

Ensuring outstanding teaching and learning is at the heart of everything we do. Our teachers are subject specialists with the ambition for every student to fulfil their potential. Students are taught to learn for themselves; to develop confidence and curiosity. Every classroom has an 'open door' policy. Students, staff and the Senior Leadership Team work in collaboration in an environment where resilience and a willingness to take on new challenges are actively encouraged.

As a school we have a proud tradition of being forward thinking. We reflect on technologies that make the difference and invest strategically in facilities and technologies that will have optimum impact.

Our focus on collaboration and oracy develops our students' ability to present themselves in a considered, sensitive and articulate fashion. This is vital for students' futures in both professional and social situations. Reading is promoted as an essential skill – both reading for pleasure and to actively engage with more complex texts.

A place to belong

We all learn best when we are happy and secure and our outstanding pastoral care ensures our girls develop dignity and resilience. We are a small school and this has real advantages. Our students are known as individuals and the care and guidance that we provide ensures that girls' aspirations are realised; that their hopes and dreams are encouraged.

Along with the teachers, your daughter will be supported by a pastoral team who will work closely together to ensure her welfare. Your daughter's Form Tutor and Head of Year will play a significant role in monitoring her wellbeing, personal development and academic progress throughout her time with us.

In addition, we have a Pastoral Support Worker, who is readily available to support your daughter at any point throughout the day. Based in the 'Haven', this area of the school provides a place for respite and one-to-one academic support whenever it is required. In addition, we have a Family Support Worker, two professional Counsellors and a large and growing team of trained Mental Health First Aiders.

We have very high expectations regarding behaviour. Our teachers nurture a thirst for learning and encourage them to think for themselves. We train them to speak and listen, both to their teachers and each other. We also develop their capacity to work both independently and as part of a team. Most importantly, through the example they set, our staff work hard to foster kind, respectful and tolerant attitudes towards others, both inside and outside the classroom.

Alongside superb teaching in the traditional core academic subjects we promote and provide outstanding provision in every area with a rich, varied and ambitious curriculum.

The subjects our girls study, including courses like Art and Design, Dance, Drama and Photography, alongside vocational qualifications like BTEC Creative Media Production, means that they are fully prepared for the future, providing them with both the knowledge and skills required in adulthood.

The starting point for designing our curriculum is always the individual needs of our students. Consequently, to complement our in-school curriculum offer, we work closely with a range of local education providers.

We also work closely with our partner colleges and local employers to see that every one of our students secures either a college placement, apprenticeship or training. Many of our alumni maintain strong links with our school, providing advice, guidance and inspiration to our girls.

We want your daughter to flourish during her time at our school, but we also want her to continue developing in later life. Our curriculum will enable this to happen.

A place to lead...and a place to be heard

We want our girls to be independent women in the future. We believe all students should have a confident voice in the school that is listened to, respected and acted upon. Equally, we believe in developing leadership skills and providing opportunities for this.

Our Student Leadership team is led each year by our Head and Deputy Head girl. Each of the eight students on the team, including the Head and Deputy Head girl, is responsible for championing one of our eight action groups: Charities, Creative Minds Council, Environment, Happy Minds Council, Participation, Respect Council, Revision for All and Teaching & Learning. Each action group comprises of elected members from each year group.

In addition to the Student Council, there are a range of roles and responsibilities to ensure there are a variety of opportunities for girls to explore their potential. These include:

- Form and Vice Form Captains

Additional opportunities to develop leadership skills are provided during whole school events such as Anti-Bullying week, The Tenner Challenge, International Women's Day and Fair-Trade events.

A place to grow

We know how important it is to give our new students a smooth, positive transition to secondary school life. Through a wide-ranging programme, we seek to ensure the most effective, happy and successful transfer to high school for both students and parents.

What can you expect from us?

- A letter of welcome from the Headteacher.
- A visit to every student in Year 6 from our Transition Manager who will put your daughter at ease and collect vital pastoral and academic information from her current school.
- A friendly, welcoming letter from a Year 7 'buddy' who will provide lots of help and support in the Autumn Term.

- MOTHS (Moving on to High School): For girls who require additional support in the transition process.
- Sampling Day in June where students spend a day with their new tutors and class mates.
- Early intervention and support from the Learning Support Department, where necessary.
- New Entrants' Evening in July, giving parents and students the opportunity to meet with tutors and each other.
- 'Headstart Sessions' in the summer to prepare students for their first day at secondary school.
- A team of Peer Counsellors committed to supporting each tutor group.
- Transition Evening in the Autumn Term, which provides a formal opportunity for parents to discuss how their daughter is settling in.

A place to succeed

All students have the right to fulfil their potential and we aim to help them do it, regardless of ability. We have a long-standing record of outstanding achievement. GCSE results are always well above the national average, as is the proportion of students attaining top grades. Regardless of their starting point, our girls make exceptional progress over their five years with us and we are consistently ranked amongst the top performing schools in Lancashire.

All students have challenging targets for every subject and their individual progress is monitored regularly through our robust tracking systems. Underachievement is quickly identified, with strategies put in place to tackle it.

Crucially, whilst we reward girls' academic achievements, we also recognise and celebrate success in the widest sense, instilling a belief that anything is possible with hard work and dedication. To this end, alongside our usual rewards system, we also:

- Invite nominated students to a weekly Head's Breakfast, where girls can discuss their achievements with the headteacher and other girls.
- Award a Headteacher's Commendation for exceptional work which is then displayed in the school foyer.
- Promote the 'Passport to Success'; an awards system based on the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme that recognises a wide range of achievements, including working with the local community and fundraising.
- Promote the School Values through the annual awarding of School Values awards

Sue's background is in materials science/ metallurgy. She gained first-class honours from Imperial College in 1976 and a PhD in 1979 before joining BNFL where she was Group Director of Technology 1992-2006. She was appointed Visiting Professor at Imperial College in 2006 and of London South Bank University in 2011 and has been a member of the Board of Governors at the University of Manchester from 2004 -2018 and Deputy Chair of the Board 2015-2018. She has held an Honorary Professorship at the University of Central Lancashire since the beginning of 2007 and now serves on the Board of Governors.



Karen Pierce

Karen Pierce has recently become the first woman to be appointed to the prestigious post of Permanent Representative of the United Kingdom to

the United Nations. Appointed to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in 1981, her career since then has taken her all over the world and amongst a wide range of important posts she has been President of the UN Security Council as well as the UK's Ambassador to the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan.
