Peponi House is very close to the lively suburb of Westlands, where there are shopping malls, restaurants, bars and clubs. Coming to terms with Nairobi's infamous traffic takes a week or so but being so close to so many amenities makes life much easier. Slightly further afield, there are places such as the new Two Rivers development, as well as some first class golf courses, gyms, spas, and pretty much everything else that you would expect to find in a large cosmopolitan city.

Nairobi itself is booming, with new developments being built almost weekly. The infrastructure is rapidly improving, with new ring roads and the new



standard gauge railway to the coast. The city is 1,795 metres (5,889 ft.) above sea level, so the first time you go for a jog you may feel out of breath. It also boasts its own National Park, where you can get a taste of Kenya's rich diversity of wildlife. The Park is also, sadly, one of the few remaining places where you have a reasonable chance of seeing a rhino.
