

KS3 Science Fieldtrip

On a crisp Monday just after the morning assembly the Key Stage 3 pupils went off on an exploration into the woods above the school. They are undertaking a unit on Plants, Production and Sustainability and it was an opportunity to get out into nature and look for 'signs of spring'. Pupils gathered data from observations of anything from germinating wildflower to fallen pinecones. They used an app called Seek to help them identify species of plants. Clipboards were out, pencils were sharpened and a thirst for new understanding was at the heart of this experience. Pupils will be presenting their findings of the local habitat in the final lesson of term. The science teachers were very relieved not to run into any wolves, bears or Gruffalo's(!) on our adventure and only saw a big bad alpine shrew. Everyone got home safely and happy we were able to take our classroom outside for the morning.







Herewith some photos of some of the things we've been up to this half of term.
