We also had archery and table tennis stations for PE and


getting creative in the Art department. These were just some of the fun ways each department displayed their subjects.

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As part of our Geography GCSE, we went on a field trip to Stratford City and Westfield. We carried out various surveys and questionnaires and also compared the number of people that went into each centre over 10 minutes, as well as asking different questions to members of the public. This was very exciting to do, as we were able to understand other people and further develop our communication skills.

This experience taught us skills that will help in the world of work in replacement for the work experience we, unfortunately, did not have the chance to do in year 10, due to the lockdown where employers were not taking school students, and many were still working from home.

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GCSE Geography Field trip to Southend on Sea



On Monday 17th October, Year 11 Geography students travelled to Southend on Sea to study Coastal processes and Coastal Management. Students carried out various surveys and tasks, which included studying the beach profile, pebble analysis, and groyne measurements to see if longshore drift is taking place. The pupils interviewed several people along the different sections of the coast to understand their views on coastal protection, if it's necessary, whether it's worth the money and if it enhances the appearance of the coastal landscape.

The students walked several miles along the coasts, and walked up and back down the longest pier in the world,

taking in the views of Southend and enjoying the peace and tranquillity out at sea. Southend attracts millions of visitors yearly, and coastal protection is necessary to support the industries dependent on tourism.

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Drop Down Day

Our first drop-down day of the academic year was on the 7th of October.

Year 11's had the opportunity to meet with an examiner of the English Language. They looked at how to respond to the literature paper and how to structure their response for creative writing. This was followed by sessions in maths and a revision booster workshop led by Ms Bilkis.

Year 10's were involved in a youth engagement programme called 'Proud Places', which develops young people's confidence and inspires them with a sense of community pride. They visited local sites undergoing restoration that gave our students the chance to explore their local history. They saw an interesting example of the Romanesque Revival style that survived through the German blitz in World War 2.

Some of the students took part in a criminology day where they took a 999 call, examined a crime scene, investigated a murder, prepared their case and presented the evidence in a mock courtroom trial, all from within the comfort of the school.

Our year 8s students took part in a social engagement programme called FIRST GIVE. They learned about the social issues affecting their society and chose the one important to them. They are now looking forward to working with a charity that will support their cause.

Year 9's went to the local museum while year 7s participated in a range of team-building activities and a charity walk.

Years 8 and 9 watched a performance from a singer, Gigi Moss, who also discussed mental health, the causes of mental health problems (stress at school, relationships etc.), and the importance of treating each other fairly.

Black History Month

People from African and Caribbean backgrounds have been a fundamental part of British and American history for centuries. However, campaigners believe their value and contribution to society are often overlooked, ignored or distorted. Most schools still teach a history curriculum that focuses on traditional events and the achievements of white figures.

Black History Month, therefore, began as a way of remembering important people and events in the history of the African diaspora. It allows everyone to share, celebrate and understand the impact of black heritage and culture.

Black History Month enables adults and children to gain a broader understanding of Black histories, going beyond racism and slavery to also spotlight Black achievement.

It helps us all to see that Black history is also British history. If you know more about a community, it is less likely that you will discriminate against them, and it is harder to ignore the existence of racism when you know about its history.

To understand where we are, we must understand our past and how we got here, including the events and people who shaped the way Britain stands today.

To learn about Black history, is to learn how intertwined it is with our own.

Our pupils had many workshops and assemblies on this important topic and were reminded about the historic visit by Global Civil Rights icon Rev Jesse Jackson last year who campaigned for equality and freedom.
