ABOUT OUR SCHOOL

Bow School has a clear vision for the future, driving forward continued improvements and providing an excellent environment for learning. We are a vibrant, multi-cultural school in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets with a roll of over 1000 students and are proud of, and value, the diversity of languages, cultures and experiences that the students bring with them.

The school has excellent partnerships with businesses, sports and arts organisations. These partnerships are wide ranging and benefit our students both academically and socially. They include:

In our most recent Ofsted report in 2013, Bow School was described as “a good and improving school”. The inspectors noted the rapid improvements that the school is making in ensuring that standards rise quickly and that students are well prepared for their next steps. It highlighted that:

- student behaviour and engagement in their learning is good;
- leadership and management at all levels in the school is good;
- the school has high expectations of the students

An Exciting Future

In June 2014, we moved into a much larger building with state-of-the art facilities. Our new home was carefully designed to support good quality teaching and learning. 2014 also saw us beginning a programme of growth; we started a Post 16 provision as well as increasing in size. September 2014 saw our first intake of girls at year 7 and we now have mixed gender year groups across the lower school with the proportion of girls making Bow their school of choice increasing year-on-year.

We continue to grow steadily, each year, and our aim is that in 2018 Bow School will be an outstanding and oversubscribed 11 – 18 school with a thriving Sixth Form. Standards will be above the national average and there will be no significant differences between groups. Our dynamic learning community will have strong partnerships with a range of businesses and higher education establishments and will be at the centre of partnerships with other local schools. Bow School is already an exciting professional community of teachers and educational staff and we intend to grow and strengthen in this area over the next few years.

SUPPORT AND DEVELOPMENT

When you come and work at Bow School you will be able to benefit from a structured and comprehensive continuing professional development programme. As a valued member of staff we want to ensure that you have access to the benefits available to you. Your first year in post will be crucial to ensuring your success as a member of staff and to maintaining the ongoing success of our school. For this purpose we will put in place systems to ease you into the school and give you wide-ranging support.

Induction and Career Development

The staff at Bow are very supportive towards each other with a great camaraderie existing throughout the school. Professional development opportunities include:

- A well established and comprehensive mentor programme for all newly qualified teachers, OTTs and Teach First;
- A strong personalised programme of professional development for teachers and support staff;
- Strong links with other local schools for partnership working and support;
- Personalised coaching
- We also have a strong community spirit and there are regular staff social events, competitions and challenges as well as a staff football team. All staff are able to use the fitness room and other sporting facilities.

Tower Hamlets has its own dedicated Professional Development Centre (PDC). This centre is the focus for educational training for teachers and support staff. It provides up to date facilities for CPD and houses the School Library Service, which Bow subscribes to.

Staff Wellbeing

Bow School is committed to staff wellbeing and to further developing its wellbeing programme which has now been running for four years. The school offers a variety of activities, classes and services which include: fitness challenges, a weekly yoga stretch class, staff football, badminton and volleyball, circuit training, staff wellbeing events, staff socials, on site Occupational Health provision (general advice on health and wellbeing, BP and Cholesterol checks) and counselling services.

Childcare

Transport Links

Transport links within the borough are good with national rail connections, access to Central, District, Jubilee, Hammersmith & City and East London underground lines and the Docklands Light Railway. There is a comprehensive network of buses and roads. London City airport is within easy access and there are fast trains to Stansted airport from Liverpool Street Station.

Crossrail, which will be known as the Elizabeth line when services begin in 2018, will be fully integrated with London's existing transport network. It will run from Reading and Heathrow in the west, through 42km of new tunnels under London to Shenfield and Abbey Wood in the east.

Housing

If you are eligible, the Key Worker Living Programme means that you can get help with home ownership if you:

- are a first time buyer
- are a homeowner and need to buy a larger property to meet your household needs (e.g. family sized homes)
- need to take part in shared ownership schemes
- need to rent at affordable prices.

The scheme is only open to specific keyworkers in London and the South East and East of England.

The programme offers three different kinds of help:

Open Market Home Buy

An 'equity loan' to help buy a home on the open market. This can be up to 50 per cent of the total property value. An equity loan is a loan where the lender shares in any rise (and sometimes any fall) in the value of the property over the course of the loan.

Open Market Home Buy Scheme - New Build Home Buy

If you are eligible you can buy at least 25 per cent of the cost of your home and pay a reduced rent on the remaining share.

New Build Home Buy Scheme - Intermediate Renting

Rent is set at a level between that charged by social and private landlords and the accommodation is provided by a landlord registered with the Housing Corporation (Registered Social Landlord).

LIVING AND WORKING IN EAST LONDON

East London is becoming an increasingly vibrant, prosperous and exciting area to live. Tower Hamlets, traditionally known as the heart of the East End, is part of this spectacular regeneration. The local economy has been subject to massive change over the last three decades following the rapid decline of the traditional dock-related industries. The last 20 years has seen a remarkable period of regeneration, with warehouse conversions and the construction of Britain's first skyscrapers.

The massive changes experienced in recent years are set to continue over the next decade. Tower Hamlets has adopted a strategic approach to regeneration in order to ensure that it contributes to the social, economic and environmental well-being of all those who live and work here. The council aims to ensure that poverty, disadvantage and social exclusion are tackled quickly and effectively and that regeneration brings increased benefits in terms of housing, education, community safety and health.

Tower Hamlets is a growing community with a population expanding at a rate three times the national average. The cosmopolitan nature of our population contributes to a rich cultural diversity and more festivals are held here annually than in any other London borough.

Venues in East London present entertainment across the board. Tower Hamlets has a thriving arts scene and is home to many aspiring and recognised artists. The Whitechapel Art Gallery is one of London's leading contemporary art establishments and is a vital focus for local artists. The Bow Arts Trust is the largest independent studio organisation in London providing affordable space for artists. The area also houses some of the capital's most cutting-edge bars and clubs and there are a variety of restaurants lining the borough's waterways.

East London is also famous for its street markets. On Sundays, the Columbia Road Flower Market is a horticulturalist's dream while in Petticoat Lane, with over a thousand stalls, there is something for everyone. Brick Lane Market, also on a Sunday and part of the popular Shoreditch Triangle, is run by the local Bangladeshi community. There are numerous local weekday markets and, close by, Billingsgate Fish Market and Spitalfields Market, now one of London's most popular markets selling everything from arts and crafts, organic food, furniture and books and records.

For fitness fanatics, there are many sports clubs and leisure centres in the area providing both indoor and outdoor amenities with opportunities for individual or group activities. A short distance from the school, in the Borough of Newham, is [Westfield, Stratford City](#), located next to Stratford station. Westfield Stratford City, home to 300 stores, is one of the largest shopping centres in Europe. [The 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games](#) had their main base at the [Olympic Park](#) in Stratford, which contained a significant number of venues including the [Olympic Stadium](#), now the home of West Ham Football Club, [Aquatics Centre](#), and [London Velopark](#). What was the athletes' [Olympic Village](#) is to be restructured as the new [East Village](#) development, providing 3,500 homes, half affordable and half private. The post-Olympics legacy plans have included the opening of the largest new urban park in Europe for over a century, Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park.
