





What is the Identity of a Catholic College?

Our History

There has been a school on the site of St. Francis Xavier Sixth Form College for over 100 years. The first school to occupy the site was Clapham College, a fee-paying school for day boys and boarders, which became a state-funded grammar school in 1944. Another grammar school (St Gerard's) joined Clapham College in 1975, and in 1977 the school became comprehensive along with all other schools in the Inner London Education Authority. To accommodate the extra students., new classrooms were built alongside refurbished Victorian classroom (refurbished again in 2014!).

Who is our Patron?

St. Francis Xavier was born in Navarre,
Spain in 1506. He was one of the first
Jesuits. Francis was one of the most
prolific of all Roman Catholic Missionaries.
Throughout Asia he is believed to have
baptised over 30,000 people. He died of
a fever in 1552 while waiting for a boat to
take his mission into China. His feast day
is 3 December.



Our Chapel

Formal prayers happen most mornings. For our prayers we use the Divine Office of the Church, although there will be times when other forms of prayer, such as the rosary, may be used.

The chapel remains open as much as possible for private use. The chapel is registered to be used for Catholic marriage ceremonies, and is available to current and former staff, and past students, although current students have to wait!



Our Chapel Patron St Oliver Plunkett

St Oliver Plunkett was born into a wealthy Irish family in 1625. He became a priest aged 29 and worked wholly to provide food for poor families until he was sent to Rome to train other priests.

Aged 44 he became bishop and was sent back to Ireland. He was very popular and under his guidance over 150 men started training for the priesthood.

However, being a Catholic was made illegal and being a clergyman meant you could be put to death. After being put on trial and false evidence of other crimes presented, he was sentenced to death and died aged 55 in 1681.

His legacy lives on though. There are over 60 churches, colleges, sports facilities and even an aeroplane named after him. One of his relics is contained within the chapel.

Governance and Trusteeship

The College is in the trusteeship of the Archdiocese of Southwark. The Archbishop appoints up to eleven Foundation governors to the governing body. These make up the majority of the governors. Their remit is to ensure the College adheres to Church teaching at all times.

The Diocesan Education Commission provides training, support and guidance for governors, leaders and those in the RE department.

The College is subject to the Catholic Inspection Framework as well as Ofsted inspections.

CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

What is That?

In 1891 Pope Leo XIII issued the first encyclical (Papal document) on Catholic Social Teaching. It is called Rerum Novarum (Of New Things). This came about due to the new conditions and situations experienced by people after the industrial revolution. Since 1891, Rerum Novarum has been updated and nuanced seven times.

There are seven principles to Catholic Social Teaching:

1. The dignity of each person

Made in the image and likeness of God, each person's dignity must be upheld and respected from conception to natural death.

2. Solidarity

We stand in solidarity with everyone for the betterment of humanity. We belong to each other and with each other.

3. Stewardship of the earth

We stand in solidarity with everyone for the betterment of humanity. We belong to each other and with each other.

4. A preferential option for the poor

A principle you will see demonstrated throughout the college. No one is left without the help they need.

5. Dignity of work

"The dignity of work is to be found in the fact that a human being is doing the work." Laborem Exercens 1981

6. Subsidiarity

Decisions must be made at the level of authority closest to the resolution.

7. Rights and responsibilities

Every right has a corresponding responsibility, every responsibility has a corresponding right.

What About Those of Other Faiths and None?

The Catholic Church rejects nothing of what is true and holy in other religions. It has a high regard for the manner of life and conduct, the precepts and doctrines which, although differing in many ways from its own teaching, nevertheless often reflect a ray of that truth which enlightens all men and women.

This is from the 1965 Papal Document Nostra Aetate (Our Faith)

And as Pope Francis tells us.

"What God wants is fraternity among us; we must not be frightened by difference"

And Finally...

After the Reformation, Catholic education was driven underground until the mid 1800s. In 1847 the Catholic Poor School Committee was established, which focused on the promotion of Catholic primary education. This was followed by the re-establishment of the Catholic hierarchy in England and Wales in 1850.

With Catholics now able to freely acknowledge their faith, the bishops made the building of schools a priority over the building of churches.



In 1965, with the Second Vatican Council document Gravissimum Educationis, the Church made clear her belief of a universal right to education for everyone.

There are over 2,200 Catholic Education Establishments in England and Wales.

No two are the same, they each have their own unique personality, and the personality of St Francis Xavier Sixth Form College is one of kindness, service, faith, inclusion, courage, honesty, respect and forgiveness.
