the summer term, such as at **Grays Farm**, **Hylands**, **Orchards**, **Portfield**, **The Mill** and **Thomas Bennett**.

I was delighted with the quality of the Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) training that **Sara Walton** and **Scott Wilson** led for TKAT and external colleagues. I received a tremendous number of emails telling me how high the quality of training was and how great they are.

Cleeve Meadow and **The Academy Selsey** have received Skills Builder awards in recognition of their commitment to developing essential life skills in young people through the curriculum and school careers events.

I had a really enjoyable visit to **Bewbush**. The determination of **Christine Dickens** has really transformed the appearance of the school, and the way that The Bewbush vision is communicated is so simple but highly effective.

Also in Crawley, thank you to **Dave Tow** and his team at **Broadfield**, who as well as being a pilot school for our external safeguarding audits, hosted a visit at the start of term from the CEO.

Talking about our CEO, Karen hosted a wonderful afternoon tea for headteachers, the executive team and trustees. I have lost count of the number of people who have said how much they appreciated having primary, secondary and corporate colleagues together. It was something we have been missing for 18 months, and it truly felt like a family event.

We remain grateful and appreciative of the way in which schools and in particular school leaders have adapted to so many unpredictable and unexpected urgent situations recently and still manage to keep the children at the heart of everything they do.

And finally, it was lovely to hear about the Teaching Assistant at **Weyfield** who in her own time and out of her own pocket makes a bespoke full-size birthday cake for every child in her class.
