Opened in 1954, the school was named after Hywel Elfed Lewis 1860-1953, the renowned bard and scholar who served as Archdruid of the National Eisteddfod of Wales from 1924 to 1928. In 1967 it became a Senior Comprehensive, serving a wide catchment area, including Buckley, Hawarden, Mynydd Isa, Saltney, Caergwrle and Hope. The school became fully comprehensive in 1973.

The school was rated Excellent by Estyn in 2015.

Elfed High School is a mixed comprehensive school maintained by Flintshire County Council. We provide excellent learning opportunities for the whole community of Buckley, including our partner schools: Mountain Lane, Westwood, Southdown and Drury Primary Schools and beyond.

Students can learn in a calm and safe learning environment where everyone is included. They benefit from excellent facilities with modern laboratories, studios and workshops. Our theatre, music suite and drama studio are very well used to develop skills in the Arts. The indoor swimming pool, full sized allweather pitch, gymnasia and sports hall are shared with the Buckley Leisure Centre, providing a wide range of sports activities outside school hours.

Learning

As an 'Outstanding Learning Community', learning is at the heart of everything we do at Elfed High School. We support our students to become ambitious capable learners, enterprising creative contributors, ethical informed citizens and healthy confident individuals.

Learning in Years 7, 8 and 9

Subjects include: English, Mathematics, Science, Welsh, Art, French, Geography, History, Information Technology, Music, Drama, Religious Studies, Wellbeing, Physical Education, Technology and Personal and Social Education.

Learning in Years 10 and 11

Individual learning pathways enable everyone to study the subjects they find interesting. Optional subjects include Geography, History, French, Music, Art, ICT, Business Studies, Travel and Tourism, Event Operations, Hospitality, Separate Sciences, Engineering, Drama, Media Studies, Sport, Physical Education, Psychology and Philosophy and Ethics.

We offer bespoke pathways where needed; for example some students will access vocational courses at local colleges.

All students study English Language and English Literature, Mathematics and Mathematics: Numeracy, Science, Welsh, Religious Studies, Skills Challenge Certificate, Wellbeing and Physical Education.



All students have a work placement that helps them to learn about the world of work, with local employers providing some excellent placements.

Religious Education and Collective Worship

Religious Studies are broadly non-denominational and part of the curriculum for all students. Students are involved in daily collective worship, based on a moral or religious theme, including a prayer.

Health and Wellbeing: Sex and Relationships Education

Learning about sex and relationships is set in the context of social responsibility and personal relationships are discussed in relation to parenthood and family.

Elfed Extra

Elfed Extra is an exciting and significant programme of activities that take place before school, during lunchtime and after school. Some examples of activities include the opportunity to:

How we check on progress

We support every student to make the best possible progress and update parents and carers regularly throughout the year.

Each half term, students complete a Quality Marked Assessment (QMA) in each subject. Teachers provide feedback based around the QMA and students are given time to respond to their teacher's feedback to further improve their work.

Teachers monitor attitude and progress towards challenging personal targets. There are regular updates on student wellbeing and a full annual written report on progress and achievement. Families are invited to meet with staff at Progress Evenings and at any other time to suit them.

Learning

Developing Students' Skills Across the Curriculum

Literacy

The development of students' literacy skills is a key focus across Elfed High School, where the National Literacy Framework is embedded across the subjects we deliver in Years 7, 8 and 9. A love of reading is encouraged through access to our well resourced library, which is open to students during break and lunchtime. Students engage in structured time to read during Active Tutorial sessions and participate in the 'Accelerated Reader' programme, which ensures that reading is appropriately challenging for the needs of each individual reader.





Effective speaking and listening skills, and being able to write accurately and extensively, are skills that are developed across all subjects that students study. The key vocabulary that students need to learn and use is outlined in the Learning Plans for each unit of work. We encourage creativity and a love of literature through key events, such as 'Roald Dahl' day and visits from poets such as Levi Tafari and regular writing competitions. The 'Literacy Day' each year further champions the importance of literacy, and provides parents with useful strategies that support the development of literacy skills at home.



Numeracy

The Mathematics Department at Elfed delivers a well-established Numeracy programme in Years 7, 8 and 9 in which all students are taught to be confident, resilient, ambitious and enterprising mathematicians.

Excellent classroom routines are established and maintained through starter tests, homework booklets and targeted interventions which support student progress and enable consistently above average National Numeracy Test results.

All students in Years 7, 8 and 9 participate in a weekly problem-solving lesson, through which their reasoning skills are developed to provide an excellent foundation for both the GCSE Mathematics and GCSE Numeracy courses. Students who excel at GCSE are rewarded with the further opportunity to sit Additional Mathematics, whilst all students complete a further Level 2 Personal Finance qualification.

