

A relentless focus on engaging and meaningful learning so that every child achieves their best potential.

DEDICATED TEACHERS

We handpick staff who demonstrate outstanding teaching, who are inspiring and who can help students make exceptional progress. Our staff are dedicated to the innovative education approaches we have developed and work as a team, everyone pulling in the same direction.

We are never complacent and continually review everything we do, to ensure we offer quality teaching, develop our students as excellent learners, and meet the changing needs of every child.

HIGH EXPECTATIONS

We set high expectations for all our students, providing an authentic and rewarding education for all. We expect them to engage, to produce high quality work, and to be able to go on to A-levels and university if they so wish. Staff are committed to continuing professional development, and parents are expected to support their child and attend our Celebration of Learning events.

AN ACADEMICALLY RIGOROUS CURRICULUM

We follow the National Curriculum, although as an academy have freedom to innovate. Delivery of the curriculum in each subject and between subjects has been well thought through. We aim to immerse our students in learning, empowering them as active agents in their own education.

EQUIPPED FOR LEARNING

Learning is enhanced by our purpose-built classrooms, labs, workshop, sports facilities and performance spaces. Classrooms have modern technology to aid delivery of lessons, complemented by our IT suites. We give each new student a Chromebook of their own to keep throughout their studies to enhance learning both in the classroom and at home.

Over 95% of respondents in a recent parent survey said we have high academic standards and that their child makes good progress.

PROJECT-BASED LEARNING IN KEY STAGE 3

Project-based learning offers a deep, active learning experience anchored to real-life contexts and problems, locally and globally. Through projects, students explore, research and inquire across multiple subjects and produce meaningful, quality work. Project work is showcased to peers, parents and to the wider community, through exhibitions, displays and products. In Key Stage 3 our humanities subjects - History, Geography and PRE (Philosophy, Religion & Ethics) - are taught this way, and projects integrate with other subjects too, enriching the curriculum. The humanities are developed as separate subjects in Years 9 and above as students work towards their GCSEs.

GCSE STUDIES

Throughout Key Stage 4, students work hard towards their GCSEs, having made well informed option choices. We challenge students to achieve their very best grades, put in place individually tailored support if needed, and ensure they leave us with a clear path ahead.

In short, we are determined that every child will be encouraged and supported to reach their very best academic potential and to know that we are proud of their achievements, which we celebrate with them.

We teach students to be active and reflective learners, to have a voice, to inquire, to create and to make a difference.



ENGAGED STUDENTS

The children are enthused by professional, friendly and knowledgeable staff and are drawn into learning through interesting lessons and projects taught in school and beyond. Swanage School students know that they are important, valued and accepted. We support and encourage them to be confident, accomplished and articulate with a strong sense of who they are. It's all part of The Swanage School Way.

GOOD BEHAVIOUR

Visitors to the school often comment on how well our students behave. Incidents of poor behaviour and bullying are very rare and, when they do occur, are dealt with quickly. We take a restorative approach, meaning that we encourage reflection and prioritise making amends.

SUPPORTIVE ATMOSPHERE

Genuine relationships are key at The Swanage School. We meet regularly to celebrate successes and to help each other. Our staff meet frequently to discuss how each child is doing and what can be improved. Crew Leaders have strong relationships with the children and work with parents and carers to discuss progress and any concerns.

OPEN TO ALL

We are a fully comprehensive school and attract students who would otherwise attend grammar school as well as students who have found school difficult. We have a clear vision for every child to achieve their very best potential. We set high expectations and our curriculum offers opportunities for all

students to be challenged. More able students will take GCSEs in Further Maths and separate sciences, while other students might need extra help in numeracy and literacy to help them achieve a good pass in Maths and English.

A HOME OF LEARNING

Our flexible spaces mirror our innovative approach to teaching. One wing of the school contains maths, science, and design technology; the other has English, languages and humanities. Next to the central hall (the 'Atrium') are music rooms and the studio, a multi-functional space for drama and creative media, complete with green screen and neighbouring control room, editing suite and podcast studio. Our kitchen, which offers freshly prepared meals, sits alongside the Atrium which is a multi-purpose space used for assemblies, performances, meeting and eating.







SPORT: LEADING HEALTHY, ACTIVE LIVES



A VARIED SPORTS CURRICULUM

In PE lessons, students will not only engage in traditional school sports, but also take part in water-sports, making the most of our fantastic coastal location. Athletics, badminton, basketball, cricket, football, gymnastics, handball, netball, rugby, softball and table-tennis are offered alongside kayaking, paddle-boarding and raft-building.

