The Sixth Form Centre is a vibrant hub with excellent facilities designed to cater for our senior students. Inside is a spacious and well-equipped haven for studying, relaxing with friends, and even living if they are boarding. Academic and pastoral care are the focus of our Sixth Form provision.

The building is nestled at the heart of our 40-acre campus which combines natural beauty and sleek modern architecture with some of the best sporting facilities in the country.

A recent refurbishment of the Sixth Form Centre has allowed students to transition from GCSEs to A Levels with study spaces specifically designed for independent learning in the impressive glass, air-conditioned atrium alongside teaching areas for Sixth Form subjects.

Co-education in the Sixth Form

From the ages of 11 to 16 Reed's is an all-boys school but in the Sixth Form it becomes an exciting co-educational experience with around one-third girls and two-thirds boys. The result is a vibrant, mixed Sixth Form environment which prepares students for the exciting challenges of university and life beyond Reed's with dedicated support and guidance along the way.

Co-education isn't just limited to the classroom, however; it's woven through every aspect of Sixth Form life. From leadership positions to epic House events, and the buzzing Sixth Form Centre it's all about fostering an atmosphere of equality and camaraderie. Girls also have their own dedicated Head of Sixth Form Girls who is always ready to offer a helping hand and wise advice.

Girls join us from a variety of schools; they are all new to Reed's in the Lower Sixth. It's a fresh start for everyone, and we kick off the school year with a carefully-designed induction programme. This is all about making friends and feeling part of the Reed's family from day one. Academic Curriculum in the Sixth Form

At Reed's, we understand that learning should be engaging, inspiring, and tailored to students' unique strengths and interests. That's why our A Level programme not only provides subject specialism but also the freedom to choose the subjects that truly ignite a passion for an individual's learning from the wide range we have on offer. Whether in sciences, humanities, or the arts, we provide opportunities that will open doors and fuel curiosity.

Learning and growth are fundamental to the Reed's experience; teachers share a commitment to evolving their knowledge to inspire learning. We believe that, whilst an individual can never be defined by results alone, examination success is an important stepping stone to future achievements. We focus on helping each student maximize their academic potential by providing the highest quality teaching and using academic data to monitor progress and attainment.

However, learning at Reed's goes far beyond the classroom. We believe in active engagement – our teachers take pride in their craft, and we expect the same level of dedication and enthusiasm from our students. In addition to three A Levels, there is a wide range of electives to choose from to complement academic

studies. From the Extended Project Qualification to courses in creative writing, photography, engineering, languages for business, politics, music technology, coding plus enterprise and entrepreneurship there is something for everyone. And the best part? Most of these electives are designed solely for the benefit of our students and are not constrained by examination boards.

Small teaching groups enable personal attention and support, promoting discussion and an interactive approach to learning. They also allow for personalised attention and support. Departments encourage discussion, promote critical thinking, and provide a wide range of enrichment opportunities, from afterschool clubs to exciting trips abroad.

But it's not just about academics.
Our General Studies programme covers a broad range of current affairs, political, social, ideological, and moral issues, such as Safe Drive, Stay Alive, leadership, consent, mental and personal health wellbeing. Our 5-strand UNIPREP programme provides the chance to develop essential life skills needed for university and life beyond the Sixth Form. These can range from practical skills such as how to iron a shirt, managing finances and writing a CV.

Pastoral Care in the Sixth Form


Providing a nurturing environment in all aspects of our students' lives at Reed's is one of our key aims. We have a strong tradition of excellent pastoral care throughout the School and the Sixth Form is no exception.

Acting as a bridge to university and life beyond the security of Reed's, preparation for this daunting transition is crucial. That's why we have an excellent structure in place to ensure that every student has immediate access to pastoral support both on a daily basis and through any challenging times they may face.

We want students in the Sixth Form to find their own path – it's a time for young adults to really discover who they want to be, to shine and explore their passions. Reed's helps students excel in any area they desire; we have some of the country's leading professionals on our teaching and coaching staff.

In the Lower Sixth we have an inspiring programme called MOAI, specifically designed to raise awareness about mental health. Working with an external agency and clinicians students take part in workshops, seminars, group sessions and lectures to gain valuable insights and self-awareness of issues around mental health, and to provide tools to navigate the challenges that life throws at you.

The result is young people who leave Reed's with clear sense of who they are and what they want as well as being equipped with the skills and confidence to make a positive impact on the world around them. The future is theirs to shape, and we're here to support them every step of the way.





House and Tutor Structure

The House system lies very much at the heart of life at Reed's, providing a platform for friendly rivalry in activities and team sports to aid holistic development.


Every student at Reed's is allocated a Tutor, creating a sense of belonging and support. Tutor groups are affiliated to one of our four houses – Blathwayt, Bristowe, Capel and Mullens. This affiliation not only encourages camaraderie but also fosters a spirit of healthy competition among students.

In the Sixth Form, students remain within these Houses for competitions, but academic and pastoral progress are monitored and encouraged by the Head of Sixth Form, Deputy Head of Sixth Form, Head of Sixth Form Girls, and the Sixth Form Leadership Team.

The House and Tutor system at Reed's goes beyond just monitoring welfare. It involves a network of dedicated individuals, including Matrons, Medical Staff, the School Chaplain, and teachers, who all play a vital role in ensuring students' happiness and well-being.


Moreover, Reed's places a strong emphasis on leadership development. Prefects are entrusted with key responsibilities, including leading charitable contributions from the Sixth Form. They also take charge of organising House events, such as House Charity Revues and competitions. Additionally, prefects act as mentors to younger pupils, providing both academic and pastoral support.




Boarding in the Sixth Form

Preparing for the Future

Higher Education and Careers advice plays a fundamental part in the development of students at Reed's. Life beyond school can seem daunting and students today are faced with an ever-increasing number of options.

Reed's has a structured, high-quality careers programme developed to raise aspirations and support students through the university application process and the world of work beyond school. To assist with careers information and advice, Reed's works closely with several external partners, along with parents and a well-established Old Reedonian network.

The majority of students go on to attend excellent universities to read a varied range of courses including medical, dental and veterinary science. We also have specific programmes and support for students who wish to apply for drama and art schools, conservatoires, as well as American universities – a popular destination for many of our elite athletes. Obtaining apprenticeship degrees, which are becoming more and more popular, are also very well supported.

Some of the help offered to our Sixth Form students includes: one-to-one interview practice; university departmental visits for subject tasters: individual UCAS guidance from our Higher Education team; a FutureUni Day (to assist in making their university choices); a biennial FutureCareers Fair designed to give an opportunity to discuss career plans with industry professionals and FutureCareers Seminars on specific industry areas such as finance and law.

We are able to offer students further opportunities to explore options through our strong and vibrant links with our Old Reedonians and the generosity of our current parents, who give up their time to offer advice around work experience and future career prospects. The vast number of Old Reedonians who are still engaged with the School provide a hugely useful network for career contacts and is testament to the lifelong links that are forged whilst at Reed's.