Extensive support is offered to students outside of the classroom, including homework club and afterschool revision sessions, as well as preparation for the national UKMT maths challenges and opportunities to represent Elfed in team competitions. Further extracurricular opportunities include our annual PGL Trip, becoming one of our Maths Lead Learners, or through participating in one of our enterprising initiatives such as 'Make £5 Grow'. The annual 'Numeracy Day' provides further opportunities to develop students' numeracy skills, and provides guidance for parents on how numeracy skills can be developed at home.

Students have extensive opportunities to develop their numeracy skills across the curriculum, where the National Numeracy Framework is embedded across the subjects we deliver in Years 7, 8 and 9.

Digital Competence

"At Elfed High School, digital technology is used by all staff to embrace 21st century learning, and enable students to develop their own digital competence. The development of digital skills, in line with the new curriculum, and the Digital Competence Framework, is essential to enable students to take full advantage of the opportunities that come their way and for them to succeed in school and beyond."

The Successful Futures report in 2015 recommended

that all learners in Wales experience digital skills within each subject. As a result of this recommendation, the Welsh Government released the Digital Competence Framework. Digital Competence is the set of skills, knowledge and attitudes that enable the confident, creative and critical use of technologies and systems. It should not be confused with Information and Communication Technology (ICT) or Computer Science. Digital Competence is one of three cross-curricular

responsibilities, alongside Literacy and Numeracy. It focusses on developing digital skills which can be applied to a wide range of subjects and scenarios that are transferable to the world of work.

There are three dedicated computer rooms with 30 Windows PCs in each, along with a Google Chromebook Suite with 30 Chromebooks and a 75" CleverTouch Interactive screen. These rooms can be booked out by members of staff, who take

into account technological and pedagogical principles, which ensures that they plan how the learners will improve their digital skills before booking the rooms.

Elfed Extra clubs also contribute towards the development of students' digital skills. The ICT department run improvement sessions after school, along with a Coding Club and Cyber Discovery Club during the lunchtime.

All teaching staff at Elfed High School have a Google Chromebook. These are used as teaching and learning tools, and training is given by other teachers who are certified Google Educators.







Physical Education

Elfed High Schools Physical Education Department boasts a wide range of facilities giving our students a broad range of opportunities to take part in sport and physical activity.

The sports hall includes 4 badminton courts, basketball nets and 5-a-side football pitch. Add commas as shown: We have two full size gymnasiums, fully kitted out with equipment for gymnastics, as well as being a multipurpose space for fitness and dodgeball lessons. Each gymnasium has an apple TV mounted on the wall which is used for video analysis and other teaching aids.

Our 25 metre swimming pool is used regularly by Year 7 and 8 for our swimming units of work. A scheme deemed very important to develop water-based life skills. It is also used by our Year 10 and 11 GCSE PE students to complete a unit in Personal Survival as part of the practical element of our course.

Our fitness suite, with rowing machine, treadmill, exercise bike and a variety of free and machine weights, is used during our health and fitness schemes of work in Year 10 and 11, as well as for practical-theory lessons as part of our GCSE PE course. Our outdoor facilities are extensive and consist of 7 grass football pitches, a full size astro-turf with a hockey pitch and three 7-a-side football pitches. Our four recently re-surfaced netball courts and five tennis courts complete the full list of excellent facilities we have here at Elfed High School. Our ethos here in the Physical Education department is 'Effort Determines Outcome'. The notion being that at whatever level you may be in sport, if you are giving your best that is all we can ask. We have developed a culture where it is ok to make mistakes and one where everyone is engaged in learning.

All our extra-curricular sports clubs are inclusive, and students regularly attend before school, at lunch time and after school in a wide range of activities including football, rugby, hockey, netball, dodgeball, gymnastics, cheerleading, badminton, basketball, fitness, athletics, cricket, tennis and rounders. The aim is to provide an atmosphere of enjoyment in order to develop lifelong participants who are educated on the importance of sport and physical activity.

Music and Drama

Curriculum information:

At Elfed High School, students study both music and drama during one lesson per week in



Years 7, 8 and 9. They have the opportunity to learn a range of instruments in music, develop their confidence as a performer in drama, and attend the many extra-curricular opportunities open to them. Students will learn the skills, knowledge and understanding required to progress to a formal qualification and can also take part in our public performances which take place throughout the academic year.

In Year 10, GCSE Music and GCSE Drama are options for further study - both subjects enabling students to progress into continuing education, in addition to developing essential life skills which many employers appreciate significantly.

We have fantastic resources at Elfed High School which enable students to fully thrive in the performing arts. We have a huge array of musical instruments, composing software and a formal theatre, with lights, sound and set, offering students the experience of professional live performance.

Being part of the music and drama community at Elfed is stimulating, engaging and exciting and these opportunities create memories that last a lifetime. "The drama curriculum at Elfed High School aims to develop students into confident, selfaware individuals. Through experience, creativity and artistic communication, they explore a range of themes and ideas, to become ambitious, capable learners."