TAILORED CURRICULUM

If students take PE as a GCSE we will support them, where we can, to pursue their preferred individual sport even where we do not offer it ourselves. We have had students specialise in golf, skiing and equestrian skills.

MODERN FACILITIES

We have an impressive full-size sports hall, sports pitches and an all-weather 'astro' court.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR SPORTS SESSIONS

There are plenty of opportunities to play sport on an extra-curricular basis too, at after-school sports clubs or by representing the school at fixtures.
















ALL THE WORLD'S A CLASSROOM

Learning doesn't just happen in school, it lasts a lifetime if people are engaged in the world around them. We take our students out of the classroom whenever possible to put lessons in context and to let them experience the evidence for themselves.

Every year some 200,000 pupils from across the UK visit the area to spend a week studying Purbeck's natural and historical treasures. We have these wonderful resources on our doorstep and make sure our students benefit from them.

We also take students on educational and inspirational visits around the UK and abroad. These have included art trips to London and Paris, residential maths courses at Exeter and Portsmouth universities, and field studies in Iceland and Spain.

CHALLENGE DAYS

These are days to inspire and educate both students and staff, where the whole school goes off-timetable. They vary depending on current topics and have included beach-based teambuilding and problem-solving activities, and in-depth maths investigations. Our most recent Challenge Days were themed around 'Healthy Body', 'Healthy Mind' and 'Healthy Planet'.

CHALLENGE WEEK

Challenge Week is held in the last week of term and allows students to explore topics and activities in greater depth, and experience things they might not otherwise do. Each year a range of options is offered, including residential trips in the UK and abroad, as well as activities based locally.

Challenge Week trips have included surf camps, learning to sail, trekking, West End shows, art explorations, indoor and outdoor climbing, adventures on the Jurassic Coast and sightseeing






















AFTER SCHOOL IS FOR CLUBS

We run a wide variety of free after-school clubs, organised by our staff and fantastic local volunteers. Whether it's badminton or basketball, choir or catering, Pokémon or podcasting, there's something for everyone. And if an interest isn't catered for, students are helped to set up their own clubs.





Our Robotics Team has started competing in FIRST Tech Challenge UK. The mission of FIRST Tech is to use STEM initiatives to empower young people to explore, challenge and grow into the innovators of the future.

EMPLOYMENT THROUGH THE CURRICULUM

Providing opportunities for students to develop 'real-life' skills and competencies that are valued by employers is central to the way we do things. Teamwork, communication, interpersonal skills, self-motivation, digital literacy, and the ability to problem-solve - these are what employers want young people to demonstrate. We build them into delivery of the curriculum and the way we run activities and extracurricular clubs.

In Year 9, for instance, we increasingly work on preparing and equipping students: supporting them to make the right GCSE choices and equipping them with skills, competencies and supplementary qualifications needed for their next steps and in the workplace. We facilitate students to complete the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award, and to take certificates in practical skills such as food hygiene, health & safety, first aid and internet safety.

Throughout their time at The Swanage School, students gain experience of planning projects and making presentations, by being creative, maximising productivity and using digital technology.

Students are given opportunities to make visits to higher and further education providers and we give assemblies and invite guest speakers to inspire students and raise career aspirations.







PART OF THE COMMUNITY

A bonus of having a school in town is that the community benefits from the volunteering efforts of our students, whether that's organising a beach clean, raising money for a defibrillator, or working with artists and other local schools to create permanent artworks. We are delighted to invite elderly residents to join us for a Christmas tea-party. We were proud to manufacture thousands of protective face-shields for local key workers and to provide meals for elderly and vulnerable members of the community during the pandemic lockdowns.

The governance of the school is overseen by a community cooperative trust that aims to make Swanage a vibrant and sustainable town where students are encouraged to become responsible and active citizens.

Where relationships are at the heart of the school, and the school is at the heart of the community.







NEXT STEPS

Students make excellent progress at The Swanage School enabling them to go on to further and higher education and the career of their choice.

Former students have gone on to sixth form at Purbeck, Lytchett Minster, Parkstone and Poole Grammar, Thomas Hardye, Bournemouth and Poole College, Weymouth College, Kingston Maurward and Brockenhurst College, studying everything from A levels to courses in marine engineering and outdoor pursuits, while others have taken up apprenticeships.
