Foundation for Future Learning

A parent recently said that being in the Salisbury Cathedral School Pre-Prep department is like a great big hug. I was thrilled because we want our pupils to love coming to school. The minute they walk in they feel warm, welcomed and nurtured. Their happiness is our priority, but don't be fooled, it's much more than just child's play. The Pre-Prep years build the foundation for future learning.

From Nursery to Year 2 our broad and exciting curriculum is centred around four key values: Courage, Kindness, Creativity and Thinking. Initially we help our youngest pupils develop a strong sense of independence. They need courage to come into school with confidence, take responsibility for their belongings and participate in the wide range of activities on offer daily. From day one we model kindness, teaching pupils how to think of others before themselves. Our bright and engaging classrooms promote creativity along with continually evolving, multi-sensory lesson plans.

The value of thinking is represented daily in so many ways, including teaching the vital literacy and numeracy skills required for pupils to access all subjects as they move through the school. Small classes with high staff ratios allow us to read with every child daily to enable and encourage a love of books. We do this indoors and outside, often dressing up and getting involved as we always love to lift our learning off the page.

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Breadth of Opportunity



Our Prep department, Years 3 to 8, is notable for the breadth of opportunity afforded to the children. A carefully planned provision of vigorous academic learning caters for all with access both to learning support for those who require additional help, and additional study for those preparing scholarship applications to senior schools. Academic rigor is balanced by a broad co-curricular programme, designed to deliver our mission to develop the whole child, preparing them to make a positive influence in the world.

Academic, pastoral and co-curricular activities are supported by a wider framework of values selected to inspire pupils to conduct themselves with integrity and develop their talents to the best of their ability. Behaviour representing our eight core values – Community, Creativity, Discovery, Leadership, Resilience, Self-discipline, Teamwork and Thinking - is regularly rewarded.

A series of leadership opportunities imparts a sense of seniority to the Upper Prep pupils, Years 7 and 8. Every child takes a turn to welcome guests, speak in assembly, host events, work alongside younger children and generally represent the school at every opportunity. It is inspirational to watch the children grow into their role as school ambassadors and reap the rewards of increased confidence and ability.

Innovators of Tomorrow

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I believe there is a real responsibility to inspire and enable our children to become the innovators of tomorrow, and the sooner we start, the better. That's why we engage with our pupils about the interconnectedness of science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) early. Our teachers regularly highlight real-world examples of STEM solutions to pressing issues and our clubs provide opportunitie for hands-on experience.

Most recently, we challenged the children to design and build robots that could stand upright or navigate within set parameters. As a group we reflected on the real-world usage of the technology in automatic vacuum cleaners and lawnmowers, for example, and discussed how further applications could be developed. Another project which generated much excitement in class was building rockets to utilise a high-pressure launch system. The pupils experimented with fins for stability and different materials and shapes for aerodynamics. Who knew trigonometry, for calculating how high they would fly, could be so much fun?

An Impressive number of Scholarships

Overcoming Challenges

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Returning to Salisbury Cathedral School as an adult made me realise what a unique and privileged experience I was given and how my years at the school helped shape who I am today. In particular was the encouragement from teachers to overcome challenges and to think outside the box.

One such challenge was that of my dyspraxia, whereby despite my enthusiasm for sport, I was considered somewhat hazardous when armed with a hockey stick. A solution was found in the form of goalkeeping, whereby my clumsiness and talent for getting in the way was transformed into a rather useful blocking skill. Making the 1st XV whilst only in Year 5 was a turning point, and I was soon sent by an enthusiastic and supportive teacher for extra practice with a local club. From there I rose through the levels of county and regional selection, made the Salisbury Ladies 1st team aged 13 and began my steps on the pathway to Junior International selection.