Dining and Social Areas

At Elfed High School, we have an ever-increasing array of social spaces that have become a vibrant heart of the school community.

The Dining area caters for our breakfast club, break and lunch provision, providing an excellent selection of healthy meals and snacks.

We have outdoor dining facilities for all year groups, as well as outdoor sheltered areas which provide protection from the elements.

Our quads provide a social area that students are able to meet with friends. In addition, we have extensive hard-surfaced spaces, playing fields, tennis courts and access to our all-weather pitch.





Mindfulness.b

At Elfed High School our pupils take part in mindfulness lessons, called .b (pronounced 'dot-be'). Mindfulness involves training our attention to experience the present moment with greater curiosity and kindness. This helps us to not only appreciate what is going well but to respond more skillfully to life's inevitable challenges.

A great deal of media coverage has arisen as a result of the growing body of rigorous research evidence regarding the potential benefits of mindfulness. These include randomised control trials and neuroscientific

At its most simple .b is an awarenessraising course to give participants a taste of mindfulness and to provide them with techniques that they can use in everyday situations. studies. As Professor Katherine Weare observed in her awardwinning research summary: Evidence for the Impact of Mindfulness on Children and Young People, schools who engage in mindfulness are likely to see 'beneficial results on the emotional wellbeing, mental health, ability to learn and even the physical health of their students.'

Research conducted with a group of Elfed pupils recently revealed that 100% of participants would recommend .b; additionally the course supported 86% of pupils with dealing with exam stress and improving concentration, 81% of pupils with their relationships, coping with difficulties and being kind to others and 71% of pupils with sleep.



.b aims to help people:

- To improve their concentration and focus, in classrooms, on the sports field, when playing games, when paying attention and listening to others.
- To fulfil their potential and pursue their own goals e.g. be more creative, more relaxed, both academically and personally.
- To experience greater well-being e.g. feel happier, calmer, more fulfilled.
- To work with difficult mental states such as anxious thoughts and low moods.
- To cope with the everyday stresses and strains of adolescent life such as exams, relationships, sleep problems, family issues.

All staff are trained in Child Protection and have a duty to report concerns about the well-being of students.


Looked After Children are supported in line with Welsh Government recommendations and the Headteacher is responsible for promoting educational achievement.

Concerns and Complaints

We encourage those who care for our students to raise any concerns they have as soon as possible. If the first response to a concern/complaint is felt to be unsatisfactory, the issue should be put in writing to the Headteacher who will investigate and resolve the complaint. If the complaint remains unresolved, a formal complaint can be made to the Chair of the Governing Body at the school. The school complaints procedure conforms to Welsh Government guidance.

For student concerns we follow Welsh Government and The Wales Children's Commissioner guidance. Students can raise any concerns they have with the School Council, Tutor or mentor. There is a formal process to follow where concerns/complaints are not resolved in the first instance.

The School Admissions Policy

The Admissions Policy is determined by the Local Authority. Normal admission is into Year 7 (students aged 11), but older students are welcomed to the school. They will be guided and mentored to take a full part in all the activities the school offers. Parents and carers who are considering transferring their child to the Elfed should contact the school reception for advice and guidance.

School Uniform Guide

WHITE SCHOOL SHIRT WITH COLLAR AND TOP BUTTON

- · Long or short sleeved shirts will be acceptable.
- The shirt should fasten up all the way to the collar including the top button.
- Rounded or revere collars will not be acceptable.

MAROON TIE WITH THIN STRIPE

- I tie at all times
- Pupils must wear a school tie at all times with top button of shirt fastened.

NAVY JUMPER WITH SCHOOL LOGO

- · Pupils must wear a school jumper.
- Permission will be given for pupils to remove jumpers but they must wear a blazer with a shirt and tie.







RIGHT HAND FASTENING BLAZER WITH GOLD SCHOOL LOGO

- Typically worn by boys.
- Blazers will be compulsory for all pupils.
- · Blazers may be removed with permission from class teacher.





LEFT HAND FASTENING BLAZER WITH GOLD SCHOOL LOGO

- Typically worn by girls.
- Blazers will be compulsory for all pupils.
- · Blazers may be removed with permission from class teacher.









TRUTEX CHECK PLEATED GREY SKIRT WITH GOLD LOGO

- Skirt hems should not be worn any higher than 2 inches above the knee.
- · Skirts should not be rolled up at the waist.
- Skirts will be worn with plain black knee high socks or plain black opaque tights.
- Trainer socks or over the knee socks will not be permitted.





GREY TROUSERS

- · Grey trousers only permitted.
- Tracksuit bottoms, jeans, very wide or very narrow legged trousers (skinnies) will not be permitted.
- Low slung trousers will not be accepted.
- Any belts worn with trousers must be plain black.





BANNER BERMUDA GREY SHORTS

- · Grey Banner Bermuda shorts only permitted.

- Trainer socks will not be permitted.
