Student Life

Students who feel good about themselves are much more likely to believe they can achieve anything. We set them challenging personal targets and we provide the support they need to meet those targets and to exceed them.

Each and every child has a Form Tutor. Each year group is guided by an Achievement Coordinator and an Assistant Achievement Coordinator. Their aim is to ensure that every individual makes progress in their achievement and personal development. The Achievement Coordinators are also supported by Associate Headteachers who lead on all matters pastoral. This way there is always someone on hand to meet a student's needs.

We make sure that students who work hard, help others and show responsibility in their behaviour are properly recognised through our awards system. Commitment and success in all activities including music and sport are celebrated.



Ready to Learn (r2L) Merit System -Years 7 and 8

This merit point system is designed to encourage students to become independent, resilient and successful learners, able to show that they are 'Ready to Learn' in lessons.

Merit badges are awarded in addition to certificates for the Gold Star and Platinum awards.

Star Awards – Year 9

For consistent hard work, reliability with homework, equipment etc and a polite and cooperative attitude in class.



Senior Curriculum Awards – Years 10 and 11

The awards are Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum, and Platinum Plus. If a student achieves the highest award she will receive an engraved pen along with her certificate.

Commendation

Awards are presented in recognition of hard work and encouraging academic progress.

Attendance Certificates

Are awarded to girls who achieve 100% attendance in a term.

Full Sports Colours

In the form of a special tie - Years 10 and 11 for excellence in, or service to, a particular sport or sports in general over an extended period of time. Lapel badges are awarded to girls in the lower school who have shown excellence and/or commitment to sport over a long period of time.

Music Colours

In the form of a special tie are awarded from Year 8 onwards for outstanding commitment to a range of extra-curricular Music clubs.

Behaviour for Learning (BfL) Awards

Students are given a BfL mark each lesson. The girls with greatest number of 1s awarded in a term from each form will be presented with a certificate and badge.

Departmental Awards

There are many opportunities to achieve recognition within individual curriculum areas with awards such as, for example, Student of the Term, Geographical Genius or by taking part in departmental competitions. Some awards reflect attainment, others relate to commitment or enthusiasm for a subject.

During the school year there will be a parents/carers' meeting where parents/carers will be able to meet their child's teachers and discuss her progress. Our Curriculum

We are passionate about excellence in education, giving students the very best start in life. We teach a highly challenging academic curriculum for all students. Our students are members of a school community where their teachers are all experts who love their subjects. By setting the highest expectations in terms of learning, behaviour and attendance, our students develop a sense of purpose. As a result this is a school that provides a happy, calm and confident environment is peaceful and calm in lessons and in corridors.

Our extensive curriculum is broad and balanced, giving all students the opportunity to develop their potential. A wide range of learning and teaching strategies is used to involve students actively in the learning process. Progress is carefully assessed and monitored.

Religious Education

Religious Education is taught as a separate subject in Years 7-9 and as part of the Religious and PSHCE programme in Years 10, 11 and the Sixth Form. It is also offered as an examination subject at GCSE and A level.

Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education

A programme of PSHCE is presented by form teachers during lessons set aside for the purpose. The PSHCE courses, covering a wide range of topics, are devised on a year group basis. Sixth Form students follow their own Personal and Professional Development programme. An occasional Alternative Curriculum Day supplements the PSHCE programme.

Sex and Relationships Education

Sex and Relationships Education is provided at various stages, through science, religious education and PSHCE. This includes not only the facts of human reproduction but also the personal and moral issues.

We aim to make assemblies, Religious Education and Sex Education acceptable to all, but parents/ carers can ask for their child to be withdrawn if they so wish.

Assemblies

Each student takes part twice weekly in our programme of vertical assemblies and/or Year and Form assemblies.



Our Curriculum

Key Stage 3 (Years 7 to 9)

At the start of Year 7, students are placed in appropriate groups for lessons, using information from primary schools to ensure appropriate levels of challenge and support. Setting is then introduced gradually, as each subject requires.

All students study:

Art , Design and Technology, English, French or Spanish, Geography, History, Mathematics, Music, Performing Arts, Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education, Physical Education, Religious Education, Science, Computing.

Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11)

Our experienced teachers provide students entering Key Stage 4 and College with careful guidance in their choice of traditional and vocational subject, so that each student's personalised learning programme suits his or her interests and talents.

Business Studies, Travel and Tourism Every student takes part in non GCSE PE, RE, PSHCE and Citizenship Education and Careers.

Students receive careers education and guidance from the beginning of Year 9 until they leave school.

Individual interviews take place in Years 10 and 11 and parents/carers are invited to attend.

A work experience programme is an important part of the Year 10 curriculum and is also offered to all Sixth Form students. We have developed sound links with local industry and commerce, representatives of which support our governing body.

Through first class links with local firms, national businesses and the community, students benefit from opportunities to experience the world of work and appreciate.

Admissions Policy

An Information Evening is held during the Autumn term for all prospective Year 7 students and their parents/carers together with a Saturday morning open session towards the end of the Summer term for Years 4, 5 and 6. This gives an opportunity for you to see the school and meet staff. All students who are offered places are invited to spend four days in school in the summer term. This helps them to feel comfortable in their new surroundings and to get to know each other and their teachers.

We maintain close links with our main partner primary schools. Students coming to us from those schools are visited by a senior member of staff during the summer term.
