Our Curriculum

In everything we do, we believe children and people can impact change. Our curriculum redefines our relationship with teaching and learning through the broad makeup of curriculum subjects, taken from the national curriculum and our exciting enrichment opportunities of Museum Learning and our high stakes projects.

Teaching is framed around acquiring knowledge and exploring learning through investigative, ethical and moral questioning. The learning is also underpinned by our unique learning powers which create a learning—friendly culture and a language for learning which develops each child's learning character. The impact is powerful and leads to knowledgeable, ethical, resilient and adaptable learners who can think differently, manage information and understand the importance of making a positive contribution to their own and wider society.

How does our curriculum reflect the culture, climate and values of our school:

Our curriculum is designed to ensure our children are knowledge rich and that we build self—esteem through celebrating accomplishments. They practice essential skills and learn how to build resilience, resourcefulness, reflectiveness and reciprocity; these principles are the cornerstones of any good curriculum. Our curriculum allows children the opportunity to acquire new knowledge and apply this to authentic experiences exploring real life contexts, challenges and problems. Personal development as learners is at the heart of our curriculums aims. Children and their teachers are not afraid to explore difficult questions, engage with each other and are open to changing their own and others minds on a wide range of topics, the result of which is that learning is inspired. It is vital that our children experience a wide range of topics and experiences as it is more often the case that their further experiences outside of the classroom are capped through wider societal issues. Our children require knowledge and skills for futures that can't yet be imagined. We have designed a curriculum that will help them build the future and celebrate in the transformational power of education and learning.

How our curriculum is mapped out and planned:

Our current curriculum content is taken from the National Curriculum. This is carefully mapped out by SLT prior to each new year to ensure that coverage is accurate and that the progression of knowledge and disciplinary skills are continuously developed and are accurately mapped into each year groups long term plans. Review of curriculum outcomes occur frequently and also informs some elements of curriculum mapping. Year groups plan high stakes projects that happen every term. These projects are the signature of The Langley Heritage primary school curricular structure. They make standards come alive for students. Our high stakes projects are long term, in—depth studies and offer real—world connections that inspire students toward higher levels of academic achievement. They involve students in original research, critical thinking, and problem solving, and they build character along with academic skills.

Museum Learning

At The Langley Heritage Primary we explore the curriculum and consolidate children's learning through Museum Learning.

Museum Learning is a resource that can deepen knowledge, enrich vocabulary and provide meaningful and lasting experiences. Museums are gateways to real things, real stories and real people; museum collections make learning meaningful for students. With museum learning in our DNA, we further our aims in the school, our local community and our national partners through:

- ★ How we plan and deliver learning: a learning model centered around our learning powers reflectiveness, resourcefulness, reciprocity and resilience. How we use places and objects: using the built environment and collections to aid learning.
- ★ How we work with people: a two—way process of sharing teaching expertise and ideas with museum professionals to create good practice inside and outside the classroom.

Through close work alongside the Museum Learning team at The Langley Academy, TLHP children receive the opportunity to engage with a vast collection of physical resources that can inspire fantastic learning. The Museum Learning team also links local and distant

museums with projects running in any year group and often can suggest excellent visitors and guest to come in explore a topic with the children. Any subject can be supported through Museum Learning and teachers make sure they plan effectively for Museum Learning links in their long, medium and short—term planning. Outdoor Learning is an opportunity for the children of Langley Heritage to engage with the environment around them in exciting and stimulating ways. It forges strong links with Science, protecting the environment and geography.

Our Community

Inclusion

The Langley Heritage Primary is a fully inclusive school, we meet the needs of all pupils and ensure each and every child makes progress. Quality first teaching ensures all work is tailored to meet the children's individual needs to ensure they are engaged, motivated to learn and challenged through our creative and immersive curriculum.

Parent and Pupil Voice

Pupils are given ample opportunity to share their views on their learning and the school environment. They will meet with subject leads and senior leaders throughout the year for their views. Each class will also elect a member to represent them in the school council, giving children to discuss concerns and help Miss Blackmore lead the school!

As well as children, we value our parents' voice and feedback too. Parents are encouraged to speak to their class teachers through various mediums regarding their children's learning. We offer coffee mornings, adult courses, workshops and support to all our families. We hold parent forums and also 'Meet The Teacher' meetings at the beginning of each year so you know what to expect with regards to expectations and homework. Our family support workers are also available to offer advice and sign—post to help when needed.

Health and Wellbeing

At The Langley Heritage Primary, our health and wellbeing is key to ensuring we are ready to learn. We provide healthy lunches through our caters, Innovate, and EYFS and KS1 children receive a fruit snack at break time. Through our curriculum we also practice mindfulness and partake in wellbeing weeks to help us focus on our emotions and positivity.

The Hive

The Langley Heritage Primary is a place where we believe we are a community and we work together to celebrate not only our similarities but our differences too. The Hive is the hub of all our community work. We work with local organisations and experts to deliver parenting workshops, family sessions, youth work, toddlers and adult courses for our Heritage Community. The Hive is an opportunity for us to shine as a community and to provide opportunities to be the best we can be!

Personal Development

Personal Development is at the heart of our school learning journey. We are committed to developing the whole child - helping them know how to keep physically and mentally healthy. We believe that pupils must be provided with an education that prepares them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of adult life in modern Britain.

We go above and beyond in providing a wide range of activities to nurture, develop and stretch pupils' talents and interests. Our learning powers support pupils to be confident, resilient and independent and develop strength of character. As a result, our pupils thrive as individuals, family members and members of society.

We believe the promotion of pupils' personal and social development underpins other learning. Developing self—understanding, empathy, respect for each other by building spiritual, social, moral values and understanding of other races, cultures and religions, will help our pupils to enjoy healthy and productive relationships in all aspects of their lives, and recognise and celebrate differences in others.



Place 2 Be/Place to Think

Place2be is a children's mental health charity providing school—based support and in—depth training programmes to improve the emotional wellbeing of pupils, families, teachers and school staff. All children can go to Place2be to have a safe space to talk to a trusted adult.

Mindfulness

Mindfulness is built into the curriculum here at Langley Heritage and carried out weekly by all classes. In addition to this, we have regular discussions around the importance of Mental Well—Being and do projects each year around Mental Health Week.

Values Assemblies

We hold weekly values assemblies which are carefully plotted to cover a range of issues and to respond to current events. In these assemblies, values awards are given out to pupils who have promoted SMSC and British Values across the school.







Living in the Wider World - Game of Life

Pupils learn about the importance of money, personal attitudes towards spending and basic money management. Within the programme, pupils are taught about different jobs and careers, encouraging them to think about what they would like to do as adults and the skills required. Lessons will be role play and scenario based, enabling pupils to develop an understanding of the importance of different jobs and developing confidence along the way.

The Hive

The Hive provides a range of personal development opportunities for Year 5 and 6 pupils through the youth group provision that supports the development of children's social skills, raises self—esteem and confidence.

House System

There are four houses in the school: Hawking, Curie, Ibn Battuta and Owens. The House names respect the values of the school; Exploration, Curiosity and Discovery, along with a value which links strongly to Personal Development and that has become very important during the recent period — Resilience.

House Points are allocated for many different factors, many of which link to Personal Development, including good behaviour, manners and politeness, showing the values we believe are important to be role models of the future, and reflecting the values of the school. At the end of each half term, House Points are added up and rewards given to the winning house group. Other House group events are also organised throughout the year to allow children of different year groups to mix, providing leadership opportunities and a sense of school spirit and community.

Junior Duke of Edinburgh Award

The Micro, Mini and Junior Duke Awards is offered to all children and gives them the opportunity to participate in a variety of new

experiences. It teaches them that it is good to 'have a go' and challenges them to learn new and varied skills from an early age. The award scheme is for primary—aged children to encourage and develop valuable life skills. It promotes Independence, responsibility, life skills and community. Children work through various awards — from the Micro Duke in Reception, Mini Duke in KS1, through to the Junior Duke and by Year 6 achieving the Platinum Duke Award. Children take part in various life skills challenges including: Cooking, Caring for others, playing a role in their community, first aid, domestic challenges and hiking!

Children receive a certificate and badge at the end of each award which will be worn on their school blazers/jumpers.

Leadership Opportunities

Sports Leaders are used within the school. The pupils are trained by the PE specialists in the school and assist with lunchtime activities, using the wide range of sporting and active equipment we have. The School Council also play a prominent role within the school. The children are stakeholders in the school and, through the School Council, given an opportunity to both make a difference to the way the school operates, as well as to develop their citizenship and social skills and confidence. The school council manage areas of the school, assist with producing the school newsletter, conduct tours for visitors, manage areas of the school and act as Eco–Monitors.

Personal Development Award

This award is given out weekly in Values Assembly. This recognises children who have shown progress or excellence in areas of Personal Development.

Extra Curricular Clubs

A wide range of extra—curricular opportunities offered to all children, to allow them to find new hobbies and skills.

The Arbib Education Trust

The Multi-Academy Trust (MAT) encompasses The Langley Academy Secondary, The Langley Academy Primary and The Langley Heritage Primary. Our vision is to ensure we provide an exceptional education for every child in the Trust through high aspirations and quality learning through curiosity, exploration and discovery. These three words underpin our Museum Learning philosophy and what matters to us most when we think about education for our young people and preparing them for the world ahead.

The Trust is in its seventh year and most recently developed its strapline, "One community. Many ideas. Everyone's future". We believe in our wider responsibility of meeting the needs not just of our children/students and staff but those of the community. We believe that schools are communities that should focus on everyone, the children and the staff and consequently, staff development sits at the heart of our work and we believe that a culture of collaboration where we are all encouraged to share our ideas, allows us to meet our strategic objectives.

Both Primaries are the main feeder schools with right of entry as part of the admissions policy. This means that the curriculum, assessment and pedagogy are continually being developed as a Trust to ensure our young people make rapid progress throughout and helps them in that critical transition period from Year 6 to Year 7.

One of the greatest qualities of the Trust is the Sponsors. Annabel Nicoll as the Sponsor has boundless energy and enthusiasm all directed at giving youngsters a better life. As a result of her work, children and students here have quite simply been afforded opportunities that many young people elsewhere in the country just would not get. Staff who work here are able to draw on this support and networking opportunity to develop their own career and importantly contribute towards bettering the education of our young people across the Trust.

CURIOSITY~EXPLORATION~DISCOVERY

Sir Martyn Arbib and the Foundation provided charitable donations and financial support to organisations and causes around the UK, with a focus on the Thames Valley. Sir Martyn, and the Foundation, established the River & Rowing Museum in Henley—on—Thames, which opened in 1998 and attracts over 100,000 visitors per year.
